MURDER-CHARGED MAN RESTS CASE

Matrimonial and Business Altercations Urged as Provocation

CASCADE, Idaho, June 24 (AP)—The defense rested its case tonight in the trial of Frank Lobear, 51, charged with the murder of Walter Estep, 47, a fellow Valley county miner.

Chief defense attorney, former State Senator George Donast of Weiser, predicted the case will be placed in the hands of the jury by noon tomorrow.

Dr. W. Hancher of Weiser, testified this afternoon he believed Lobear was insane last winter when the shooting occurred on a lonely mountain trail 120 miles from here. Onasias Mahan and Dan La Van told of difficulties Lobear told them he had with Estep over Estep's conduct toward Mrs. Lobear.

Lobear told officers he shot Estep in self-defense during an altercation of matrimonial and business affairs.

Dr. Roscoe G. Ward, Valley county coroner, testified yesterday that Estep was shot from the year through the head.

HOPKINS SENDS OUT ORDERS TO SPEND

Redesignated by Roosevelt, WPA Head Directs New Program

WASHINGTON, June 24 (AP)—Redesignated by President Roosevelt as works progress administrator, Harry L. Hopkins yesterday ordered the new \$1,425,000,000 work relief appropriations to be spent in virtually the same manner as the old \$4,000,000,000 fund.

Orders dispatched to all state WPA administrators made few changes in existing regulations except to give the field staff some increased powers and to carry out two new policies outlined by congress.

Hopkins directed his field staff not to consider bonus payments in determining veterans' eligibility for jobs and to bar all aliens who entered this country illegally.

Amalgam Orders

While Hopkins was getting the new WPA program under way, the public works administration and the settlement administration awaited executive orders making available the \$300,000,000 and the \$55,500,000 provided for them, respectively, by the deficiency-relief act signed yesterday by the president.

Under the work relief act, the \$1,425,000,000 must be spent as follows (except for 15 per cent increase in allotments which are made with funds already on hand) on these projects: Highways, roads and street construction, \$125,000,000; public buildings, \$156,750,000; parks and recreational facilities, \$155,750,000; public utility projects, \$111,000,000; fire control, \$128,250,000; white collar projects, \$85,500,000; women's projects, \$85,500,000; miscellaneous, \$71,000,000; national youth administration, \$71,250,000; rural rehabilitation, loans and relief to farmers (resettlement administration), \$85,500,000.

Western Railroad Men Outline Aims

SALT LAKE CITY, June 24 (AP)—Pendons, better working conditions and greater economic security in general are goals of western railroad men.

Three hundred men and women from Utah, California, Idaho and Nevada, here for the West coast division meeting of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers and its auxiliary, heard their international president, D. B. Robertson of Cleveland, outline these aims.

Robertson said that if the supreme court holds the railway pension bill unconstitutional the union brotherhoods will seek legislation which railroad management to put a general pension into effect.

"Technological unemployment has so affected the railroad industry that 350,000 former workers are out of jobs," he said.

"The working day is being reduced and adjustments must be made to provide more jobs. That is one reason we are seeking approval of a six-day week and a regulation that two men must be in an engine cab."

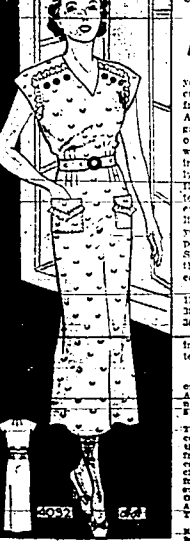

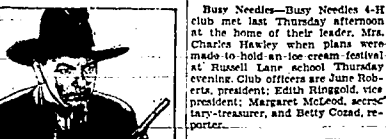
