Hailed As Platform Victor, Borah Plans To Contact Idahoans

CLEVELAND, June 11—A drive to return William E. Borah to the senate began tonight as he withdrew from the presidential race and threw his support to Governor Landon.

BORAH SILENT ON CAMPAIGN PLANS

Idaho Solon Still 'Question Mark' of Coming Republican Drive

CLEVELAND, June 11 (AP)—Senator Borah of Idaho tonight boarded a train for Washington, a defeated candidate for the Republican nomination, an apparent victor in his fight for "progressive" platform planks—but still the political question mark of the coming campaign.

Donald A. Callahan of Wallace, who was to have nominated the senator for the presidency, said Borah's action as aimed at party harmony.

CLEVELAND, June 11—Governor Landon of Kansas added tonight to the platform of the Republican convention a personal declaration for a gold backed currency and a constitutional amendment, if necessary, to permit state regulation of wages and hours.

Republican Platform

CLEVELAND, June 11 (AP)—The text of the Republican platform follows: "The Platform of the Republican Party. 1936. America is in peril. The welfare of American men and women and the future of our youth are at stake. We dedicate ourselves to the preservation of their political liberty, their individual opportunity and their character as free citizens, which today for the first time are threatened by government—itsself."

ABOARD ROOSEVELT TRAIN EN ROUTE TO DALLAS, Texas, June 11 (AP)—Texas welcomed President Roosevelt with a roaring "yipe" today and the chief executive responded with a warm tribute of admiration for its rebellion against Mexico.

At San Antonio where he placed his hat at the Alamo, and at San Jacinto battlefield, near Houston, the chief executive extolled the principle of the Alamo and the heroism of San Jacinto.

Without the inspiration of the great Republic, the Alamo—the great Southwest might never have become a part of the nation," he said.

CLEVELAND (By The Associated Press) CONVENTION HALL, Cleveland, June 11—In a tremendous demonstration of enthusiasm, and with only 19 votes in opposition, the Republican national convention tonight nominated Governor Alf M. Landon of Kansas for the presidency.

CLEVELAND THROUGH IN HOLIDAY MOOD

Banners Appear From Every Where as Delegates Honor Landon

CLEVELAND, June 11 (AP)—Delegates to the Republican national convention were in a holiday mood tonight as they gathered for the adoption of the platform and nomination of Governor Landon as the party's presidential candidate.

Leaders were cheered as word swept to the convention hall that no minority report had been submitted on the platform.

"Prayer" was offered by the Rev. James W. Brown of New York, New York, minister of the New Mother A. M. E. Zion church.

"We will nominate a president tonight," said Chairman Berntsen, indicating that he intended to hold the delegates in session until that stage of the proceedings had been completed.

Three men dressed in overalls and farm hand straw hats, carried a huge banner around the hall. It proclaimed the election of Landon, the "Evergreen state," "we want Landon."

DEPUTIES APPROVE BLUM'S MEASURES

PARIS, June 11 (AP)—The chamber of deputies by overwhelming majority approved tonight a set of social reform bills designed to end widespread strikes.

The chamber hurriedly voted laws giving the workers paid vacations, exempting war veterans from certain taxes, and providing for cuts of government employees and providing for collective labor contracts.

Landon's voice shook as he read the telegram from the mayor of Independence, his home town. After his brief remarks he introduced Mrs. Landon, who was given a tremendous ovation. She smiled, waved a hand and the crowd yelled "speech!" she stepped to the microphone.

"I wish you all—" her voice faltered. He waved to the crowd again and said, "I just can't talk." Soon several hundred persons were assembled upon the dome of the capitol, bathed in floodlights. Another, male and drum corps arrived for the night.

Overhead an airplane, switching a powerful searchlight about the city, dived in circles. Automobile lights flashed back at it.

Four Republican Stalwarts Relinquish Chances For Presidential Nomination

CLEVELAND, June 11 (AP)—A quartet of stalwart Republicans, each of whom had been put forward by supporters as the man to direct the nation for the next four years, today lost their chances for the presidential nomination, today in the face of an overpowering pro-Roosevelt tide.

For at least one of them—Borah of Idaho—if undoubtedly meant that he was relinquishing his last hope of living in the White House. In 18 days he will be 71.

The others—Senators Vandenberg of Michigan and Dickinson of Iowa and Colonel Frank Knox, the Chicago publisher, are younger. Four years hence will still find them among the eligibles, so far as age is concerned.

