CONFEREES BATTLE OVER TAX MEASURE

Congressional Leaders See Small Chance for New Major Legislation

WASHINGTON, June 6 (AP)—With the bitter scrap over the key tax bill transferred to a senate-house conference, congress set out today to return to legislative business from the path of adjournment.

They planned to obtain action on five big bills now in conference, or other bills which have agreed to dispose of some secondary measures, then wind up the session shortly after the adjournment.

During the recess over the Republican convention period, congressional leaders are in the conference, and the house would reduce large benefit payments to farmers under the new farm mortgage law.

Unsung But Welcome, Brother and Sister Make Trip to Burley

BURLEY, June 6 (AP) — Unsung but welcome, a brother and sister of Oliver Tillingworth, the slain Richard Dotson, came to his aid today. Tillingworth, blinded by a bullet which killed after Sheriff P. C. Pace reported, he shot his common law wife and her friend, from his hospital bed immediately identified his relatives by their voices. The two who came uninvited to the assistance of their brother are T. J. Tillingworth of Texas and Mrs. Ruth Irons of Kansas City, Missouri. **Learn of Tragedy** Mrs. Irons learned of the tragedy from a newspaper story telling of the shooting victim's identification through fingerprints sent by Sheriff P. C. Pace to the department of justice. Tillingworth, also known as "Red" Lincolnson and Richard Dotson, reported to Sheriff Pace following the shooting that he had no friends or relatives. Pending recovery of the man and his two victims, no charges have been filed.

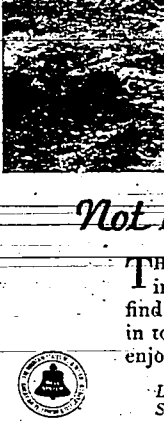

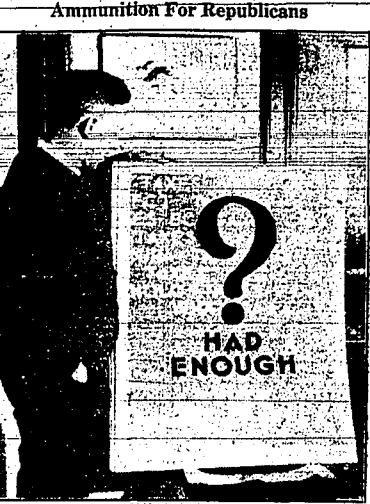

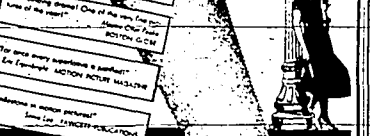

SIX DECADES BACK

A Series of Historical Sketches of Early Days in Southern Idaho

THE INDIAN ACCOUNT

In the spring of 1861, emigrants took the Missouri river bound for California. It was equipped, as nearly as possible, with everything necessary to make safe the trip through an unsettled country infested with Indians. The train consisted of more than sixty wagons and some three hundred men. Nothing is known of the early part of their trip until they reached the western plains where they were harassed by Indians whom they were able to keep at bay through their well-organized camp, their driving management, and their equipment of arms.

This gave them added courage, and they looked on the Indians, who at first were small in numbers, with indifference, and sometimes they took shots at them at long range to keep them away, which angered the Indians. This together with the natural animosity which they held for the white man, coupled with the fact that the Indians possess their belongings, caused a general uprising of the numerous Indians whose habits were adjacent to the Oregon Trail.

Indian runners were sent out and signal smokes were sent up. The place of concentration was the Indian Grove, some four or five miles south of Almo creek. According to the Indians account, there was assembled here the largest number of hostile Indians ever known in these parts. Here they met, which was plentiful, and waited for the condemned train.

The emigrants traveled in confusion over the Oregon Trail, where their guide headed them south over the Snake river to the California road. They traveled peacefully for three short days without sighting Indians, and then camped for the night at Almo. Indians named by the Indians, signifying "Plenty Water," where now nestles the peaceful village of Almo. Here they took their usual precautions, made a corral of their wagons, placed strong guards over their stock, and camped peacefully, not knowing that an overwhelming band of bloodthirsty Indians were looking down on them from Indian Grove, a last mountain peak, finely timbered, which even to this day retains its name.

Well Planned Attack

The outbreak of the Indians watched with impatience the emigrants left their morning fire inside their wagon enclosure, watched the herdsmen drive their stock to camp to be harnessed for the day's journey and saw the line of defense being broken, each wagon falling into its allied position in the military precision. The Indians were in readiness. They were about to attack a foe much their superior in arms and ammunition. The Indians had a few guns and small quantities of ammunition, but they depended on their greater number, their bows and arrows and their well-planned mode of attack.

