Governor Considers Special Session To Boost Relief Funds

ROSS Calls in Legislative Leaders For Advice On Proposed Amendment Of States Sales Tax

BOISE, July 15 (AP)—Governor C. Ben Ross summoned the state's leading lawmakers to the Capitol tonight to consider whether an extraordinary session of the Idaho legislature shall be called to provide additional funds for the commonwealth's relief work.

To said he is "seriously considering the matter" and that a call will be issued before the end of the week "if it appears that an extraordinary session is advisable."

The call, he said, will provide for an amendment to the 2 per cent retail sales tax act to permit diversion of a greater portion of the receipts from that act to the relief program.

He estimated an additional \$50,000 is needed for the aged pensioners, who in June averaged \$21 each. The tax act was passed by the 1935 legislature and provides for use of \$100,000 of its revenues monthly to match federal funds for relief purposes.

During June 1938 aged, 3,568 dependent children, 219 blind, and several hundred handicapped received approximately \$120,000 in state funds, in addition to the contributions from the states and U. S. federal government.

Relief officials estimated that an additional 1,900 aged are eligible for relief.

In past months more than \$100,000 monthly has been used for relief because a surplus accumulated during months when less than \$100,000 was paid to the relief fund.

TOWNSEND STRIKES AT 'CRAZY ORGY' OF FEDERAL SPENDING

Pension Plan's Convention Hears Founder Announce Support of Other Groups of 'Dissatisfied Voters'

(By The Associated Press) CLEVELAND, July 15.—Dr. Francis E. Townsend, founder of the Townsend old age pension plan, assailed today the Roosevelt administration's "crazy orgy of spending" and told the second national Townsend convention his movement has the support of other groups who seek a "new era of social justice."

Townsend told his followers the pension plan has the backing of the National Union for Social Justice, the Share-the-Wealth movement, and other groups of unhappy and dissatisfied voters.

He approved the principle of a constitutional amendment to make the Townsend plan effective. Townsend convention headquarters announced tonight that the Rev. Charles E. Coughlin, Detroit radio priest, would address the convention delegates at 10:30 a. m. tomorrow.

Urges Immediate Action Dr. Townsend told the delegates of them to get organized, in their shirt sleeves—that he believed "we shall agree on a program of political action and ours must be a plan of immediate action."

"Every act of the government," Dr. Townsend continued, "has been predicated upon the heedless advice of the president when he said: 'Try something, if it works, try it some more, if it does not work, try something else.'"

After my notification, my first speech will be at an Indiana Republican meeting at Connersville August 8," Knox said. "I will address West Virginia rally at Huntington August 13."

Drought Retreats To Western Fringe Of Plains States

Oppressive Heat Continues With Increasing Crop Losses In Montana, Wyoming And Colorado

FATALITIES Exceed 3,800 In Nation (By The Associated Press) CHICAGO, July 15.—Moderating masses of cool air from a Canadian high pressure area checked the stifling heat in the Great Lakes sections tonight and lent its tempering effect to the west, as New York and the Middle West. Plains states continued to bake in the thirteenth day of oppressive heat.

Deaths passed 3,800 in the nation. Although several points in the northwest had readings above 100, much of the region was cooled by northwesterly winds.

Weather forecaster J. R. Lloyd at Chicago said the relief mass from the Hudson bay territory had already reached Michigan, Wisconsin, Ohio and Indiana, and was spreading south as far east as the Atlantic seaboard.

He was unable to say what progress the mass would make to the east and south.

Another area had formed over far northwest and north of Jumbia, Lloyd said, but declared it was too early to forecast what effect it would have on the drought land.

Hot weather continued today in the lower Ohio and Missouri and middle Mississippi valleys, while the weather was cooler tonight in New England, upper Ohio, Great Lakes and central western New York.

Early in the afternoon, Quincy on central Illinois' western border, reported a 113 degree maximum. The high for Chicago was 109, Indianapolis, 102 1/2; Grand Rapids, 110; Wellington, Kas., 111; Falls City, Neb., 106; Kansas City, Mo., 102; and Omaha, Neb., 108.

In the latter part, K. D. Blood, federal crop statistician said the drought outlook was approaching that of 1924.

He said most farmers had feed and water for only about ten days more. Cattle ranchers were additional crop salvagers.

In Montana, Wyoming and Colorado (drought) horres returned, Department of Agriculture Report Guy Tugwell, traveling to Blumark to speed federal relief in the burned areas, said the situation was "grim." "The great drought—1934—in reduced feed grain yields, that hay yields would be as light as other years, and that a substantial recovery for the nation's crop would be realized for a considerable portion."

REPTILE BREAKS LOOSE IN COURT

Former Burley Man Found Dead In Car

ODESSA, July 15 (AP)—Wilfred R. Jones, about 35, Odessa attorney, was found dead in his car today, which was found on a highway today by police.

The motor of his car still was running, officers said, and a piece of garden hose extended from the exhaust pipe through a rear window of the sedan indicated he died from inhaling monoxide gas.

Coroner Hyrum A. Behm, who accompanied police to the scene, pronounced the death a suicide.

Mrs. Jones told officers her husband had been ill and dependent on business matters, Detective Pack said.

