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Louis Meyer Flashes To Third Victory In Memorial Day Race

Californian Hurtles Around Speedway At Record-Smashing Average Of 109.069 Miles An Hour

By CHARLES DUNKLEY (Associated Press Sports Writer) INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., May 30—Accomplishing what no other driver has done, Louis Meyer of Huntington Park, Calif., roared to his third glorious victory in the 500-mile automobile race around the Indianapolis motor speedway today in record-breaking time and with a record-smashing crowd cheering him.

Meyer drove his 4-cylinder special the full 500 miles without relief and made only two quick stops. He covered the distance in 4:49:34.94. Meyer's average speed was 109.069 miles an hour, breaking the previous record of 106.240 miles an hour hung up by Kelly Bell in 1934.

Another Californian, 27-year-old Ted Horn of Los Angeles, finished second, nearly three miles behind Meyer, with Mauri Rice of Dayton, Ohio, third, 21.5 miles back.

When all the 31 starters finished, 10 were still in the race. Meyer earned about \$35,000 of which \$20,000 was first prize money.

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TWO PERSONS DEAD AND TWO MISSING IN FLOODED AREAS

Several Towns Inundated as Streams Overflow in Southwest's Dust Bowl; Prairie Lands Saturated

(By The Associated Press) GRANADA, Colo., May 30—Flood waters swirled over portions of the southwest dust bowl tonight, leaving two persons dead and three missing and several towns inundated.

Just one year ago one of the worst floods in the west's history tore through the area in Colorado, Nebraska and Kansas.

The dead in today's flood were Don Clark, 27, of Denver, drowned near Silt, Colorado, and Mrs. John Ditt, caught in flood waters near Goodland, Kansas.

An unidentified youth was missing at Carlton, Colorado.

River Receding The high waters poured down the Arkansas and overflowed the Republican river 100 miles to the north.

The Santa Fe railroad and several highway bridges were torn out.

At Benkelman, Nebraska, 30 families fled from their homes.

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SENATE SUPPORTS CANAL BUT KILLS QUODDY PROJECT

Wide-Harnessing Scheme Rejected by Vote of 28 to 39 After Five-Hour Battle Over Allotments

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, May 30 (AP)—The senate voted a new lease on life to the Florida canal today, but killed the administration's effort to revive the Passamaquoddy tidal power project in Maine.

The votes came late this morning after a long debate over the White House proposal to authorize new allotments.

The revised Robinson amendment, which gave the Passamaquoddy project a new lease on life, was rejected by a vote of 28 to 39.

Through today's five-hour session, the two sides battled over the long-fought canal-Passamaquoddy issue.

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Missing Aviator's Plane Found in Utah Canyon; No Trace of Flier's Body

Preliminary Examination Indicates Howard Stark Escaped Unhurt From Crash And Perished In Blizzard

(By The Associated Press) SALT LAKE CITY, May 30—The plane in which Howard Stark, department of commerce aviator, disappeared last January, was found in Lost Creek canyon, 35 miles east and slightly north of Moab, Utah.

Frederick Weyland of Salt Lake City, hiking through the mountains, found the ship in rugged terrain.

No trace of Stark's body was found.

Preliminary examination of the craft revealed only a broken wheel and an empty fuel tank.

Department of commerce officials said they believed Stark escaped serious injury in a forced landing, but died in a mid-winter blizzard.

Equipment intact Department of commerce officials who questioned Weyland said the plane struck a mountain and was deep snow and slipped over on its back.

Weyland said they could not reach the plane in less than six hours on horseback, indicating the party would not return before tomorrow.

Weyland said he examined the plane, but removed nothing except the map. He said Stark's suitcase and other belongings were in the cabin.

Near Moab, Utah He reported the plane crashed on a timberless area near the top of a mountain.

A road leads through the timberland in that vicinity, but snow blocked the way.

Stark, a major in the department of commerce aeronautical force, left Salt Lake City, Aug. 19, 1935, on a flight to Salt Lake City.

Weyland said he had searched for the plane for many days, but was unable to find it.

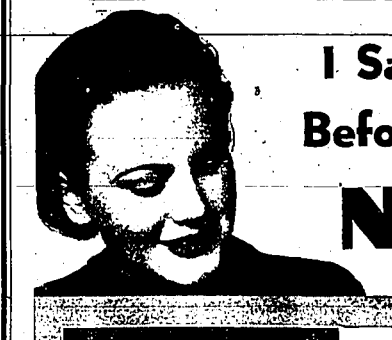

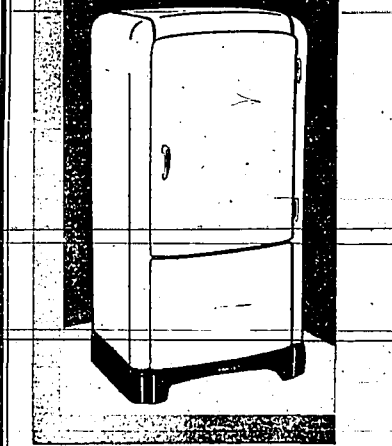

Not only that, but something far more wonderful. You can get as far away in time as in space. When you see a star or star-cluster any number of light-years distant, you are looking that far into the past—seeing the heavenly bodies not as they are now, but as they were "in the dimly remembered annals of time."

Wouldn't it be interesting to have a reverse telescope with which we could see likewise into the future, beholding the "shapes of things to be?" But perhaps it's just as well not to know too much about that. We might not like it.

