WASHINGTON, June 3.—The tax bill bogged down tonight in a wrangle over the crucial issue of stiffer taxes on undistributed corporation profits and a vote on passage was held over at least until tomorrow.

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FORCE OF 250,000 WE STARTS CIVIL WARFARE IN CHINA

Huge Canton Army Attacks Cities Affiliated With Nanking Government, According to Japanese

(By The Associated Press) SHANGHAI, June 4 (Wednesday)—A huge Canton army reported by Japanese sources today to have struck swiftly at China cities affiliated with the Nanking national government, launching a surprise attack without opposition, the Japanese apparently have withdrawn.

A force of 250,000 rapidly moving men, these quarters said, "entered Hunan province (in North China) without opposition, the Japanese apparently have withdrawn."

The Nanking government, these reports continue, has "massed" its divisions and a squadron of 20 bombing planes to hurl back the Canton forces from the south, Southern sources were repeating details against expected air raids.

Premises Support in War The developments followed by less than 24 hours a Canton, or south China government manifesto demanding that the national government go to war immediately against Japan.

Reports Branded False Another "misleading" element was added to the situation when foreign and Chinese sources received from the Japanese a report that a statement by the Kwangtung government of foreign affairs branding Japanese reports of an "opening" of war as "absolutely false."

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Ground Glass Not Harmful, Expert Persuades Jurors

CUMBERLAND, Md., June 3.—After hearing an expert witness testify that ground glass is not harmful to humans, a circuit court jury today returned a verdict in favor of a food packing company sued for \$2,000.

The jury deliberated for 46 minutes before it reached a verdict, dismissing the suit against the food packers. The main defense witness was the doctor who testified about the effect of glass in the diet.

The doctor was F. O. Miller of Richmond, Virginia, who told the court that while working for the federal government, during the World War he handled ground glass as an experiment.

He said he suffered no ill effects. Dr. Miller also said that he had found in his laboratory that to suffer no harm from it, Mrs. Mary Clem, the plaintiff, said she ate ground glass contained in cheese.

DIG-RELIEF BILL WEARS ENACTMENT

House Democratic Leaders Send Measure Into Conference

WASHINGTON, June 3.—Abandoning their threat to force through a special rule, House Democratic leaders today engineered the \$2,000,000 relief-deficiency bill into conference with the senate and thus brought it a step nearer enactment.

House conferees, headed by Chairman Buchanan (D-Tex.) of the House committee, met immediately to study the scores of special amendments upon which the measure—one of two that will be passed before adjournment—was sent to the White House.

BROOKLYN OFFICERS ARREST DETECTIVE ON KIDNAP CHARGE

Grand Jury Returns Indictments Against Ellis H. Parker, Sr., in Connection With Wendel Abduction

(By The Associated Press) MT. HOLLY, N. J., June 3.—Ellis H. Parker, Sr., widely known chief of Burlington county detectives, was arrested tonight by New York authorities and charged with kidnaping a girl and assaulting Paul H. Wendel during Parker's investigation of the Lindbergh kidnaping case.

The arrest was made three hours after the Kings county (N.Y.) grand jury returned indictments against the detective.

Brooklyn authorities charged Parker, former Trenton attorney, with kidnapping Wendel, and took charge of the case. Parker was held in custody until he could be taken to New York for trial.

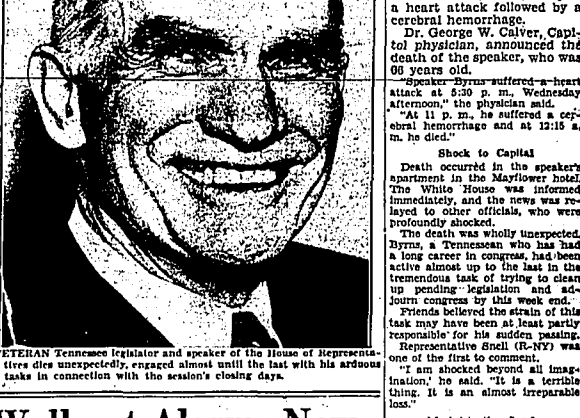

(By The Associated Press) PARIS, June 3.—A raging strike fever stayed the hands of 350,000 French workers tonight and alarmed a changing government with the menace of food, water and gas shortages in Paris.

Official France, wrapping cabinet horses in the middle of a turbulent labor situation, said more than 300 factories, many of them in the hands of "old men" workers, apparently threatened to shut down tomorrow.