MOTHER OF FIVE DIES ON GALLOWS

Crusader Against Capital Punishment Fined For Violating Protest

EXETER, England, July 15 (AP)—They hanged a mother of five in Exeter jail an hour early today, but Mrs. Violet Van Der Elst, blond crusader against capital punishment, was there to protest.

The execution was that of Mrs. Charlotte Bryant, who poisoned her husband, Mrs. Van Der Elst stated. Crusader against capital punishment, she had been protesting against the hanging.

A crowd of 1,000, outside the prison gates, saw the wealthy widow's cream colored limousine pull up, and Mrs. Van Der Elst stepped out. A policeman stepped to the running board and Mrs. Van Der Elst's chauffeur drove to court.

Fined by Magistrate There a magistrate fined her 5 pounds for interfering with an officer, but refused the suggestion of Chief Constable P. Tarry that she be remanded for a mental examination.

Tarry handed her a poster, inscribed, "Mrs. Bryant being murdered. That the action of a sane woman," he asked.

"I am a woman against capital punishment," Mrs. Van Der Elst retorted for a considerable portion. Maintaining her innocence to the end, Mrs. Bryant asked King Edward at the last minute to "have mercy—your loyalty—attitude—subject."

WOMAN FAILS TO IDENTIFY SUSPECTS

Jean Bell Refuses to Name Men as Assaulters in Mutilation Case

WASHINGTON, July 15 (AP)—Jean Bell failed tonight to positively identify the men who raped and mutilated her on a highway near the city of two men she previously had named in connection with her charges that she was branded with gangland symbols.

The men, Joe Silvers and Leo Marman, knighted in New York today on charges of assault with intent to kill, were paraded before the juror "the wrong lights or face line-up" by a group of men.

Marmone passed and her face registered nothing, nor did she identify the man. When the group had been led from the room, Chief of Detectives Bernice G. Thompson asked her if she recognized any of the men.

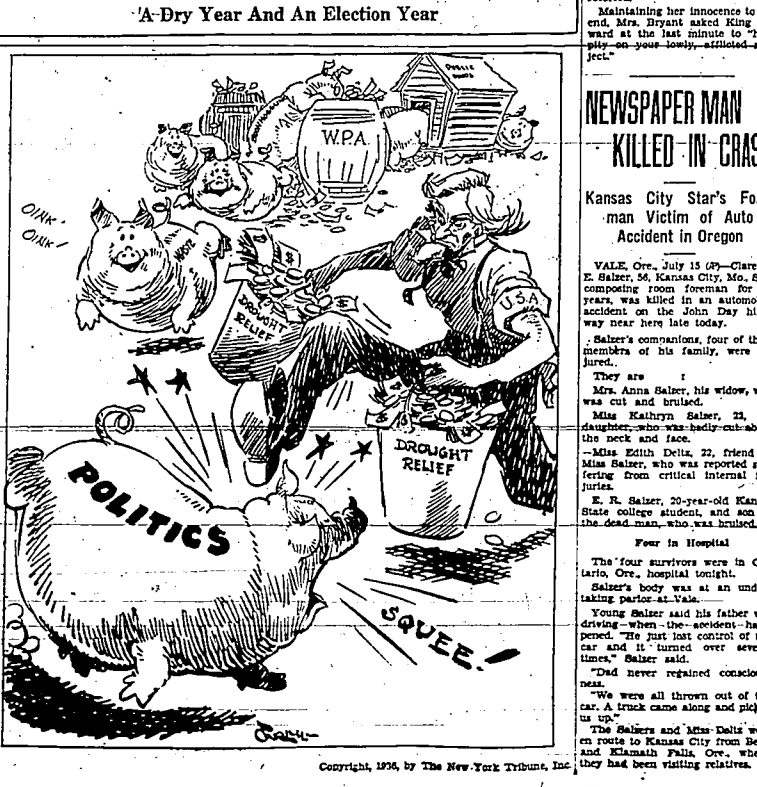
Four in Hospital Mrs. Salzer said her father was driving home at the time of the crash. "He just lost control of the car and it turned over several times," Salzer said.

**LIGHTNING STARTS
SAGE BRUSH BLAZE**

Fire Burns Over 1000 Acres
Near Hagerman Before
Being Halted

HAGERMAN, July 15—A desert fire, started by lightning Monday afternoon, burned over 1000 acres of sage brush across the west of Hagerman before 50 GCO men from the Hagerman camp got the flames under control early Tuesday morning.

Wallace Botwick, foreman in charge of the desert, west of Hagerman, said lightning struck several times Monday afternoon along Sallor creek about 15 miles west of Hagerman where the fire started on the rocky side of a butte in dry grass. Smoke from the burning sage was first seen by the workers about four o'clock. A second detachment of GCO men was sent out Tuesday to prevent further outbreak of the fire.

Sallor creek has a flow of water during the spring runoff and is dry in the summer. The section burned over is used by sheep run from Hagerman valley for spring range and feed on it is reported to have been dry. Sheep have all been moved to the summer range in the mountains and a few horses are the only stock now ranging there.

There is growing opposition in north Idaho to the new deal and the present administration largely because of its extravagance which is termed "deliberate extravagance," Mr. Stephan said.
