12 CHILDREN LOSE LIVES WHEN BOAT CAPSIZES IN LAKE

## Colorful New Vegetables Invite Food Adventuring

It's a real thrill to plan menus in June for a treat there is something to "go on." Vegetables, new and tempting, fragrant fruits in such bounty that a cook's only difficulty lies in deciding which to choose. Let's plan a luncheon that will utilize some of the wealths of the garden—one that will be as beautiful as it is tempting.

- Pineapple Bavarian Cream**  
 1 1/2 cup cold water  
 1 cup grated pineapple, drained  
 1/2 cup sugar  
 1 1/2 cup lemon juice  
 1 1/2 cups heavy cream  
 Lady fingers  
 1 also crystallized pineapple
- Place cold water in a bowl and sprinkle with gelatine. Allow to stand a few minutes, place over hot water and stir until gelatine dissolves. Mix together grated pineapple, lemon juice, sugar and dissolved gelatine. Chill until mixture begins to thicken. Fold in whipped cream and fill sherbet glasses lined with lady fingers. Top with crystallized pineapple. Chill until firm.
- Peanut Wafers**  
 1/2 pound brown sugar  
 3 even tbsp. flour  
 1/2 tsp. baking powder  
 1/2 tsp. salt  
 1/2 lb. pecan-meats—broken—but not chopped.  
 2 eggs  
 Beat eggs, then add sugar, salt and flour and lastly the nuts. Drop very small teaspoonful on buttered and oiled paper in a modern oven until brown. Remove from pan—so soon as baked.

 Chicken Loaf  
 Baked Potatoes  
 Jellied Vegetable Salad

**Letuce Soup**  
 2 tbsp. butter  
 2 cups chopped onion  
 2 tbsp. flour  
 2 cups canned bouillon  
 1/2 tsp. salt  
 1/2 tsp. pepper  
 1/2 tsp. paprika  
 2 cups evaporated milk  
 1/2 cups chopped lettuce (outside leaves)

Melt the butter in a saucepan, add the onion and cook until soft. Add the flour and seasonings and blend well. Gradually add the bouillon, stirring constantly to prevent lumping. Cook over a low flame for 10 minutes, add the milk and lettuce; bring to boiling point and serve at once.

- Chicken Loaf**  
 2 tbsp. fat  
 1/2 cup chopped mushrooms  
 1/2 cup stale bread crumbs  
 2 cup milk  
 2 eggs  
 1 cup chopped cooked chicken.  
 Few drops onion juice  
 1/2 tsp. salt  
 Few grains salt  
 Few grains nutmeg  
 Shredded almonds  
 1/2 tsp. chopped parsley
- Melt fat, add mushrooms, stir, cook 2 minutes, add bread crumbs and milk, again stir and cook 2 minutes. Add egg yolks and beat well, then add chicken, parsley, seasonings. Fold in egg whites, beaten stiff. Put a piece of wax paper in bottom of pan, pour mixture place in pan of hot water, bake 35 to 45 minutes in moderate oven. Turn out and serve with white sauce made with chicken stock and cream. If desired sprinkle with shredded almonds pan-fried in salad oil.

- Jellied Vegetable Salad**  
 Soak 3 tablespoons of gelatine in cold water 5 minutes. Boil 1 quart canned tomatoes and 2 or 3 slices of onion for 5 minutes, strain through a sieve, pour the hot tomato juice over the softened gelatine and stir until dissolved. Add 1/2 teaspoon salt and 1/2 teaspoon sugar and chill. When the gelatine is partly set add 1 tablespoon green pepper, 2 tablespoons celery, 1 tablespoon parsley, 1 cup cabbage, all finely-chopped. Add more salt if needed. If the mixture is not fast enough add a little lemon juice or vinegar. Pour into wet custard cups and place in refrigerator to set. Turn out on crisp lettuce leaves and serve with mayonnaise.
- Rolled Cheese Biscuits**  
 Roll out baking powder biscuit dough to an oblong strip. Spread with cheese and sprinkle with paprika. Roll up and chill in refrigerator. Cut off slices and bake in a hot oven about 10 minutes.

