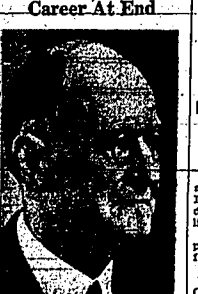

Vast improvements could be made under this set-up, he stated.

Under provisions of house bill No. 0114, passed by the senate, a survey of any state on city park suitable for recreational sites, can be obtained from the National Park service. 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### GOAT WOMAN'S SLAYER CONFESSES

Utility Man Declares Employer Killed at Own Request

LONDON, Kan., July 8 (AP)—Stories of the victim's cultured past filtered through the background today as Alex Ure, 45, handy man, awaited arraignment for the "re-quest" killing of Mrs. Melvin Villenon, 65, the "goat woman of Burlingame."

So known because she kept several goats around her home at Burlingame, Kansas, Mrs. Villenon disappeared last December. Officers found her body Monday in a shallow basement grave at her home. Buried with her were two pet dogs. Ure, rent collector and utility man for Mrs. Villenon, confessed, County Attorney Charles Heizer said, he shot the woman at her "request" because she was out of funds.

Mrs. Villenon lived alone on the outskirts of Burlingame. Mrs. Tom Ellis, a former neighbor, said she believed the slain woman had been wealthy.

Heizer, who handled legal matters of her, said Mrs. Villenon was "brilliant and had a musical education."

Ure's story, told to Heizer, was that he shot her because she said she had run out of money and asked

me to kill her." The man denied, Heizer said, that he had taken any money from the house. Examination of the woman's body, the county attorney said, indicated
