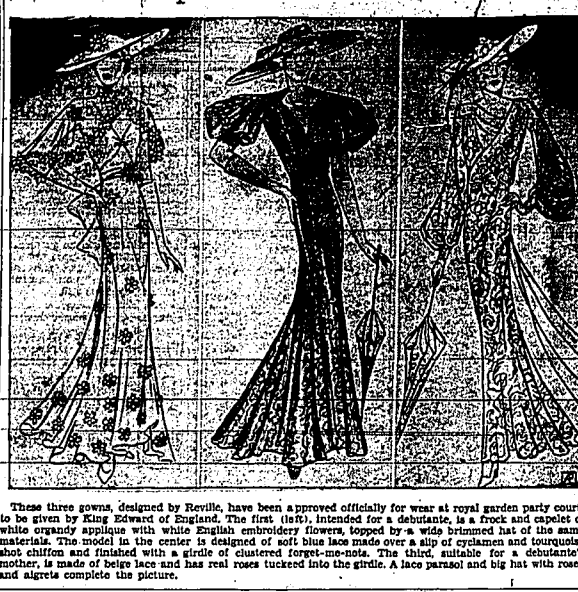

# TWO MURDERS FOR INSURANCE CHARGED

## State Attempts to Show Robert S. James Killed Previous Wife

LOS ANGELES, June 30 (AP)—Robert S. James, charged with murdering his seventh wife for \$20,000 insurance, was accused by the state today of having killed an earlier wife for the same remunerative reason.

James is on trial for the death of May James last August. He is charged with drowning her in a bathtub after trying to kill her with rattlesnake venom.

Prosecutors said they would attempt to show that James murdered both Mary and the previous wife, Winona.

"For the death of Winona four years ago in Manitou, Colorado, cabin James received \$14,000 insurance," declared Deputy District Attorney John Egan today.

### Found in Water

"For the death of Mary in her honeymoon cottage he sought \$20,000 insurance," Winona was found submerged in a tub of water, curiously enough with a grocery bag as witness—and James was found drowned in the fishpond of their home also in the presence of a witness.

### Defendant Not Injured

Deputy District Attorney Eugene Williams declared James was not injured in the accident. The prosecutors then would attempt to show James struck Winona with a blunt instrument before driving the automobile over a cliff.

Samuel Silverman, attorney for James, announced his client would probably testify next week, indicating the defense might abandon its announced plan of trying to save James from the gallows on insanity grounds. The testimony of an insane person is not admissible.

## Blaze Sweeps Over 1,000 Acres of Timber and Brush Land

SAN BERNARDINO, Calif., June 30 (AP)—An army of 1,200 men today battled a "race horse" fire that has swept over about 1,000 acres of timber and brush land in the San Bernardino national forest.

Crews of fire fighters from the Sequoia and Sierra national forests arrived today, relieving men worn out from two days and nights of incessant work.

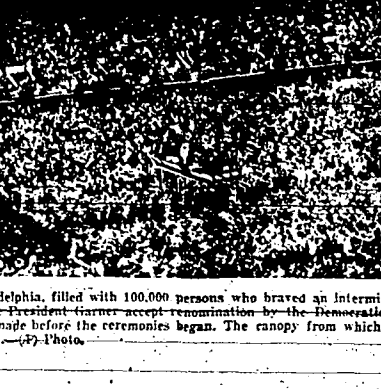

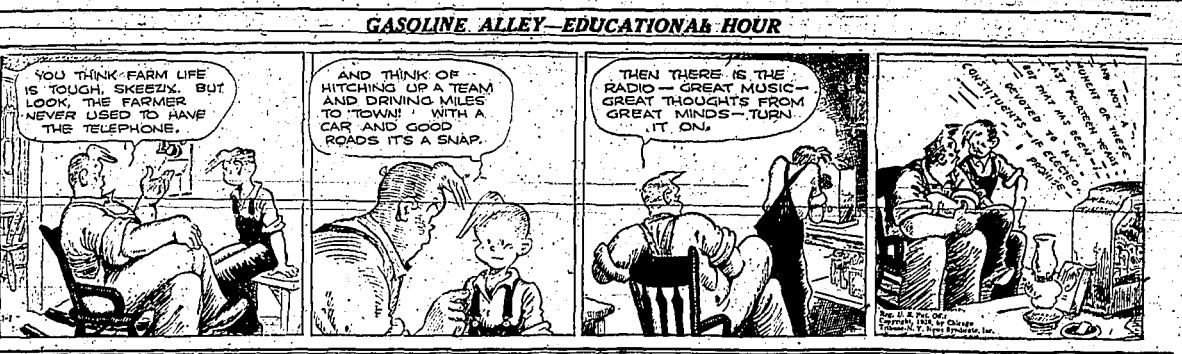

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# WATER PROPOSAL NEVER PRESENTED

## Mayor Asserts No Knowledge of Plan to Bring City Supply From Canyon

Twin Falls' mayor, Duncan McDermott, today asserted that Raymond L. Huff of Seattle had applied for permission to provide Twin Falls with a new municipal water supply from Blue Lakes Springs, five miles northwest of here in Snake River canyon, said "I know nothing of the plan. I have never met Mr. Huff and he has never presented any such proposition to Twin Falls city council."

Huff's proposal, submitted yesterday to the state department of reclamation, called for construction of a 12,127-foot tunnel to conduct 200-second feet of water from Rock creek, one and one-half miles west of here to a plant which will produce 4250 horsepower to lift the water over the canyon wall and convey it to the city. Cost was estimated at \$2,000,000.

**Suggests Bond Vote**  
Mayor Johnston Monday night suggested to the city council that taxpayers be given the opportunity of voting on a proposal to bring water to Twin Falls from springs at the head of Rock creek at a cost of approximately \$500,000.

"I have never heard of this proposal before," he said, referring to the Huff proposal. "It may be a perfectly sound scheme, but on the other hand it may be a very bad one. I am sure that the city council will be able to decide before the city is asked to pay for it. I am sure that the city is not in a position to pay for it."

**In Water Business**  
The city is in the water business and is not in a position to pay for it. The city government's only interest is to secure a proposition that will adequately supply us with pure drinking water at a very low cost, not to exceed that furnished by the present system.

Huff apparently has filed a \$200,000 bond with the city of Rock creek. If his plan is accepted here it will mean that the Twin Falls city council will be unable to eliminate the running of water in the winter. That is one of the major advantages of the proposition that the city is considering at the present time, Johnston said.

The city for many years has been supplied by water from Twin Falls Canal company, although the company has repeatedly urged the city to seek a new supply. It is now urging water for summer irrigation and to permit the elimination of the supply during the winter months.

**Huff Tells Plans**  
DUNCAN, June 29.—Raymond L. Huff of Seattle, Wash., took the first steps today to provide the city of Twin Falls with a supply of water which will be taken from Blue Lakes springs, approximately five miles northwest of the city.

Huff estimated that construction of a power and pipeline to be used in conveying the water to the city will cost approximately \$200,000. The plans were contained in an application, filed with the state department of reclamation today, for permission to divert 200 second feet of water from Rock creek one and one-half miles northwest of Twin Falls through a 12,127-foot tunnel to a plant which will produce 4250 horsepower to lift the water over the canyon wall and convey it to the city.

No filing was made on the Blue Lakes springs, but that will be done later, Huff told department of reclamation officials.