- Crab-Meat Canapes**  
 18 one-inch bread circles  
 1/2 cup crab-meat  
 1/2 cup finely chopped celery  
 1 teaspoon finely chopped green pepper  
 1 teaspoon chopped pimiento  
 1/2 teaspoon salt  
 3 tablespoons salad dressing  
 2 tablespoons soft butter  
 Place bread on shallow pan, spread with rest of ingredients, combined. When ready to serve, heat in moderate oven until canapes are light brown. Serve immediately. The tops can be garnished with bits of egg yolk (hard cooked) pressed through a sieve, and with rings of pimiento-stuffed olives.
- Zucchini Cups**  
 1 cup rolled zwieback  
 3 tablespoons flour  
 1/2 teaspoon celery salt  
 1/2 teaspoon pepper  
 1/2 teaspoon finely chopped onion  
 2 tablespoons butter, melted  
 2 cup hot milk  
 2 cups egg yolks  
 2 egg whites, beaten  
 Mix ingredients. Fill buttered baking cups and bake 15 minutes in moderate oven. Unmold and remove part-of-centers, fill and surround with creamed mushrooms and peas.
- Creamed Mushrooms and Peas**  
 4 tablespoons butter  
 1-2 cups milk  
 1 cup cooked peas  
 2-3 cup cooked mushrooms  
 1-2 teaspoon salt  
 1/2 teaspoon paprika  
 1/2 teaspoon celery salt  
 Melt butter and add flour. When mixed, add milk and cook until creamy sauce forms. Stir constantly. Add rest of ingredients and cook 2 minutes.

## Millions of Women Will Observe National Jelly Making Week July 6



Little women and big are thinking of observing a community gesture of kindness and helpfulness, National Jelly Making Week, will be observed this summer from July 6th to 13th.

Alone, or working with fellow members of a club or church or society, every homemaker can follow the neighborly example of the General Federation of Women's Clubs, the Girl Scouts and the Camp Fire Girls by taking part in the festivities of the week of July 6th. It's simple, easy and not at all costly.

Plan to make up a batch of one or more kinds of jelly and jam during National Jelly Making Week. Then give it to some worthwhile local institution or a needy family. Better still, persuade your own club or church society to launch a jelly project for the week of July 6th. If you're right you wouldn't pay ten cents for a tinning glass of food, homemade marmalade or jelly.

National Jelly Making Week is the "housewife's good will week." These recipes make it easy to do a community service:

- Blueberry Jam**  
 4 1/2 cups (1 1/2 lbs.) fresh fruit  
 1 cup (1/2 lb.) sugar  
 1/2 bottle fruit pectin  
 To prepare jam, crush about 1/2 quart fully ripe berries. Add grated rind from 1/2 lemon and juice from medium lemon.  
 Prepare sugar and prepared fruit into large kettle, mix well, and bring to a full rolling boil over hottest fire, constantly stirring and while boiling, boil hard 2 minutes. Remove from fire and stir in bottled fruit pectin. Boil for quickly. Parefin hot, let at once. Makes about 12 glasses (8 fluid ounces each).
- Cherry Berry Jelly**  
 1 cup (1/2 lb.) fruit  
 4 cups (1 1/2 lb.) sugar  
 1/2 bottle fruit pectin  
 To prepare jelly, stem (do not pit) and crush about 2 1/2 pounds of ripe cherries. Add 1/2 cup water, bring to a boil and simmer, covered, 10 minutes. If a stronger cherry flavor is desired, add a few crushed cherry pits during simmering. Place fruit in jelly cloth or bag and squeeze out juice. If there is a slight shortage of juice, add small amount of water to put in jelly cloth and squeeze again.  
 Measure sugar, dry dish and stir until needed. Measure juice into a quart sized saucepan and bring over hottest fire. Add powdered fruit pectin, mix well and continue stirring until mixture comes to a hard ball. Add cold water and continue stirring. Continue stirring, bring to a full rolling boil and boil hard 1 minute. Remove from fire, skim, pour quickly. Boil for hot at once. Makes about 12 glasses (8 fluid ounces each).

## TASTY MEAT GARNISH

An effective and tasty garnish for roasts, chops, fowl or in salads, served either hot or cold, is capcided mint apple balls. Cut balls from apples which have been peeled. Boil 2 cups sugar, 1 1/4 cups water, 1/2 teaspoon onion, flavoring and green fruit coloring 3 minutes. Add apple balls, about 18 is right for this recipe, and simmer 15 minutes, turning frequently with fork. Remove balls from syrup and serve.