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# Murder Charged Man Pleads Legion Edict

Calmly disregarding the shouted objections of his own attorney, the feeble mutterings of his 12 co-defendants on murder and kidnaping charges, Dayton Dean testified that he shot Pooler, 32-year-old WPA worker, because it was expected of him. 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# FIRES THREATEN WEST'S FORESTS

### Telegraphic Survey Discloses 'High Hazard' Regions

WASHINGTON, June 3 (AP)—A westward sweep of forest fire hazards, after an abnormal record of more than 8,000 forest fires in the east since the turn of the year, was shown today by a telegraphic survey.

After studying today's reports from national park areas, forest service officials said that although recent rains had helped some, serious spots still appeared in the western states.

In forests in Arizona and southern New Mexico, it was reported, a "high hazard" exists, while in the Cleveland forest in southern Idaho the situation was reported as an "abnormal risk."

Assistant Forester C. M. Granger said that in the country east of the Mississippi river, there was an average of 1100 fires a year from 1931 to 1935. But from January 1 to June 1 of this year, he said, there have been more than 4,000 in the east.

### Showers Bring Relief

Granger added, however, the fire season was on the wane in that area "but" that the danger season was becoming acute in the west.

Recent showers were said to have reduced a "critical" condition in Oregon and Washington, and the outlook in those states now was regarded as somewhat better.

Halfway yesterday in Montana and Idaho alleviated a danger condition said to have been the worst in 55 years. No hazard has yet been reported in Utah and southern Idaho, and conditions in the Rocky Mountain states were said to be satisfactory.

Granger said that the problem of making residents in the 15,000,000 acres of newly purchased forest areas "fire conscious" would be one of the major efforts of the service this year.

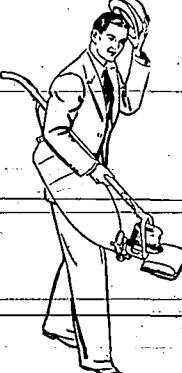

### NEW PEAK LOBMS FOR PUBLIC DEBT

#### Treasury Estimates Five Billion Dollar Rise for Year

WASHINGTON, June 3 (AP)—Carefully gauging the amount to be paid on the bonds this month, treasury experts today estimated the fiscal year would close June 30 with the public debt a few millions short of \$34,000,000,000.

They figured that of 3,500,000 veterans eligible for the bonus, some 2,500,000 would receive their checks and bonds during the last two weeks of June, involving an outlay of \$1,700,000,000. This would be reflected also in the deficit.

They declined to hazard any opinions as to what the latter figure might be.

\$5,200,000,000—Insurance

The public debt on June 1 stood at \$31,835,000,000 and in reaching the \$34,000,000,000 mark (the end of the fiscal year) the treasury officials added to it, in addition to the bonus cost \$1,500,000,000 to be borrowed in new cash on June 15, and \$250,000,000 to be borrowed by the weekly sale of treasury bills. The whole would add up to \$33,000,000,000. From this must be deducted an expected \$800,000,000 in bonus bonds carried leaving a net figure of \$23,500,000,000.

If the debt reaches the nearly \$34,000,000,000 figure predicted today for June 30, it will stand at a peak about 100,000,000 points above the \$33,000,000,000 point at which the fiscal year began. For the year thus far, it has increased \$2,210,000,000.

During the equivalent period a year ago, the debt increased \$1,582,000,000, but at the same time the treasury had a surplus of \$448,000,000 while this year it has increased \$495,000,000.

Now when expenditures exceed the month period, receipts from taxes and other general revenue sources, exclusive of borrowing, are greater this year than last. Expenditures also have increased.

### Lions—Clubs Of Utah and Idaho Wind Up Session

LOAN, Utah, June 3 (AP)—P. M. Dilline was elected district governor of Idaho Lions today at the annual joint session of clubs of the Utah and Idaho districts.

The Utah clubs chose J. O. Denton of Magna governor.

The election followed approval of resolutions calling on state legislators to provide an adequate parole system and dedicating the clubs to rehabilitation of the blind.

Attorney General Joseph C. Chesebrough of the state said he has one office to look after between 480 and 490 parole prisoners.

District Judge Herbert M. Schiller of Salt Lake City also urged a better equipped parole system and explicit confidence in the courts.

He said he was "not only in preserving liberties, steering us through perilous times, but also to help make the world a better place to live in."

He said he was certain the people of the United States will work for a permanent settlement rather than swinging to fascism and communism.

