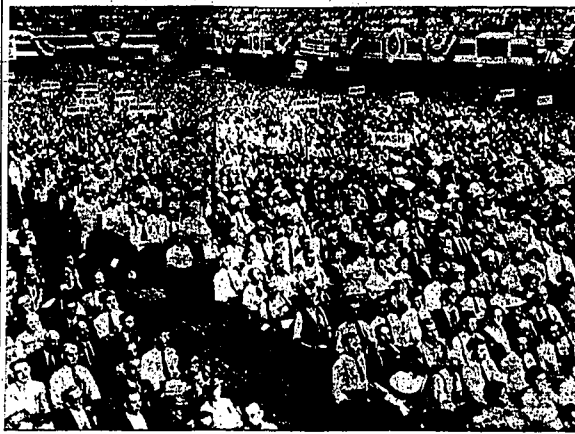

"Serve Yourself" Parties Ideal For Warm Weather

The informality of a supper party affords opportunity for originality and personality, both in food and in table arrangements, and while it is a delightful way in which to entertain at any season of the year, the buffet table is particularly welcomed by the guests, and appreciated by the hostess during the summer. The "serve yourself" party is well-adapted to outdoor and garden entertainment. Use gay linens—interesting dishes—colorful food—attractively garnished and deliciously appetizing. Here are some helpful hints for buffet services suitable for the servants' home.

It is wise to limit the menu to two courses. In any service where no tables are provided for the guests, the menu must be selected to meet the dangers accompanying the feat of holding a plate on the lap. Use a large enough plate to hold all the food for one course, the essential silver and the beverage cup. Eliminate knives, butter spreaders, salad forks, sheet glasses, goblets, sauce dishes, and salad plates. Avoid serving foods that are too creamy or juicy. Avoid foods that are difficult to eat or to eat.

Choose foods that require very little last-minute preparation. Plan carefully and keep your pep and vitality so that you may make the party a success by being a charming hostess. You will find the following appetizing welcome additions to your buffet table:

Relish Stuffed Celery
24 three-inch celery stalks
1/3 cup cottage cheese
3 tablespoons pickle relish
1 olive, chopped
1 teaspoon horseradish
1 teaspoon salt
Arrange celery on flat surface, stuff with rest of ingredients, mixed. Chill and serve on shallow dish.

Cheesy Whirls
16 slices fresh white bread
1 1/2 cups white cream cheese
2 tablespoons pimiento cheese
1 teaspoon chopped green peppers
4 tablespoons soft butter
1 teaspoon onion juice
1/2 teaspoon salt
Place bread slices on flat surface. Discard crusts, spread with rest of ingredients, blended. Roll up each slice quickly and wrap in waxed paper. Store in refrigerator until serving time. Cut in 1/2-inch slices and place on tray, flat sides up.

Dried Beef Strips
16 pieces dried beef
1 tablespoon prepared mustard
1/2 teaspoon horseradish
16 thin strips flat pickles
1 tablespoon salad dressing
Slices need sized pieces of beef, spread with mustard and horseradish. Add pickles and spread with dressing. Roll up in waxed paper and place in plastic with wood picks. Chill until serving time.

ATTRACTIVE TABLE MATS MADE OF PAPER FOR SUMMER SERVICE

Imported table mats, made of paper are being featured in all the smart stores. Some of the sets even go as high as \$7.25, but clever women know how they can be duplicated for a fraction of this cost. You need to buy only a few folds of crepe paper to make a set that will be greatly admired by your guests as well as your family.

The following directions are for an attractive white and green mat, six and six of these will make a lovely summer table setting. These mats which are so simply woven are as practical and durable as any fabric. A thin brushing of an inexpensive water repellent solution will make the mats even more durable.

First cut a rectangle of stout cardboard 19 1/2 inches by 10 inches. Mark both the edges of the length every 1/2 inch with pencil. Insert pins at these points. Cut a fold of white crepe paper across the grain 1/2 inch wide and strip broad, 1/2 inch and weave back and forth, 1 under, 1 over, for 5 rows at both the top and bottom. The middle of the mat is divided into 2 inch squares. Keep weaving close together and tie ends at the sides of the mat. Cut from cardboard. Make 12 tassels, 15 windings each over a 2-inch broad, trim, and tie on the sides of mat at each weaving interval.

The wise manager prepares for unexpected callers as well as planning for her own guests. Cookies, small dairy macarons, or any crisp little sweet wafers go well with a cold beverage, and make the guest feel that much more than merely a drink has been offered in the way of hospitality.

Refrigerator cookies may be made into dough and kept indefinitely if carefully wrapped in waxed paper. Then, when there is opportunity or necessity, a batch of cookies can be baked with no fuss at all. Once a hostess has found a good recipe for these delicious bits of crispness, she need look no further for the answer to her cookie problem.

Following this leisurely attitude toward life for a while each day during the delectable summer months will leave a much more fit person at the end of the hot weather and keep a much more cheerful and happy one during the worst heat wave.

Brain Buttered Refrigerator Cookies

1 cup butter
1 cup brown sugar
1 egg
1 cup bran
1/2 cup flour
2 tsp. baking powder
Cream butter; add sugar gradually and beat until thoroughly mixed. Add eggs and bran. Sift flour with baking powder and add to the first mixture. Shape into roll about 1 1/2 inches in diameter, wrap in waxed paper and store in refrigerator until firm. Cut into thin slices and bake on ungreased cookie sheet in hot oven (325° F.) about 10 minutes.

Corn Flakes Dream Bars

1/2 cup butter
1/2 cup brown sugar
1/2 cup flour
2 eggs
1 cup brown sugar
1 tsp. vanilla extract
1/2 cup shredded coconut
1 cup corn flakes
1 cup chopped nut meats
Cream butter and sugar thoroughly. Add flour and blend well with a fork or dough blender. Press crumbs in bottom of shallow baking pan. Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) about 15 minutes or until crumb is delicately browned. Beat eggs well, add sugar gradually and continue beating until mixture is light and fluffy. Add flavoring, salt, coconut, corn flakes and nut meats. Mix well. Drop by spoonfuls on top of previously baked crust. Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) about 25 minutes. Remove from pan; cut into squares while still warm.

Yield: 15 dozen cookies 2 inches in diameter.
