### HERO OF SOVIETS CALLED BY DEATH

#### Maxim Gorky—Outstanding Revolutuonist Author, Succumbs

MOSCOW, June 18 (AP)—Maxim Gorky, 68, one-time rag-picker and one of the great writers to be born in Russia, died today of pneumonia. The world famous novelist had been ill for ten days.

Gorky had the lung, the other having been destroyed by a tuberculous infection after he had been a sufferer of the disease for years. Pneumonia set in in the single lung, following an attack of influenza.

Although not a member of the Communist party, Gorky held a prominent position in Soviet literature. He was a former member of the central executive committee.

Privileged Person

Gorky had a special residence here—a privilege accorded only a few. Recently he had been writing plays and articles for newspapers which were criticized by Soviet writers for a lack of imagination and a style of "reminiscent of a school teacher."

The world's largest land air liner, the Maxim Gorky, which crashed at the mouth of the Lena river, was named for the author.

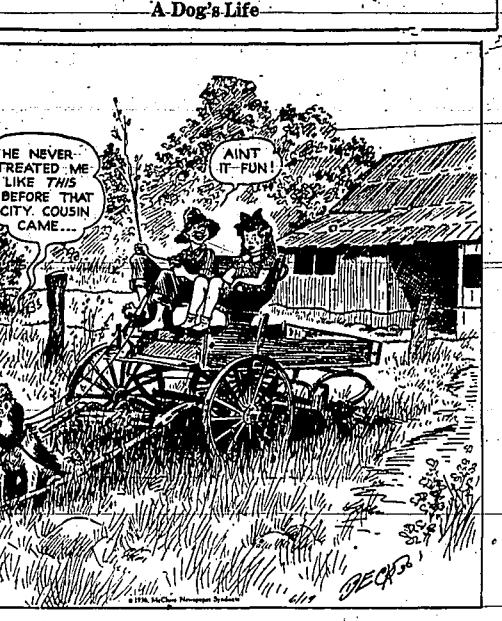

### Hospitable Jail Reports Lure Slayer to Gooding

Gallimore Blames 'Accidental' Killing To Series Of Minor Events

Gallimore stated that he had been employed in a furniture store in Galax for the past 14 years and that he had a wife and two children, who are now with his parents at Jackson Ferry, Va.

"According to my story," a series of events, beginning with a minor accident, were responsible for his predicament. In this incident he was driving a car with a minor accident. While recuperating from this he was making an addition to his house which he was buying on credit. It was on a visit to Bower's restaurant to see a painter, Wayne Delmar, that he encountered the man for whose death the law is holding him responsible.

BRITAIN SHELVES SANCTIONS POLICY

Laborites Jeer Eden's Announcement of Government Decision

LONDON, June 18 (AP)—The British government, as laborites jeered, announced today a tentative decision to remove sanctions from Italy in an attempt to stave off a European war.

Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin, asserting collective security has failed, ended bitter debate by calling for a peace understanding between Britain, Germany and France.

Anthony Eden, handsomely young foreign secretary, advocated "white knight of Geneva," blushed when opposition members shouted "shame! shame!" as he explained Britain's about face on sanctions.

Lloyd George thundered: "There is nothing but anarchy as an alternative; there will be no international anarchy the moment this is known."

Eden, visibly angered by opposition heeds, retorted: "The honorable members are making cheap gibes."

Both Eden and Baldwin warned peace may be lost and nothing could be gained if the old policy of sanctions is maintained.

Labor will move for a vote to censure when debate is resumed Tuesday at 11 a. m. Mr. Eden, labor leader, announced.

Collective Security Falls. Asserting collective security has failed, Baldwin said: "If possible, it shall not fall again."

Eden, who said he would not support a vote to censure, said: "We, as trustees of the people, will pay for it on the first night with their lives."

The part Germany can play for good or evil in Europe is immense, he added.

Among those who heard the debate was Dino Grandi, the Italian ambassador.

W.C.T.U. Decides To Study Politics

TULSA, Okla., June 18 (AP)—Closing its national convention, the Women's Christian Temperance Union urged by resolution today a study of "the place and power of the political party."

"Since prohibition was lost through lack of party support and repeal was won by party support, we declare that the commitment of a party to both the law and its enforcement is necessary."

Calling it "our citizenship resolution," the national president, Mrs. Ida B. Wells Smith, of Evanston, Ill., amplified.

"The national body cannot pledge its members for any candidate or party. We never could get our members, of all shades of political opinion, to agree to that. We wouldn't if they wanted to."

There is no chance that we would support, as a national organization, either the Republicans, the Democrats or the prohibition party."

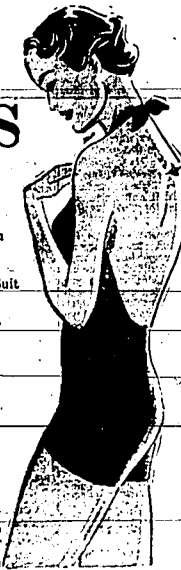

ROOSEVELT'S STATE CLAIMED FOR G. O. P. Hamilton Rallies Eastern Republicans In N. Y. Conferences

NEW YORK, June 18 (AP)—President Roosevelt's home state of New York was claimed for the Republicans by National Chairman John D. Hamilton tonight as he went over the situation with state and local leaders.