Gratitude Expressed To Nation's War Dead

Justice Alfred Budge Of Idaho Supreme Court Memorial Day Speaker In Twin Falls

Justice Alfred Budge of the Idaho state supreme court paid eloquent tribute on Memorial day in Twin Falls to the nation's fighting men in all its wars who "died that we today might enjoy a greater measure of freedom."

Briefly outlining this country's history, the veteran Idaho jurist declared: "It is a story of men making a nation grand and free."

Justice Budge addressed an audience of several hundred persons assembled about the Memorial cenotaph in Twin Falls cemetery at one of the two public exercises which marked Twin Falls observance of the day.

Vanished Army

In the Memorial day assemblage, for the first time in Twin Falls history, there was no veteran of the Civil war. None in this county has survived the insupportable hardships of the ranks of the Grand Army of the Republic.

About the cenotaph at the cemetery, and the Memorial monument on the court house grounds, veterans and patriots organizations and Camp Fire Girls and Boy Scouts laid garlands of flowers.

The graves of 117 American war veterans in Twin Falls—cemetery were marked with flags and decorated with flowers, and throughout the burial ground a profusion of blooms marked continuing memory of departed loved ones.

Uniformed troops of Company E, 11th Engineers, Twin Falls unit of the Idaho national guard, and Twin Falls municipal band took part in exercises at the cemetery, and made up the procession that moved through flag lined streets during the interval between the two exercises.

Rituals Blended

The Memorial day ritual of the Grand Army of the Republic and the American Legion were blended in the exercises at the cemetery.

World war veterans, Wilton Peck, commander of the Grand Army, and commander-in-chief which set apart the first Memorial day, and Twin Falls residents Lincoln Gray, Ed Lister, commander, and Wilton Peck, captain, of Twin Falls American Legion post, rendered the realistic service of the World war veterans' organization.

A national guard squad fired the salute in three volleys to the dead and a national guard bugler sounded taps to mark the close of the exercises which included two numbers by the band—"Roses of Picardy" and "Garden of Tomorrow."

Birth of a Nation

Introduced by J. H. Blanford, a past commander of Twin Falls American Legion post, Justice Budge referred to the acquisition of the day "sacred to the blessed memories of our heroic dead."

"He leaves the nation as he died, the great day. Addressing surviving war veterans, he said:

"These brothers fell while you were marching an end on. By their heroic your brothers made possible your ultimate victory. Your conquests in national history, and their victory your war."

The speaker referred to the War for Independence which he said "embodied an enduring principle and sealed into the brains of men the great scroll which all enlightened men have since used as a compass for the navigation of human rights and liberties."

In connection with his reference to the Civil war, the speaker declared:

"Real and lasting victories can be won only for the right and the right is the only permanent peace is based on the triumph of justice. Like a beacon light shining on a rocky coast it stands ready to guide us to safe haven where all the good things we need and want lie sheltered and waiting for us."

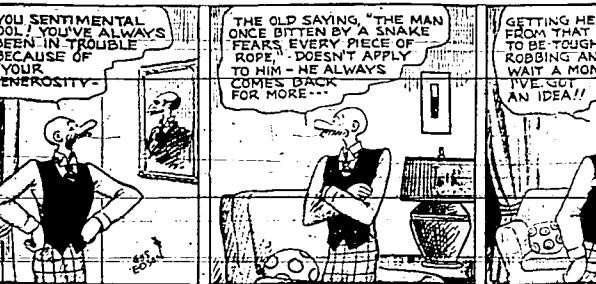

PLANS FORMED FOR DIAGNOSTIC CLINIC

Crippled Children From Six Counties to Benefit From Examinations

Children with crippling handicaps from Camia, Blaine, Gooding, Teton, Jerome and Twin Falls counties, will be examined at a diagnostic clinic to be held in Twin Falls June 1st to 6th under the auspices of the Social Security Act as it affects crippled children.

A detailed survey, under the direction of Mrs. Gladys Bell, assistant to Dr. J. D. Dunshee, director of public health service, will be followed as rapidly as possible by clinics for the registration, classification and examination of children at central locations throughout the state.

The diagnostic clinic for this territory will be held in the basement of the Episcopal church, following activities on the part of a local committee under the direction of Mrs. Robert Rogerson, R. C. N., in preparation for all details of the locale and registration of every crippled-child not now receiving adequate care and attention from a physician.

Handicaps Defined
Crippling handicaps are interpreted as meaning conditions that prevent normal physical development of the child, most especially those of the bones. All children under the age of 21, and who are normal mentally, are eligible. All local physicians are urged to attend the clinic with their patients.

The state crippled children's program provides funds for hospitalization—medical surgery, where necessary, provided for braces and other orthopedic appliances and vocational training where indicated.

Through the chairman of the local committee, Mrs. Rogerson, 1550 sixth avenue east, the public health department is asking the cooperation of local child welfare organizations and all service clubs in locating these handicapped children. As rapidly as the cases are reported to her, they will receive, before the clinic, a personal call from one of the public health nurses, to plan details of the child's attendance at the clinic.

The clinic in Twin Falls will be attended by Mrs. Gladys Bell, social service director, and will be in charge of Dr. M. B. Shaw, orthopedic surgeon and private practitioner from Boise; Dr. Dunshee, and a qualified pediatrician.
