BLACK, LAFOLLETTE SLAP TAX MEASURE

Senate Committee Minority Backs Administration Proposals

WASHINGTON, June 1 (AP)—On the eve of Senate consideration of the much-revised 1936 tax bill, a broadside today was fired against the controversial measure by two Senate finance committee members who contended it would perpetuate evils of existing tax laws.

In a minority report, Senators Black (D-Ala.) and LaFollette (Prog-Wis) said the compromise finance committee bill would levy a "wholly unnecessary and deadly blow" at small corporations and small stockholders.

The bill, last major hurdle in the path of adjournment of Congress, was called tonight, but the start of the actual floor battle was postponed until tomorrow because the senate had run well past the dinner hour in passing the self-defense measure.

Foreboding—a "blow" bitter fight, this time on the Senate floor, they offered a substitute proposal. It would be more closely in line with administration desires and with the tax bill passed by the House.

Call for Republicans

Other developments that broke over the contested measure included:

Senator McNary of Oregon, the minority leader, sent out a call for Republicans to meet tomorrow morning to determine what position they should take on the bill.

Senator Belmont of New York announced he, too, would file a minority report.

Senator Cousins (R-Mich.) announced a group of senators would join in a filibuster if the bill would actually worked out in conference with the House to retain in substance the features of the House measure.

The committee bill, departing radically from the House version and the tax philosophy and suggestions of President Roosevelt, would tax corporation income at 15 to 18 per cent, place a 7 per cent levy on corporate earnings not distributed to shareholders, and tax corporate income at 4 per cent normal income tax, and boost individual income surtaxes in all brackets above \$5000.

Acceptance Predicted

Backers of the plan predicted it would be accepted by the senate without material alteration. That would throw into the struggle over high levels on undistributed corporate earnings, on which the Black-LaFollette proposed a 15% levy.

In their minority report, Black and LaFollette proposed a 12% levy.

Retain the present 12% to 15 per cent taxes on corporate income, exempt \$15,000 of corporate income from an undistributed profits tax, place no levy on 20 per cent of undistributed earnings, but put a 20 per cent tax on retained earnings between 20 and 40 per cent, 30 per cent on all undistributed income of 40 per cent and over.

They said this plan would raise \$502,000,000, against \$522,000,000 they estimated for the committee's corporate tax scheme.

Townsend Considers Sojourn In Bastille

LOS ANGELES, June 1 (AP)—Dr. F. E. Townsend is considering going to jail as a gesture of protest in his struggle with the Bell congressional committee, probing the Townsend old age pension movement, Sheridan Downey, counsel for the Townsend organization, said on his arrival here today.

"Townsend alone will decide, but I believe he is strongly inclined to refuse to post bond when he is indicted in the next few days for contempt of the committee," the lawyer asserted.

"In that event, of course, he would go to jail and his imprisonment would become a monument to the political opposition of the committee and the national administration, and to the justice and merit of our position."

"I have," she said. "But I have to save it."

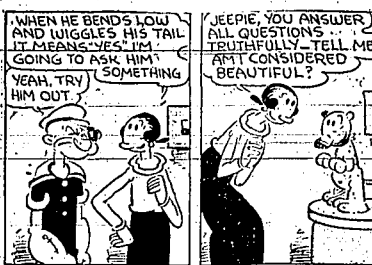

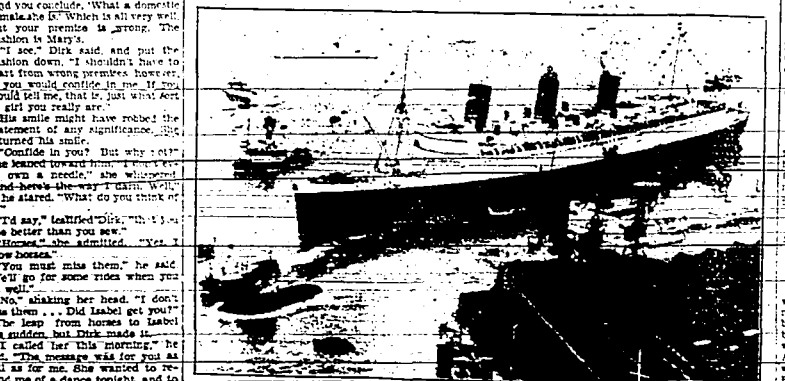
