Premier Leon Blum Demands Action On Strikers' New Deal

PARIS, June 9.—Leon Blum, declaring "every hour counts," demanded action on his labor new deal to cure a lingering strike fever today.

The socialist premier took his bills for a compulsory 40-hour week, paid vacations, collective labor contracts and pension out of cabinet to chamber of deputies.

Tonight the ministry of the interior announced the arrest of a number of strikers who were accused of carrying arms and attempting to influence strikers.

But the fourteenth day of the great strike saw the return of a militant socialist in a fight with local officials at a demonstration in front of the Chamber of Deputies.

Various strikes continued to partly paralyze the industrial life of the nation.

KIDNAPER RESIGNS HIMSELF TO DEATH

Arthur Gooch's Appeal for Executive Clemency Falls

MCALISTER, Okla., June 9 (AP)—Arthur Gooch, the man doomed to die under the Lindbergh law, resigned himself to death last night as his last resort in appeal to President Roosevelt for executive clemency failed.

Gooch is under sentence to be hanged at Oklahoma penitentiary June 19.

"The small time gunman," whose abduction of H. R. Marks and R. N. Baker, two Paris, Tex., officers, November 24, 1934, started him on the road to the gallows, lost hope as word of the presidential decision reached him in death row.

"There's nothing more to be done," he said.

The Tenth district circuit court of appeals at Denver upheld the death decree of Federal Judge Robert L. Williams.

The United States supreme court refused to review the case. W. F. Rampampall, Gooch's attorney, presented the case to the president.

Experts Better Break

"Death is death," commented Gooch gloomily. "It's something we all try to avoid as long as we can. But you won't find me afraid when the time comes."

The men whom Gooch was convicted of abducting were confident he was "getting what is coming to him."

At Chickasha, the state police officers in convention adopted a motion picture showing the general to the president and attorney general asking "no interference with the jury's verdict" in the Gooch case.

"It's had news for me," said Gooch. "I had been expecting a better break. When this all went up to Washington I just say change."

Gooch said he also believed the work of women's groups in his trip to California.

ASHBURN OFFERS NEW AMENDMENT

Senator Introduces Resolution Providing for Wide Powers

WASHINGTON, June 9 (AP)—A proposal to amend the constitution to empower congress "to regulate agriculture, commerce, industry and labor" was introduced yesterday in the senate by Chairman Ashburn (D-Ark.) of the judiciary committee.

Ashburn asked whether the suggestion, made on the eve of the national political conventions, had administration backing, said: "Nobody knew of it and nobody approved it."

The resolution said: "Section 1—Congress shall have power to make laws to regulate agriculture, commerce, industry and labor."

"Section 2—This article shall be operative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the constitution by the legislature of three-fourths of the several states, as provided in the constitution, within seven years from the date of the submission hereof, to the states by congress."

Ashburn said the measure would "grant to congress the power, within some limitations, to make such laws as were recently declared by the supreme court of the United States to be beyond the power of congress to enact."

Mrs. Shelby and Mrs. Fillmore told the court through their attorneys that a satisfactory settlement had been reached.

Following dismissal of the suit, brief testimony was taken in an attempt to obtain a judgment against Leslie B. Henry, Guy-time agent for Blyth and Company, who pleaded guilty to embezzling the Minter money and is serving a prison term.

Judge Emmet Wilson took the case against Henry under advisement. Henry is due to be released from prison next July.