At 9:30 a. m. Vandenberg, 52-

year-old outspoken anti-new dealer, released Michigan's 18 delegates to the Sunflower state's candidate.

Vandenberg had contended all-along that he was not a candidate.

Twenty minutes after Vandenberg's announcement, Senator Dickinson likewise eliminated himself. The white-haired 62-year-old Iowan has been active principally in farm-relief efforts during his congressional career.

Borah, who has been in the senate since 1907 and is the oldest member in point of service, was next. He released 21 Wisconsin delegates, 19 from Oregon and eight from Idaho.

Long a power in national politics and international affairs, Borah had been actively campaigning for the presidency. He insisted, however,

he was more interested in the platform than his own candidacy.

Once he had a chance to become vice-president, Calvin Coolidge, when the New Englander was in the White House, asked him how he would like to "accept a place on the ticket." Borah's laconic query "which place?" terminated the discussion.

Knox' announcement was made through former Vice President

Charles G. Dawes of Chicago. Dawes said the publisher had released his votes within the Illinois delegation—to allow them, to vote for Lettison.

Knox' principal activity has been in connection with newspapers. He is 62.

Others who released delegates were Robert A. Taft of Ohio and Federal Judge T. M. Meekins of North Carolina.

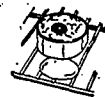

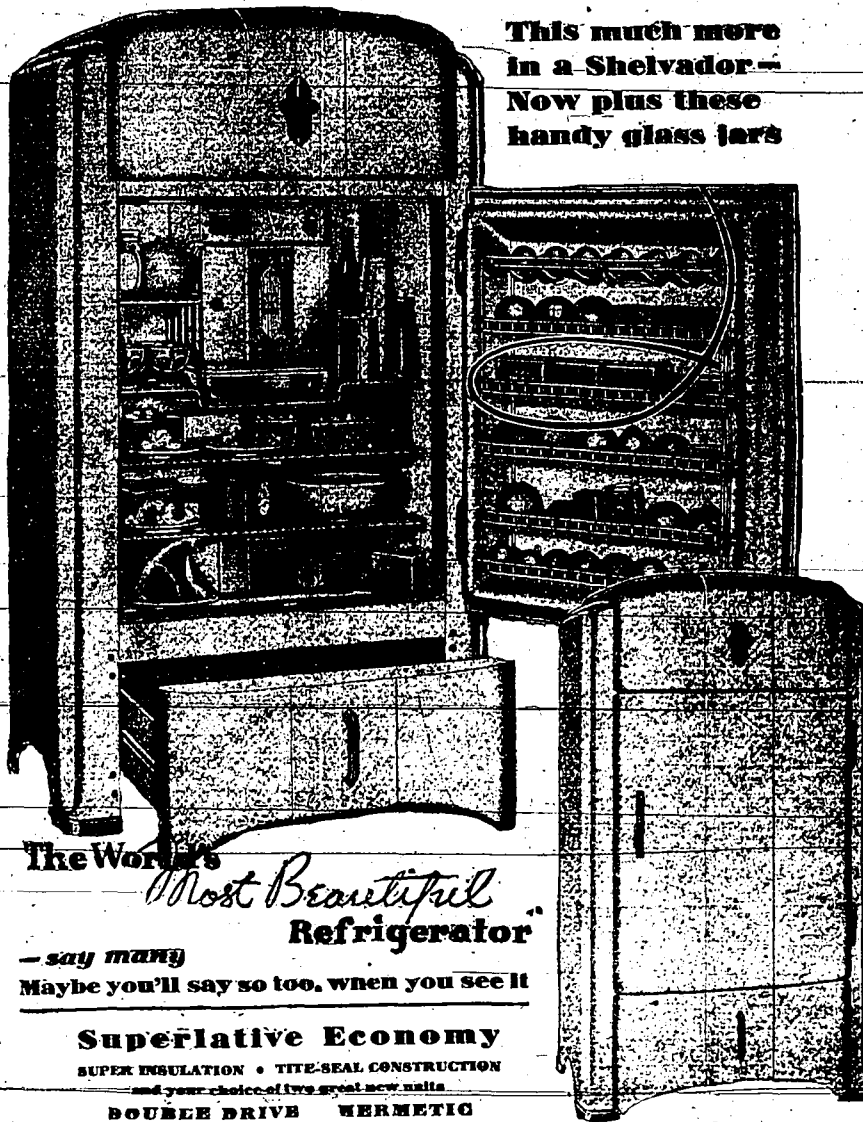

COUNCIL RECEIVES HIGH SCOUT AWARD

Burley, Kimberly and Twin Falls Troops Win Ten-Year Program Honor

Snake River Area council, Boy Scouts of America, last night announced receipt of word from the chief scout executive, Dr. James E. West, that it has qualified for the ten-year program award which is awarded each year to those councils making progress toward the ultimate goal of the ten-year program of scouting.