Add sufficient coloring to the boiling syrup to give the desired green tint. Other shades can be used if a color scheme is being carried out in the menu, but avoid too high or unusual colors. Green, red or yellow are preferred.

- Mix half of mayonnaise with rest of ingredients. Chill. Serve on crisp lettuce and top with rest of mayonnaise. Sprinkle with paprika and insert tiny sprigs of cream. Sprinkle top with capers if desired.
- Brides' Cake (3 Layers)**  
 2 1/2 cup butter  
 2 cups sugar  
 1 cup milk  
 1 teaspoon vanilla  
 1/2 teaspoon almond extract  
 1/2 teaspoon rose extract  
 1/2 teaspoon salt  
 3 cups pastry flour  
 3 tablespoons baking powder
- Cream butter until very soft, add sugar and beat until creamy. Add milk extracts, salt, flour and baking powder. Beat 2 minutes. Fold in whites, mix lightly and pour into 3 layer cake pans lined with waxed paper. Bake 20 minutes in moderate oven. Cool and frost.

1 cup water  
 1/2 teaspoon salt  
 2 egg whites, beaten  
 1 teaspoon vanilla  
 1/2 teaspoon almond extract  
 1/2 teaspoon lemon extract

Boil slowly and without stirring, the sugar, vinegar and water. When three-fourths forms when portion of syrup is slowly poured from spoon in fine stream into beaten egg whites, add salt and beat vigorously until frosting is thick, creamy and cool. Add extracts and frost cake.

Additional ornamental frosting, (lined, pink, pale green or other hue, may be squeezed on with piping tube.

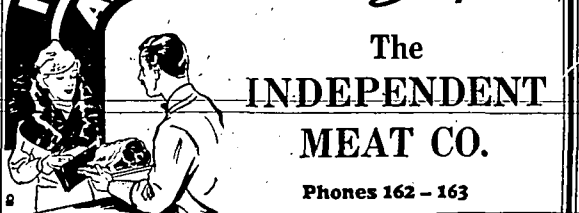

FRANK E. WILSON DIES IN OREGON

Former Kimberly Merchant Succumbs to Heart Disease in Ontario

KIMBERLY, June 19—Frank E. Wilson, pioneer of Kimberly, and member of the Wilson Brothers mercantile firm, died this morning at the Holy Rosary hospital, Ontario, Oregon, where he went ten days ago for treatment. He had been suffering from a heart disease for the past four years.

The body will be received at the White mortuary. Funeral arrangements have not been completed, pending word from relatives in Oklahoma City.

Mr. Wilson was born January 6, 1875, in Stockholm, Nebraska, and moved to the farm in Illinois in 1894. He came to Kimberly in 1913. He retired from the Wilson Brothers mercantile firm in 1928 and operated a ranch southeast of Kimberly.

Mr. Wilson married Miss Oraco Belleville, Twin Falls, in 1921, and later married Miss Flo Henry in October, 1922. He is survived by his wife; three brothers, R. O. and G. A. Wilson, Kimberly, and Harry W. Wilson, Twin Falls; and three cousins, Mrs. F. A. Burkhalter, Jerome; Mrs. Carl Boyd, Twin Falls, and Mrs. C. C. Dunn, Aberdeen.

while, the nova was found last night by Pelletier.

Dr. Zwicky said it has been suspected for some time that the strange cosmic rays travel faster than light. The information received from observer Clay at Amsterdam is the hour angle of his May 21 cosmic ray observation. It establishes beyond doubt that the radiations of that date were from this nova. It will mark a new milestone in astronomical discoveries.

Dr. William H. Wright of Lick observatory, Pasadena, described the star as 75 times as bright as the brightest star visible to the naked eye.

From Yerkes observatory at Williams Bay, Wis., Dr. Otto Struve said the new star, which blazed suddenly before Pelletier's telescope, is of "unusual intensity" because of the rate of speed of its explosion.

Dr. George Van Biesbroeck of Yerkes observatory computed—the speed of explosion at the rate of 500 miles a second—10 times as fast as a nova discovered in December, 1924—and estimated that it was about two to three thousand light years away.

