ROOSEVELT CALLS FOR RETRENCHMENT

All Federal Agencies Instructed to Save Some of Appropriations

WASHINGTON, July 7 (AP)—President Roosevelt disclosed today he had asked the heads of government departments and independent agencies to apportion their congressional appropriations so as to not only effect savings but also set up "substantial reserves."

Daniel W. Bell, acting director of the budget, sent a letter to all department chiefs requesting them to hold their estimates for next year's appropriations to an amount below those for the current fiscal year.

The White House instructions to department and bureau chiefs said: "Now that all of the appropriation bills for the fiscal year 1939 have been enacted, you are requested, in preparing your appropriations, to set up substantial reserves for the purpose not only of effecting savings in appropriations where they can be made without detriment to the service, but to meet unforeseen needs that may arise during the next fiscal year and thus provide for them without the necessity of supplemental appropriations."

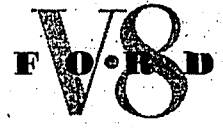

LOANS IN DEMAND FOR IDAHO HOMES

Local Housing Agencies Report Business Increase

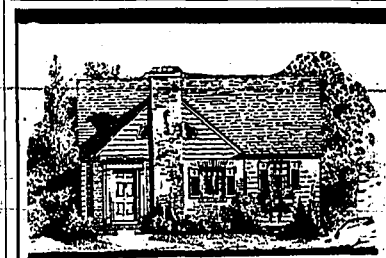
WASHINGTON, July 7.—Idaho savings, building and loan associations report an increase of more than 100 per cent in the volume of their home mortgages accepted for insurance by the federal housing administration in May over April. It was announced here today by George E. Palmer, special assistant to the administrator, in charge of savings and loan activities.

"The Idaho associations' mortgage volume for insurance in May total \$483,500 as against \$24,900 in April," said Mr. Palmer. "The largest previous month's business done in cooperation with the federal housing administration by these associations was in January when \$400,000 in mortgages were accepted from them for insurance. This brings their cumulative total as of June 1 up to \$2,572,200, represented by 116 mortgages. This is 42.13 per cent of all mortgages insured by the federal housing administration in cooperation with all active lending institutions in that state. The percentage places the Idaho associations in sixth place in comparison with the associations in all other states."

"Of this total of insured loans by the Idaho savings and loan associations, the sum of \$168,600 has gone into new residential construction, averaging \$3,601 per house. These associations have made 41.28 per cent of the total of \$408,000 for construction purposes by all accredited Idaho institutions."

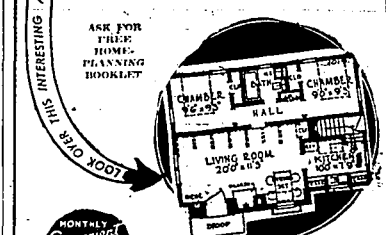

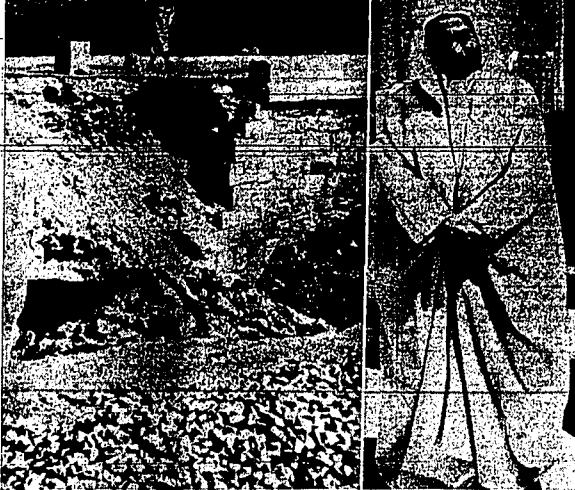