This program was adopted by the national council of the Boy Scouts of America in 1924 setting certain objectives to be attained by 1942. Main objective of the program is to conduct the scouting program that each year starting with 1942, one out of every four of the new male citizens will have ten years of character and citizenship training in scouting.

Citizens Objective

In the Snake River area council there are approximately 892 boys belonging to 10 troops in each year. The objective of the council for 1935 was to enroll 255 of these. Actually there were 270. In 1934 the objective was to enroll 200. Actually there were 210. On the basis of present plans 215 scouts will reach their fourth year in scouting during 1942 and each year thereafter.

Three troops in the area, Burley and Kimberly Methodist troops and the Twin Falls Presbyterian troop, have won the ten-year program award for 1935 and the Elks troop of Burley has filed application for the award.

A WARM WEATHER ROOM White Gives That Cool Feeling Of Expanse

National Weed Control Office Urged at Boise

BOISE, June 11 (AP)—After adopting a resolution urging establishment of a national weed control office in the federal plant industry bureau, delegates to the 18th annual western plant quarantine board conference adjourned today to hear speakers at a meeting on standardization problems.

The board passed the weed control resolution after electing E. G. Grimmer of Olympia, Washington state supervisor of horticulture, president and selecting Phoenix, Arizona, as the 1937 meeting.

Duties of the weed office were outlined to be: Research to determine satisfactory and economical methods of noxious weed eradication; establishment of uniformity in defining noxious weeds; control of noxious weeds and prevention of movement of noxious weed seed.

Eleven western states, Hawaii, Mexico and Canada were represented.

The board also adopted a resolution calling for abandonment of the screening-of-potatoes-for-altaia which to obtain inspection certificates.

The fifth annual meeting of the western states standardization officials got under way with F. Lee Johnson, Idaho commissioner of agriculture, urging close cooperation, careful discussion and study of standardization problems.

The meeting will write its conclusions into resolutions today and adjourn, Earl Hutchins of Salt Lake City, president of the conference, said.

Growers Give Pledge To Relief Agencies

BOISE, June 11 (AP)—Idaho farmers at a meeting called by Governor O. Benn Ross adopted resolutions today calling for cooperation of agriculture with the federal and state relief agencies in providing needy workers with labor.

The meeting was attended by 50 representatives of growers of fruit, peas, potatoes, onions and beets.

W. L. Hood, WPA director, and John Foreman of Pocatello, manager of the United States employment service, explained procedure farmers must follow in obtaining assistance from federal agency Foreman heads.

Monsoon Strikes Mountain Climbers

Today's Wedding Customs Started When Cave Man Snatched A Mate

NEW YORK (AP)—The bride-maid, marriage rings and shower of rice which mark the modern bride's wedding day originate in customs dating all the way from cave men to knights of the middle ages.

Centuries ago marriage by capture was the rule. Primitive man stole his bride from a neighboring tribe and carried her off to his cave, regarding her as a trophy that belonged to his courage and prowess.

The savage best man and colorful bridemaids who will take part in wedding ceremonies believed in the survival of the fittest when the would-be bridegroom's friends

helped him make his "getaway" with his bride and the bride relatives tried to prevent the theft.

The wedding ring tradition is also credited to prehistoric days. Though its real origin is unknown, many authorities believe it dates from the ancient custom of primitive man to wear a cord and bind it around the waist of the woman he wanted, in the belief that her spirit entered his body when the ring was performed. It was a token of productive-ness and they showered it on a newly married pair as a symbol of fruitfulness for "stirring up" the new couple by throwing old shoes after the bride and her new husband is more obscure; many think it signifies a change of authority.

It is generally conceded that the misty tales and filmy lace used today for the bridal veil have their origin in the custom of primitive peoples to keep the bride hidden from the bridegroom's sight until

the wedding day. The orange blossoms twisted in so many veils are considered a portent of good luck and happiness.

Medieval custom is believed to be responsible for the inclusion of the flower girls and their baskets of fragrant blossoms in the modern wedding pageant.

In the middle ages it was customary for two little girls to walk in front of the bride procession, carrying in their paths the grains which symbolized the wish that the union would prove fruitful and the flower girl attendance has gradually evolved from it.