From his crude observatory, built near his home, Pelletier has gained recognition as one of the world's most distinguished amateur astronomers.

He has discovered three comets, one only a month ago, and shared in the discovery of other astronomical phenomenon.

BEETS OMITTED IN NEW SUGAR QUOTAS

WASHINGTON, June 19 (AP)—An increase of 203,002 tons in the 1936 sugar quotas, the result of an upward revision of the year's consumption requirements of the American market, was announced today by the agricultural adjustment administration.

The increase was the second this year under authority given Secretary Wallace by the existing Jones-Costigan act and the "stop gap" resolution passed this week by congress.

Because of a production deficiency of 207,491 tons, the marketing quota of the domestic beet area remains at 1,550,000 tons, but the allotment of the Louisiana-Florida area was raised to 150,000 tons.

The revised quotas for the offshore areas in short tons, raw value, follows: Hawaii, 1,038,000 tons; Puerto Rico, 822,000 tons; Philippines, 1,098,738 tons; Virgin Islands, 5,792; Cuba, 2,030,249; foreign countries other than Cuba, 22,222.

The following amounts may be brought in as direct-consumption sugar: Cuba, 448,857 short tons; Philippines, 302,100 short tons; 033; Hawaii, 20,816.

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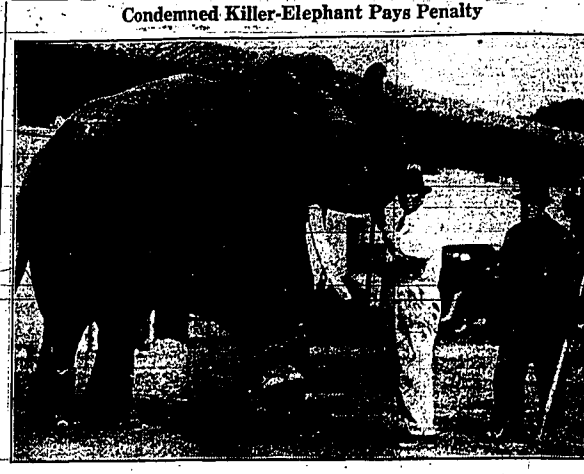

DEFENSE MAPPED FOR PHILIPPINES

MacArthur Counts on Speed on-Sea and in Air, Army and Reserve

MANILA, Philippines (AP)—Major General Douglas MacArthur, former United States chief of staff, gave this young commonwealth a defense plan today—"to give pause to the most ruthless and powerful."

General MacArthur, principal military adviser to the Philippine government, recommended an economic set-up for "an active and carefully planned defense of every foot of shore line in the inhabited islands of the Archipelago."

It envisages an expenditure of \$300,000,000 during the first ten years of its operation, to be appropriated in yearly installments of \$30,000,000. The Philippines will obtain complete independence within that period.

FARMER ACCUSED OF BANK ROBBERY

Washington Wheat Grower Faces Charge in U. S. Court

SPOKANE, June 10 (AP)—Frank Baird, prominent Spangne wheat grower, and other persons unknown were charged specifically in federal court today of robbing the Rosalia State bank, kidnaping the cashier, and killing town marshal Bert Lemley.

Baird was arrested at his farm a week ago. A \$30,000 bond was ordered, but Baird could not find the amount, and was shot in the back by a man waiting in a car. The robbers forced Matthew Elliott, cashier to accompany them for several miles. The federal government entered the case because the Rosalia State bank is a member of the federal reserve system.