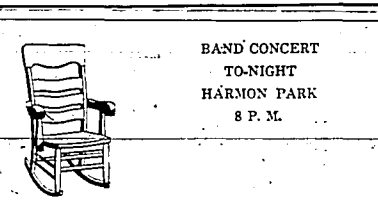

### THOMAS BRANDED FOR BUDGET LEAK

#### British Tribunal Finds Ex-Cabinet Members Revealed Secrets

LONDON, June 3 (AP)—A high tribunal of inquiry yesterday found that James Henry Thomas, former colonial secretary, had revealed the sacred budget secrets of his majesty's government.

Clashing Great Britain's major political scandal since the World war, the tribunal decided Thomas, who quit his post because of the budget leak furore, disclosed the secrets to Sir Alfred Butt, wealthy member of parliament and to Alfred Bates, an advertising agency executive.

#### Gambled and Won

It found further that Bates and Sir Alfred gambled and won as a result of the tip.

Thomas went into seclusion to await the verdict of his house of commons constituency as to whether he must resign from parliament.

First, however, he termed the verdict a "carol one."

His stockbroker son, Leslie, was cleared by the tribunal.

Whether further proceedings would be brought against the former minister, who rose to that post from the status of engine wiper, depended upon parliamentary law officers. There were indications the government might decide against further prosecution, but regardless of whether any action is taken, political circles believed both Thomas and Sir Alfred would be forced to resign from parliament.

### PWA HEAD ANNOUNCES NO-FATAL-ACCIDENTS

BOISE, June 3 (AP)—Vernon Otter, state director, today announced that in the two and one-half years of operation on PWA projects in Idaho there have been no fatal accidents.

Otter said that all Idaho PWA construction contracts are bonded to guarantee completion as required by state law. In addition, contractors are required to provide workmen's compensation insurance for their employees and public liability insurance as a protection to persons not on the payroll who may be injured as a result of the contractor's operations.

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HOPE FOR BENEFIT PAYMENTS FADING

Congress Farm Leaders Join Forces for Sugar Control

WASHINGTON, June 3 (AP)—Congress agricultural leaders united today in efforts to enact "stop gap" sugar control legislation before adjournment.

At the same time, farmer's hopes of revived benefit payments faded. Though provision for such payments was in a resolution approved by the house agriculture committee, members said privately they expected proposed method of financing payments would fail.

Without benefits to producers, the sugar committee in an amendment extend the existing quota system through 1937, with the announced aim of strengthening the legality of the Jones-Costigan act.

The measure would authorize an appropriation of \$100,000,000 in finance benefits similar to those invalidated by the supreme court in January. A decision on the agricultural adjustment act.

Both senate and house farm spokesmen said they doubted, however, congress in its pre-adjournment rush, would vote such a bounty.

Without some provision for financing there will be no benefit payments, predicted Representative Fred C. Owsen, Idaho's congressman. He was chairman of the congressional sugar bloc.

Written into the measure by the house committee was an amendment suggested by President Roosevelt to prevent large agricultural subsidies from benefitting "to an unusual extent."

Chairman Jones of the house agriculture committee in an amendment attempt would be made to have the house act tomorrow.

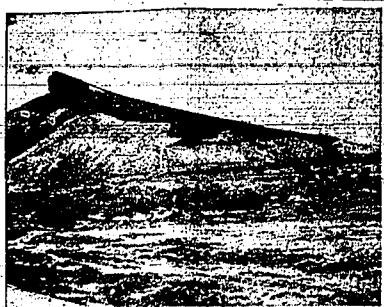

### OFFICERS SEARCH FOR GYPSY BAND

#### Two Women Enter Home and Escape With \$130 in Currency

Law enforcement officers throughout southern Idaho were in search last evening for a band of gypsies, two members of which are charged with the daylight robbery yesterday morning at the home of James Fisher, 235 Polk street, when \$130 in currency was reported taken.

While Fisher was eating his breakfast in his one room dwelling just outside the city limits, he reported to sheriff's officers, two women came to his door to ask for a drink of water. They entered the house and while one was getting the water the other removed his wallet from his pocket, lying on the bed near the door, excepting with \$130 of \$150 that he had withdrawn from a bank the previous day.

Fisher grabbed and retained his wallet, but it contained only \$20 of the \$150, and the women escaped in a large brown sedan, driven by a man.

Several other residents of the vicinity have reported that the gypsies attempted to gain entrance to their homes.

Five cars of gypsies were escorted out of Twin Falls Tuesday night and are reported to be headed east.

### LITIGATION CONTINUES IN DISPUTE OVER CROP
