DAHO REPUBLICAN COUNTS ON BORAH

Veteran Senator Expected to Seek Relection With Victory

TWIN FALLS, May 29 (AP)—Frank Burroughs, Idaho Republican leader, predicted tonight that the veteran statesman will not be nominated for the presidency, but that he will win reelection in the senate and lead the Republican party to victory in Idaho next fall.

Burroughs made his forecast in a party banquet after he had conferred with Ray McKalg, Boise, field agent for the Borah-for-president headquarters at Washington, D. C.

McKalg, who obtained a set of 25 petitions for the second congressional district nomination earlier today, announced that he would be a candidate for the senate if Borah did not seek reelection.

"I will have a statement to make immediately after the Cleveland national convention," McKalg said.

"The fact that McKalg took out nominating petitions indicates that he is serious," Burroughs said.

"McKalg is one of Borah's closest associates, and when McKalg nominates for the senate, he is a candidate for the senate," Burroughs said.

"McKalg is in Borah's confidence as probably no other man—and that is the reason why he is a candidate for the senate," Burroughs said.

"This development is gratifying to me," Burroughs said.

"It is also gratifying, because if Borah were nominated for the presidency, we would not have much assistance from him in running over our Idaho ticket—and we need his support all the time."

SPEED URGED IN TOWNSEND CASE

U. S. Attorney Sees Little Change of Trial Before Autumn

WASHINGTON, May 29 (AP)—House leaders worked today to speed a federal court action on contempt charges against Dr. F. E. Townsend.

Speaker Byrnes certified to Leslie Gurnett, United States attorney for the District of Columbia, a copy of documents and records in the case of Dr. Townsend's walk-out on a house investigating committee.

With this report came a recitation of the refusal of Clinton Underwood and John B. Kiefer, Townsend-directors, to appear before the committee for examination.

Chairman Bell (D-Mo) said he was hopeful a grand jury indictment would be returned within three days.

The district attorney said the grand jury is now sitting but indicated there was little chance of indicting the case to trial before autumn.

Despite this situation some house members with Townsend's opposition in the coming elections said they hoped the case might be disposed of before the November vote.

Sheridan Downey, Dr. Townsend's personal counsel, announced today he did not know whether the case would be tried in open court or in a closed hearing.

Representative Young (D-Ohio) who took the floor to assail the Townsend organization and its leadership, said he would introduce a resolution to expel Townsend from the house.

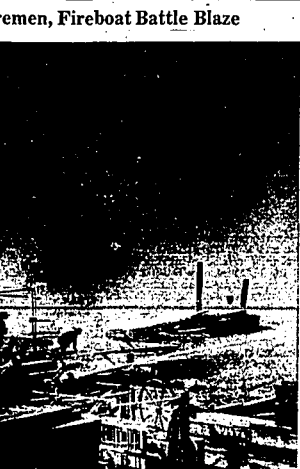


MEMORIAL DAY

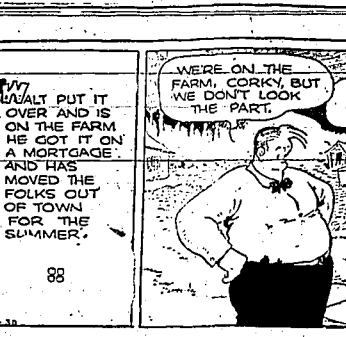

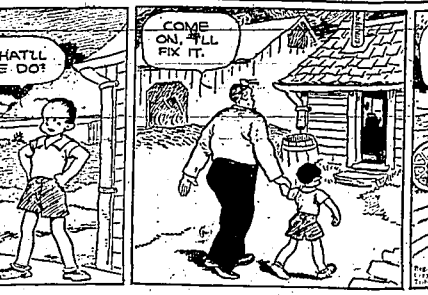