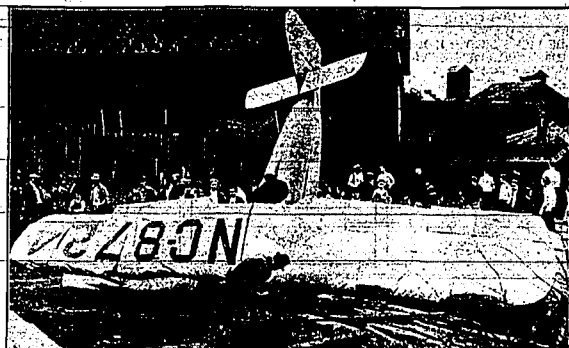

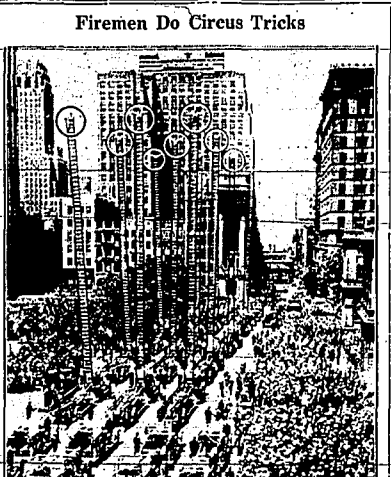

DEPUTY ARRIVES TO RETURN GALLIMORE

GOODING, June 19.—Deputy Sheriff L. O. Jones of Carroll county, Virginia, arrived here today to return Lawrence D. Gallimore, 38,

to Virginia to face a charge of first degree murder following the death of Porter Elymore at Galax, Virginia, November 9, 1935. Gallimore voluntarily gave himself up to Sheriff Wayne Plack here June 19, claiming that he acted in self defense and was going back to face the music. He waited extradition. Jones expects to leave here Saturday with his prisoner.

PACKERS SUE FOR REFUND OF TAXES

Attack Opens on Billion Dollars of Impounded Processing Levies

CHICAGO, June 19 (AP)—Legal actions seeking approximately \$30,000,000 and the answer from two different directions to a question left open by the supreme court's invalidation of the AAA last January were started today by two of the "Big Four" packers.

The question the court did not rule on in its historic decree involved the billion or more dollars collected from packers and other processors before the several hundred suits attacking the AAA's constitutionality brought widespread impounding of their contributions.

Counsel for Cudaby explained that while the supreme court had ordered that \$200,000,000 or more collected under the AAA and impounded last year while decision on its constitutionality was pending, should be returned to the processors the court had not raised the issue of disposition of the much larger sum — approximately \$1,000,000,000 — which had been paid in previously under the act later held illegal.

A provision of the old AAA had declared that taxes might be recovered only by a showing by the processors that they had been unable to pay the tax on to the consumer. This provision was not specifically ruled on.

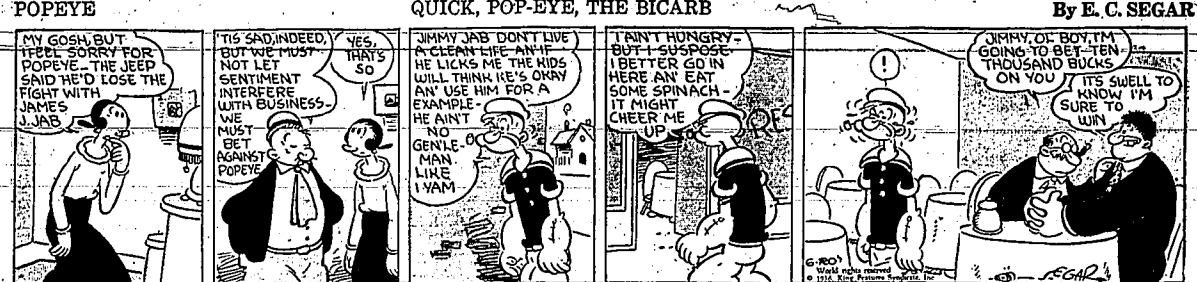

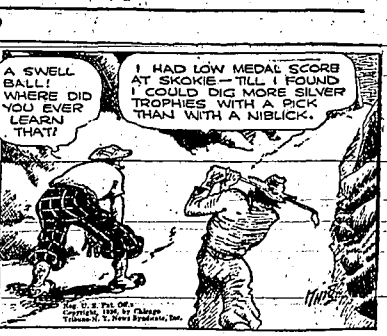
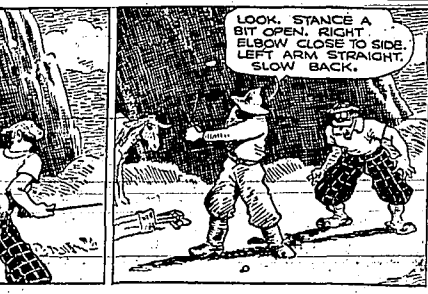
