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NEW DEALERS LOOK FORWARD TO FIGHT

Farley Believes FDR Will Win, But Not Easy Victory

PHILADELPHIA, July 1. — Although in the minority, the delegates to the highest national chairman James A. Farley solemnized the national convention with a private warning to state, city and county leaders that the Roosevelt-Landon presidential contest looks like a "home race."

Openly the Democrats profess no fear of the outcome in November. Privately they concede that they are not so sure of victory as they were a few weeks ago.

Unpublished but bitter internal rows have developed into full-fledged fighting flower here. Mr. Farley discovered that his party is not so united as he thought it was. The so-called old guard faction in the party is sore at the neglect which has been shown it in many states.

The resolution was a shock even to highest party chieftains who thought they had been in touch with partisan thought. They learned that fence throughout the Middle West—where the candidacy of Representative Lemke will prove most powerful—has broken down in the last four weeks. Both optimistic claims of triumph by brooding states which in 1936 will be a different story from 1932.

Drivindling Claims

Some time ago President Roosevelt told friends that he expected to win 53 electoral votes. Now the inside figure is 297, the decrease resulting entirely from the Democratic "pushover" in the West and East may cost them many states which they had counted in their column. The new figure is only 21 more than the number necessary for election, and the turn-over of a few states could easily upset these calculations.

The drop from happy estimates of 53 to 297 just about measures the lessened confidence which Democratic insiders have in the November outcome—a result of developments at Cleveland and Philadelphia.

Despite the hoopla and the headlines which a party convention always generates, and the seemingly psychological advantage which the Democrats have now, smart politicians recognize that this gain is only temporary.

Mr. Farley, privately as well as publicly, believes that his Democratic will win in November. But the chairman is too realistic a politician to think that he has the same sort of "pushover" that he had four years ago.

Fear Over-Confidence

He and the president are more afraid of over-confidence among party workers than of Landon's possible strength. They are worried that "the boys" fail to bring out that 20 per cent vote which shows up at the polls only as a result of personal solicitation.

In many states, notably New York, New England and other eastern sections, party workers are so lukewarm and their fingers are so stiff from not cashing federal checks that they may not ring many doorbells on a certain Tuesday after a certain Monday next November.

It is because of the expected exhibition of Democratic party weakness here that Chairman Jim has been holding these secret and ominous porwows.

He has sent every precinct worker and postmaster home with the idea that their bread and butter may be taken out of their mouths. That's the most effective way, he figures, to get out the vote.
