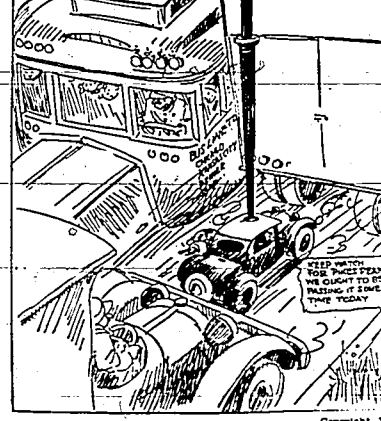

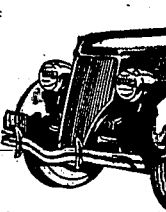

#### Police Say Jean Bell Will Be Prosecuted for Robbery

WASHINGTON, July 16 (AP)—Police today scotched a mutilation story of Jean Bell, 23, as "absolutely groundless" and announced she would be turned over to Baltimore, Maryland, authorities to face a robbery charge.

Executive Chief Bernard W. Thompson said in a statement the girl's story that the initials "O.L." and the number "3-12" were on her body by New York gangsters was "the greatest fabrication of falsehoods I have ever been confronted with."

Failed to Sign

She suggested to police the initials were those of Luciano and that she had been branded because she failed to sign a story that might have helped Luciano get out of prison.

### SHORT-CROP LIFTS PRICE OF POTATOES

#### Prospects Indicate Prosperous Times for Idaho Producers

With official reports of declining production and rising prices, Idaho potato producers looked ahead today to more prosperous times.

Edward G. Ross, federal crop statistician, reported the Idaho 1936 production from 104,000 acres will be about 21,200,000 bushels, 9 per cent smaller than the 1935 crop of 23,258,000 bushels produced on 108,000 acres.

The nation's potato crop is 73.5 per cent of normal, the second lowest July 1 condition reported during the past 70 years, Ross said.

The July 1 production forecast of 21,200,000 bushels compared with 20,778,000 bushels harvested in 1935.

"The condition of the Idaho crop was slightly below average July 1 due to uneven and spotted stands in many fields and to the effects of delayed plantings following the heavy rains of early June," Ross observed.

Last year, growers noted, the prevailing prices for Idaho potatoes ranged from 23 to 75 cents a hundred.

Now, they pointed out, Idaho potatoes are bringing \$1.75 to \$2 a hundred weight bulk in Idaho fields.

He cautioned all persons dealing with ground squirrels, coyotes and other carriers of the disease to guard against infection by the disease which "devastated Europe in the middle ages."

He observed that a Cedar City, Utah, youth was recently infected with the disease through the bite of a squirrel and is now undergoing treatment.

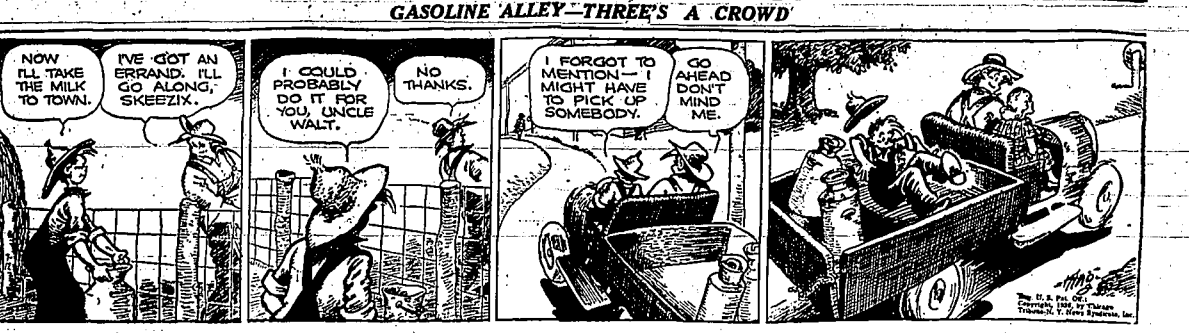

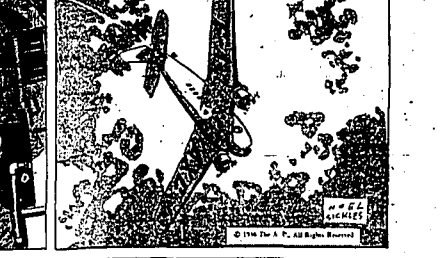
