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South China Declared Insistent On National War Against Japan

Shanghai College Professors Urge Government To Use Force In Resistance To Armed Invasions

(By The Associated Press) SHANGHAI, June 3 (Wednesday) — The south China government, Japanese officials said today, has demanded a national war against Japan.

The southern Canton government, Japanese here asserted, pledged full aid to Nanking in a war against "Japan's aggression" in north China.

These Japanese sources said Canton had already declared war on Nanking, presumably in an effort to force the Nationalist government into a war on Japan.

This firm stand in the Sino-Japanese crisis was taken in a form of a manifesto, the Japanese stated.

High officials of the national government, Nanking, using the reports, false, asserting "the Japanese are trying to create trouble."

Japanese authorities here announced receipt of further advice saying Canton has not declared war, but issued a manifesto denouncing Japanese aggression in north China.

Emphasizing that immediate re-arming "through war" is "the only way of preserving China's national existence," the manifesto appealed for military action.

These reports were "scrutinized in Nanking," which said Nanking and Canton relations have "never been better."

Concrete signs of a growing sentiment for war in some circles of central and northern China were disclosed today.

The association of Shanghai University and College Professors sent a telegram to Nanking urging the national government "to resist by force Japanese troop increases and smuggling in north China."

These were believed to be the first of a series of college professors formally urging the government to armed action against Japan.

Tax Bill Agreement Goal Of Congressmen

Compromise Hinted As Senate Passes All But Three Vital Divisions Of Measure

WASHINGTON, June 2 (AP)—The senate whittled through all but three vital divisions of the revised tax bill today as word was passed on Capitol Hill that President Roosevelt might be willing to compromise on the key measure in order to expedite congressional adjournment.

Even as the senate engaged in loud debate on the measure estimated by its backers to be potential of \$29,000,000, house and senate leaders began conferring over possibilities of a quick agreement when the bill goes to conference between the two chambers.

They said their purpose was to bring adjournment by Saturday or Monday night.

Just how far, if at all, the president might swing over toward the senate bill, which is far removed from its original tax proposal, remained undetermined.

The idea prevailed generally that the senate measure would be passed only in its present form and the compromise effected in conference.

Seek Steeper Taxes—Nevertheless, Senators Black (D-Aia.) and La Follette (D-Wis.) were planning to carry through a fight, although not a prolonged one, for steeper graduated taxes on undistributed corporate profits.

Acting Chairman King (D-Utah) of the finance committee talked tonight of speeding the bill to passage in Washington for federal assistance in routing out the organization.

Floods Wreak Havoc In British Columbia

Swollen Skeena River Cuts Trail Of Destruction; Houses, Bridges Washed Away

(By The Associated Press) VANCOUVER, B. C., June 2 — Houses, bridges and railroad tracks were swept away by the flood-swollen Skeena river today, as it cut a broad trail of destruction through the mid-coast section of British Columbia.

For 100 miles inland from the coastal city of Prince Rupert the Skeena surged over its banks and into Indian villages and river-side towns. No casualties were reported.

Farmlands and buildings were inundated in the southern interior and neighboring districts but the flood menace became most critical in the up-coast sector.

A police patrol boat spun to the aid of stricken motorists.

Thirty-three houses were washed away at Hazelton on the upper Skeena and one building was damaged as headed for higher land.

The village of Kilmagna, near Hazelton, was flooded deeply and the water tank and pump-house at the station were carried away. Food supplies were sent to the village from Hazelton yesterday.

The village of Glenwood was completely inundated.

The stream gage station at Silver Lake 50 miles from Prince Rupert, was isolated. Contact was lost a few hours after a call for aid received.

At least five persons were injured seriously enough to require hospital treatment.

Deluge With Gale

(By The Associated Press) DETROIT, June 2 — The worst storm in recent Detroit history swept over the heart of the city today, killing two persons, unroofing several buildings, uprooting trees, shattering windows and damaging hundreds of automobiles.

Mrs. Hazel Taylor, 31, a bride of six months, was killed by lightning she walked home.

William Gattaianni, 16, was killed when the 80-mile gale blew a traveling crane from its mooring.

Reclamation Program Goes Back To House

Senate Unyielding In Demand For \$58,000,000 For Western Projects

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, June 2 — Senate and house conferees on the \$58,000,000 reclamation program supply bill again failed today to adjust differences between the two chambers and sent it back to the house for a new vote.

The conference saw the senate refusing to yield in its demand to accept the entire \$58,000,000 reclamation program, in \$4,000,000 Indian-irrigation program, and provisions authorizing construction of those projects.

Some already being built, which have never before been authorized by congress.

The house conferees, however, were not authorized to accede to senate demands and the bill will go back to the house where western leaders will ask the lower chamber to vote again and discuss part of the reclamation program.

Reductions Expected—Representative Edward T. Taylor, Glenwood, Springs, Colo., chairman of house conferees, said he expected amendments to be offered from the floor proposing a 50 per cent reduction in the reclamation fund items, a sharp reduction in the Indian irrigation program, complete elimination of the authorizations, and elimination of funds for the Central Valley, California.

Meanwhile, a new scheme developed from another angle. House opponents of reclamation opposed the bill.

### LIMIT ON SUGAR PAYMENTS URGED

President Proposes Graduated Scale of Benefits to Growers

WASHINGTON, June 2 (AP)—President Roosevelt proposed today that a check-retain be placed on the size of federal benefits payable to large corporate farming enterprises. The chief executive's proposal was put forward first to relatives to be applied with a rush of other proposed amendments, tended, however, to place new difficulties in the path of efforts to enact "crop gap" sugar control legislation before adjournment.

Senate and house committees to delay action on a resolution intended to strengthen the Jones-Kostenko sugar control law, except the existing marketing quota system and authorize benefit payments to producers.

Expanding at a late afternoon press conference an earlier letter to congress members of the sugar legislation, the president suggested an application of graduated benefit payments under the entire soil conservation program, giving the larger enterprises proportionately less than smaller owners — would be quota study.

Mr. Roosevelt stressed that certain advantages, such as lower overhead, accrued to large farming enterprises.

Although all soil conservation payments in accordance with the size of the operation, the executive admitted that it probably would take legislation to gain this end.

As for the "stop gap" sugar control measure, the president suggested the agriculture committee would report the measure tomorrow, but members of a senate finance sub-committee were noncommittal.

Meanwhile, a warning that failure to pass the "stop gap" legislation might "wipe out the quota system entirely" was voiced at a brief senate finance sub-committee hearing by Senator Clark (D-Mo.).

Senate and house committees took under advisement objections by Secretary Baker to expenditure of \$100 million to continental producers 40 percent of the existing 30 percent of any increase in the annual consumption estimate.