Commenting on Governor Herbert Lehman's recent announcement that he would not seek a third term, Hamilton said: "I don't think Governor Lehman will carry New York state whether Lehman runs or not."

Hamilton's reports (in the New York Sun) that the Democrats might try to prevail on Governor Lehman to resign, and his own strength to their ticket by running again and then resigning if re-elected brought this comment from Hamilton:

"I think Mr. Roosevelt needs all the help he can get in New York state and I wouldn't blame him for trying to set up an artificial candidacy here."

"But neither Governor Lehman nor any eye else can save Roosevelt in New York state."

Concedes Big States. The suburban-haired young Republican chief, who flew in last night after conferring at Topk with Governor Alf M. Landon and Colonel Frank G. Knox, expressed admiration for the state campaign contributions were pouring in.

Rev. B. J. Bingle, Former Twin Falls Teacher And Now Matanuska Church Head, Visits Here

Describing the Matanuska valley colony near Anchorage, Alaska, as "definitely on the road to success" and to a bright future, Rev. B. J. Bingle, former Twin Falls resident and in charge of Protestant religious work at the colony, came to Twin Falls last night for a two-day visit with old acquaintances.

Rev. Bingle is on the return trip to Alaska following attendance at the general assembly of the Presbyterian church in Philadelphia last week. Accompanied by Mrs. Bingle and their two children, Della, 10, and Jimmy, 8, and Guy Clark of West Virginia, he is visiting at the home of Mr. and Mrs. G. M. Simpson. Rev. Bingle will speak and show pictures of the colony and of church progress in Alaska at a meeting at the Twin Falls Presbyterian church at eight o'clock this evening.

Five Points

"The colony has every prospect of success," he said. "There are five things which will assure success—a market, soil, climate, people and government. The market, soil and climate were already there and the people and government have been provided."

"The market is of the best. Alaskan towns have been shipping provisions in from Seattle and a large share of these products are now being grown and marketed from the colony. The market possibilities are unlimited. The soil is the finest in the world and the climate is adapted for the growing of almost every

### ROSS POINTS TO DEBT REDUCTION

Idaho Governor Predicts No Ad Valorem Tax This Year

CRAIGMONT, Idaho, June 18 (AP)—Governor C. Ben Ross of Idaho told a pioneer picnic gathering here today the state debt has been reduced under his administration from eight to two and a half million dollars, and taxes have been reduced "all along the line."

Governor Ross, who is expected to seek William E. Borah's senate seat, came here from Boise with G. P. Mix, lieutenant governor, a candidate for the Democratic nomination for governor, and Homer Moore, a member of the state liquor control board. The governor will return to Boise tonight.

"In the biennium of 1929-30," the governor declared, "the operating cost of the state was \$16,854,228. While in the biennium of 1933-34, the cost was reduced to \$10,977,009, or a saving of \$4,887,219. These figures mean that under my administration a saving of 29 1/2 per cent

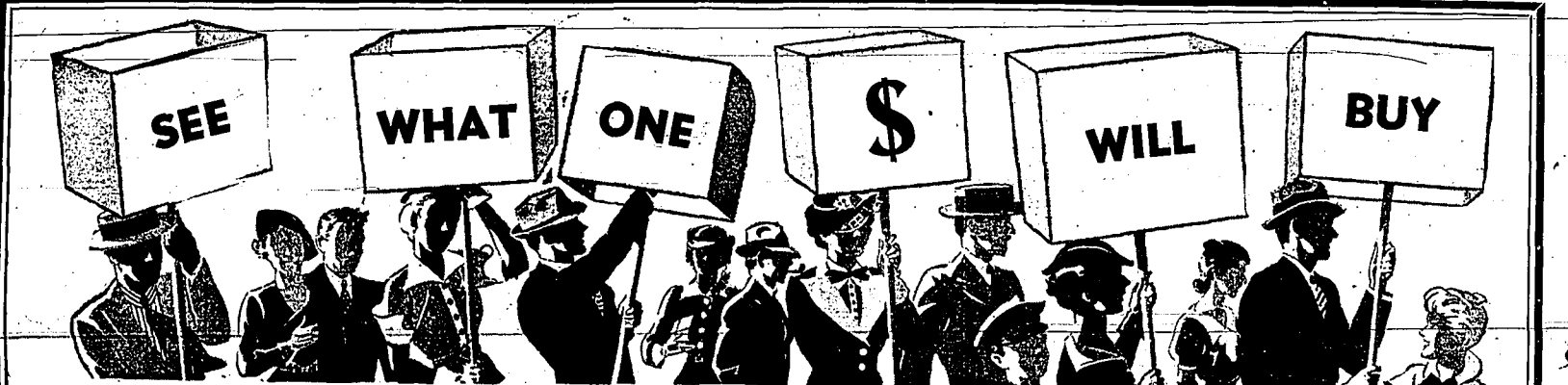
