RIFLE SHOTS END KILLER'S SIX-YEAR BATTLE IN COURTS

Execution of Delbert Green Sets Off Tumultuous Disturbance Among 350 Convicts in Utah Prison

(By The Associated Press) SALT LAKE CITY, July 10.—Mildly commencing Delbert Green, who died today with bullets to three, forfeited his own life to a firing squad to-day.

Quietly, the 28-year-old killer faced the crack of five high-powered rifles at dawn in the yard of Utah state prison.

Delbert Green, who set off a tumultuous disturbance among the 350 convicts within the prison, came to his death at a minute later—30 seconds that put a period to a legal battle of six years.

Utah law permits murderers a choice between bullets and hanging. Green expressed no preference. So because it is cheaper—they shot him.

This afternoon he was buried in a casket in the body of the young wife he murdered in jealous rage January 4, 1930.

Utah's death row today began with the execution of Delbert Green, who shot his wife, her mother and his uncle, James Green. It was the latter, the latter, who was convicted specifically. He pleaded insanity.

Five times he had been sentenced to die—four times saved by legal delays. Twice he was saved within 24 hours of scheduled execution.

But today—though fearful relatives who spent the night with him in the gray prison chapel sought to keep up hope—no reprieve appeared.

Joseph Holbrook came in dressed quickly a black hood was slipped over the doomed man's head. He was led to the gallows with the white shirt, the white duck trousers.

BOISE, July 10 (AP)—With the filing deadline only hours away, the Idaho political spotlight fell today on opponents—another possible opponent for Governor G. Ben Ross in the Democratic senatorial primary.

The enigma is John Carver, blind United States district attorney, who said:

"I am seriously considering persistent requests from Democrats in all parts of the state that I enter the contest for the senate in the Democratic primary."

Friends said his petitions are being circulated and will be ready to file by tomorrow night.

So far Ross, who filed his nominating petitions at the office of the secretary of state today, has one announced opponent, Leslie Aker, Boise attorney.

CAPPER DISCUSSES FARM PROGRAM OF REPUBLICAN PARTY

Two Participants in Landon-Lowden Conference Contribute Views; Representative Issues Statement

(By The Associated Press) TOPEKA, Kas., July 10.—Two participants in the significant Landon-Lowden conference contributed views to the discussions of Republican farm plans today, one emphasizing that the program would be paid farmers and the other questioning the new deal's program.

Senator Arthur Capper of Kansas, who sat at the luncheon table while Governor Alf M. Landon and Frank O. Lowden talked farm problems today, said the Illinois leader had "faced squarely" a fact that some folks are trying to dodge for fear it would arouse antagonism in certain quarters.

"The bunties to farmers who cooperate in a national soil conservation program will have to be continued," Capper quoted Lowden as saying.

Issues Statement Representative Clifford R. Hope of Kansas, who also heard the Landon-Lowden conversations, issued a statement at the governor's office in which he said President Roosevelt had "made" the "astonishing inference" that a 10 per cent increase in wheat and corn acreage had been part of the administration farm plans "all along."

"Until the president spoke," Hope said, "no intimation had come out of Washington that the administration had any other idea in mind than a reduction in these crops. Now that the drought is threatening a scarcity of food and feed crops and it appears that the reduction program was a mistake" the administration is attempting to get out in front and "lead the parade the other way."

Capper emphasized that, as "in the permanent part of the program," the Republican farm program calls for "a large measure of state and local control."

He said he would administer the soil conservation plan with funds supplied by the federal government.

ARMY MEN DIE IN FLAMING BALLOON

Bag Crashes Into Thicket in Oklahoma; Third Occupant Injured

ANADARKO, Okla., July 10 (AP)—Two army sergeants were burned to death and another injured when an army balloon from Fort Sill crashed into a blackjack thicket near Copar, Oklahoma, and burst into flames late today.

Sergeant Joseph M. Rumpfle, 46, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, was dead before farmers reached the blazing bag. Sergeant Douglas M. Tucker, 33, Fort Sill, died of burns at a hospital.