They allowed the train, as it moved slowly southward from Almo creek, to proceed until its rear wagon was some distance from the creek. Suddenly a screaming signal was given by the Indian lookout, and Indians in great numbers emerged from their places of concealment, where they had lurked in silence and secrecy. They completely surrounded the surprised emigrants who immediately gave up arms and sought to be concealed with all stock inside the enclosure. This was accomplished in spite of the hair-raising yells of the bloodthirsty Indians who knew they had committed the first act of their contemplated tragedy. They had the emigrant train cut off from water,

look back into the past and meditate on the changes in conditions of transportation that have taken place in a little better than half a century.

Today the most remote section of our country is accessible to power-driven transportation, brought about by our extensive building programs and the constant improving and universal use of power-driven conveyances. Easy means for the cities are able to speed to the far-distant fastnesses of the mountains where in some sequestered spot they may spend their weekends.

Sheepmen supply their camps in the dry sand of the desert, and among the peaks of the snow-capped mountains by means of auto trucks. Cattle, sheep, and horses are transported great distances on rubber-tired vehicles. Some enterprising stockmen try their isolated camps by airplane.

In examining the early-day history of our country we find that the first incentive for better trails and roads came in 1861 and emanated from the discovery of gold in the unsettled and unmaped territory of Idaho. At that time the only existing road was the Old Oregon Trail, which made its way east and west through the entire southern part of the territory.

The Old Oregon Trail came into existence during the heavy migration to Oregon, beginning in the forties and extending into the sixties. During this period the greatest wagon transportation the country ever knew passed over the trail. So densely packed were the trails as they passed through the desert valley of the Snake, that the wheels of the wagons, as they cut deep into the dry volcanic ash that forms a rich soil, sent up great volumes of dust that was later carried away by the west wind; and the Old Oregon Trail in many places was a depression four or five feet deep.

The Old Oregon Trail was just an improved Indian trail that was used by the Bannocks, Shoshones, and other Indians on their travels east and west on the Indian coast. The only early improvement on this historic road was made by the emigrants. They made roads, built bridges, and crossed streams on improvised ferries as they traveled.

carry their significance into our present-day history.

Gold was discovered in the Boise Basin in the spring of 1862. At that time Oregon had some settlements and California had had its gold rush. The coast territory was filled with miners and prospectors who were well qualified and willing to face hardship for the love of gold, and even at that time of slow transportation and communication they thousands of men had traveled from foot on horseback, and on the backs of burros, and were working as hard as the men who had come to the fall of the same year. These men had to be fed, and it is in this connection that we marvel at the resolute action of these determined men as they organized to meet this emergency.

Saddle trains for passenger transportation, pack trains for freight. All supplies at this time came from the east, mainly by boat up the Columbia river to Umatilla Landing. Trails were built connecting the Old Oregon Trail, and later these were converted into roads, and wagon transportation to the mines began.

Pack trains were used for several years delivering freight to isolated mining camps. During 1865 gold was discovered in Montana, where the mines first received their supplies by boat up the Missouri river, but later the Indian trail used by the Bannocks and Shoshones, on their northern trip for buffalo was used. Then the urge for mail caused establishing men to establish a trail connecting the Old Oregon Trail with the recently established Ben Halliday stage line at Brigham, Utah. The daily schedule distance to be carried for each rider was about seventy-five miles.

Stations for fresh mounts were established some twenty-five miles apart from water to water. At first the postal rate charged was five dollars per half ounce, but this was later reduced to one dollar per ounce.

Trail Always 'Old'

The Old Oregon Trail was so called by the emigrants as they traveled because the Indians had used it for generations; and interesting is the fact that all trails had their beginning and ending in the Old Oregon Trail. These facts should

California in the spring of 1860, and by a strenuous drive through trip in nine days, reaching Salt Lake in six. This was indeed a revelation to the Mormon people of Utah, who had been accustomed to waiting for months for mail from the East. This service was discontinued the year following when transcontinental telegraph service was established.

The Idaho pony express continued to give service until the Ben Halliday stage line was established in 1864. The first supplies went into the Wood River country in 1860 when Kasaan, the packer, with forty mules loaded at Kelton, crossed the Snake river at the mouth of Goose Creek, being compelled to raft his cargo and swim the mules. Kasaan was loaded with supplies for the mines at the mouth of Warm Springs creek. Originally all Indian trails leading into the Old Oregon Trail were converted into wagon roads.

The Old Oregon Trail belongs to no favored section, but is a heritage of the state through which it passes. Let the people be as big as the motives which built it, by religiously preserving its location as designated by Ezra Meeker to the end that now, as in old Indian days, all trails will radiate from and merge into the Old Oregon Trail, the Mother of Trails.

