

KANSAS TO JOIN FEDERAL PROGRAM

Democrat Criticizes Steps Toward Participation In Social Security

TOPEKA, July 6 (AP)—Kansas legislative machinery was organized swiftly today over a single Democratic protest to deal with state participation in the phase of the federal social security program in a special session called by Governor Alf M. Landon.

Republican leaders neared an agreement in advance of the opening of the legislature tomorrow upon the wording of an amendment to be proposed to the state constitution to permit Kansas to meet the requirements of the federal program.

State Senator Joe McDonald, a Democrat, sharply criticized the procedure as "kangaroo methods."

"I believe you can enact the necessary laws under the present constitution and not use a million dollars in federal benefits by waiting for a vote on a constitutional amendment next November," McDonald said in a press conference.

"I wouldn't be surprised if there is some difference of opinion with the legislature as to go before only a majority needed for a resolution to call a special session to consideration of the amendment, a short meeting ending possibly Friday was predicted in Republican quarters."

Majority members of the council have held that inasmuch as the bill for caring for the aged, infirm and unfortunate on the council, the state cannot participate on an association phase of the federal program unless the constitution is changed. The federal program requires state approval and administration as well as state financial participation.

ROOSEVELT, FARLEY OUTLINE CAMPAIGN

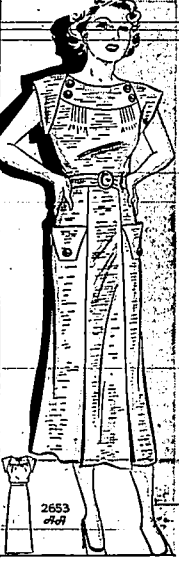
President to Tell Whether Postmaster General Will Resign

WASHINGTON, July 6 (AP)—After a two-hour discussion of campaign plans with President Roosevelt, James A. Farley said today the chief executive probably would announce tomorrow whether Farley was to resign as postmaster general or take a leave of absence to conduct the Roosevelt re-election drive as chairman of the Democratic national committee.

Officials indicated that Farley would be given a leave without pay in accordance with his own wishes and that William W. Howes, first assistant postmaster general, would take charge of the department, at least until after the November elections.