Sergeant Joseph Murray, 31, was treated for shoulder and leg burns. Captain L. D. Lynch escaped with only minor injuries.

Tucker was burned about the shoulders and legs and Murray suffered body and leg injuries.

Witnesses to Crash Private Harold Dawson of Fort Sill, one of four soldiers following the spherical balloon in a truck, said the bag had been losing altitude and suddenly crashed into a blackjack thicket, one mile northwest of Copar.

England Shivers With Slushy Ice In London Streets

LONDON, July 10 (AP)—It was "with you were here" weather on England's south coast today, with slushy ice, hail in the streets at Eastbourne and a spotted weather map on the continent.

Europe found time to sympathize with sweltering America while viewing conditions that ranged from serious storms off the northern Spanish coast to bright and balmy skies in parts of the mid-continent.

Twenty deaths, most of them of fishermen lost at sea, were reported in northern Spain. Britain, with rain over most of the country cancelling numerous sports events, had "the most freakish conditions."

In London, where the maximum temperature was 63, one evening paper banner blared "Snowballing on South Coast."

FOREST OFFICIALS INVESTIGATE BLAZE

Incendiarism Hinted as Fire Sweeps Through New Territory

SUNDANCE, Wyo., July 10 (AP)—Federal forestry officials investigated today a fire that raged through the night as the forest fire which has raged near here since Sunday leaped eastward in a series of jumps.

"I hate to say it, but it seems possible somebody may have set these fires," said Ted Cochran, forest ranger. "We are checking up on all strangers and ordered a bunch of firemen out of town last night."

Officials said it was possible the Bear Lodge fire, which broke out Sunday, may have been started by hunters in the area. Heavily recruited fighters have been paid 30 cents an hour.

Fire Herds Clearing

The fire, believed under control earlier today, burned a 5-mile clearing laboriously cut by workers as the wind veered from southwest to east this afternoon.

Flanned by the east-wind, flames 100 feet high jumped the fire lane at the northwest corner of the burned area and cracked into the new area.

All other blazes in Wyoming and Montana were declared by officials to be under control or entirely extinguished.

The Bear Lodge fire burned over an estimated 90 square miles. The fire in Lodge Grass canyon near Sheridan was controlled after destroying 300 acres of timber.

Blazed by the east-wind, flames called the Bear Lodge blaze the worst in their recollection. Several thousand fire fighters were burned the non-succulent.

Appeal Comes From North Dakota

CHICAGO, July 10.—A roasting east and a thirsty west took heavy equipment and blizzards were signaled its eighth day by encompassing most of the United States and much of Canada.

The huge total of drought losses, estimated at \$300,000,000, continued to grow.

Upwards of 420 fatalities for the past four days were tabulated, as temperature records popped from the Mississippi valley to the Atlantic coast.

Hot spots included Bowling Green, O., with 117 degrees; Humboldt, Md., 109; Jamestown, N. D., 113; Richmond, Va., 104; Adrian, Mich., 106.

But 100 degree heat was the standard from Kansas to Connecticut and Baltimore, with a new all time high of 104, counted at least 18 places in Ohio, where the Lake Michigan breeze gave up a 10 day duel. Torrid temperatures and a reading of 100 was noted, the first in two years.

Death List Menials With every hour bringing additional mortalities ascribed to heat or drought, the tolling of fatalities on beaches, the indications were that the day's list would be the heaviest for the long dry hot.

New York state led with at least 17 for the day. Ohio counted 10, Michigan and Wisconsin nine and Illinois seven.

And no immediate relief was in sight. With generally fair weather prevailing over the northern half of the nation, forecasters expected at least two more days of abnormal heat.

The prediction was the greatest concern of farmers, who steadily into the nation's potential food supply—carrying a harvest to the pulp-wood books of a year.

AAA Mother Files The governor said that not only fed but water was unavailable for stock raising and the raising of the state, which has suffered from more than a month of excessive heat and dryness.

AAA reviewing government activities to alleviate distress in the emergency regions, sources said, 15,000 cropland farmers already were at work on federal jobs in the drought zone, and 100,000 more were being trained.