Good Messenger Meets the Brown Family on the Oregon Trail

Situated on a little farm in the bluffly timbered banks of the Des Moines river in southern Iowa, Mr. and Mrs. Brown had raised a family of four children. The two elder were boys, one just twenty-one, the other sixteen months younger, and there was a girl of twelve and a little boy of six.

Their little farm would just support the family, and by hard work and strict economy they had managed to keep out of debt. The mother was worried for the future of her children, especially the boys. She wanted them to become farmers, have land of their own and live near her. There was no land to be taken in Iowa and she dreaded the idea of their leaving home to seek employment, which would be inevitable unless something was done to prevent it.

In the fall of 1865 a neighbor called to see her and introduced

ed a young man who had crossed the plains and visited Oregon. He told them of the government land that could be located; he described the rich soil, the beautiful climate, and the wonderful opportunities that lay waiting for brave hearts and strong hands in that far-off land of Oregon.

He also told them of the hardships that would be encountered in finding the plains, the danger of Indians, the dangers of crossing bridges and straits, and the untold accidents that might befall the inexperienced and unaccustomed emigrant. This all made a marked impression on Mrs. Brown and brought a ray of light for the future of her children.

After a few days of heart-to-heart talk, Mr. and Mrs. Brown decided to sell their little farm and their belongings excepting two teams and a wagon; and one bright spring morning in 1866, just before the sun rose over the eastern horizon, they drove their two teams and wagon loaded with necessities for camp life from the door of their home, where they had spent their youth in building for themselves, and where their children had been born and raised.

They were leaving bright memories and fond associations which brought tears to eyes that were only dried by the brave heart of the mother, whose only thought was for the future welfare of her family. She had seen mental pictures of having land adjoining the boys, where they would grow prosperous and become useful citizens under the guiding influence of a Christian mother.

Early Organized

The emigration from the middle states to Oregon and Washington Territories was very heavy in 1866, and before the Browns had traveled many days, they began falling into the company of other emigrants bound for the West. Some of these people were very congenial and they traveled in companies, which was considered necessary when the country settled country of the west was reached. The little party had to have some organization. Herders had to guard the cattle at night to prevent their being stampeded and leaving the emigrants helpless.

BALTUSROL GOLF CLUB, Springfield, N. J., June 6 (AP)—Blazing quiet championship records to bits in a heart-throbbing finish, dapper little Tony Manero, 31-year-old Italian-American professional, shot the greatest round of the tournament today to snatch the American open crown from "Lighthorse Harry" Cooper, the hard-luck man of golf by two-shot margin.

Four strokes back of Cooper, starting the final round, Manero came from behind in the stretch like a man o'war to capture the greatest 200-rod deby—win in a national title tournament. He ripped two strokes off the Baltusrol course with a 70 in the 18th hole under par, finished four shots under the former American record with a 72-hole total of 282, which is a world mark bettering by a stroke the best previous performance made in a British open championship.

Cooper Breaks Record They were getting ready to pay off on Cooper until Tony came out to hand "Lighthorse Harry" the most heart-breaking defeat of a career, studied with appointments in major competition. The Chicago professional, playing the finest golf of his career, turned in rounds of 71, 70, 70 and 73 for a total of 284 that had held him before his former record. It was a performance that figured to be a cinch to capture the title and the \$29,800 prize money of \$1,000, but the twin jinx went to Manero and Cooper again was just a runner-up, with second money of \$750.

After two days of the closest kind of competition, with the lead changing hands in a rapidity, the finish was strictly a horse-race as both Manero and Cooper finished well under the record. Manero's 282, which equaled in 1912, Garzeno who finished 14 shots back at 296, was one of his marks excelled as Manero's total surpassed the British record that came shares with Henry Cotton at 285.

Clark Finishes Fourth Third place went to the Bloomfield, New Jersey, bomber, Clarence Clark, a co-leader in the opening round, finishing with a 72 in the final round of 287. The veteran MacDonal Smith of Glendale, California, who had led the tournament for a century, shot final rounds of 72-70 for 288 and fourth place. Trailing at 290 were W. L. Latimer of Chicago, Wilby Cox of Washington, D. C., and Henry Picard of Hershey, Pennsylvania, the pre-tournament favorite.

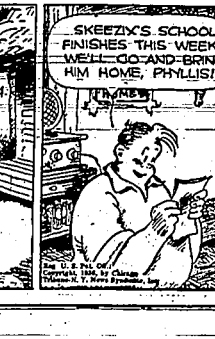

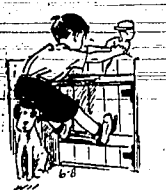
