MILITARY TRAINING VETERAN'S SUBJECT

Van Zandt Urges Adequate Defense Measures at D. A. V. Convention

MILWAUKEE, July 20 (AP)—James E. Van Zandt, national commander of the veterans of foreign wars, urged the disabled American veterans' convention today to work for establishment of military training in civilian conservation corps camps. He suggested that all veterans ask President Roosevelt to introduce military training and discipline in the camps to inculcate in them the necessity for adequate national defense and to combat pacifist propaganda.

Advocating an alliance of all veterans' groups to "fight for Americanism against subversive elements," Van Zandt proposed a campaign for legislation by congress providing deportation of all aliens who advocate overthrow of the present form of government by force of arms.

At the opening of the convention of American citizens who advocate such overthrow.

The convention opened this morning with a conference on rehabilitation of disabled soldiers. Committees were named to draw up resolutions for liberalization of laws providing aid to disabled veterans and their dependents, and for preferred employment of such veterans in government service.

Marvin A. Harlan, of El Paso, Texas, national commander of the D. A. V., told the convention that re-employment of the disabled veteran was the most serious problem facing the organization.

TURKEY GROWERS TO TOUR NEARBY RANGES

GOODING, July 20—A turkey tour and a picnic program will feature the fourth annual Turkey Day for Wendell and southern Gooding county farmers, according to an announcement made by the county agent's office this week. The annual event is scheduled for August 2.

A tour of some of the 35,000 turkeys on range in the area adjacent to Wendell and a picnic program at the fish hatchery are being arranged by the Wendell chamber of commerce. The tour of 13 miles will start at the E. G. Commons hatchery in Wendell and end at the hatchery. Commons claims the largest hatchery in the state and one of the largest in the United States. His plant has a capacity of 40,000 turkeys.

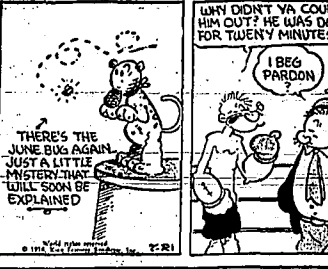

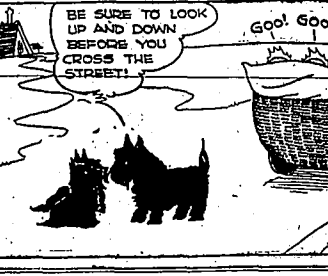

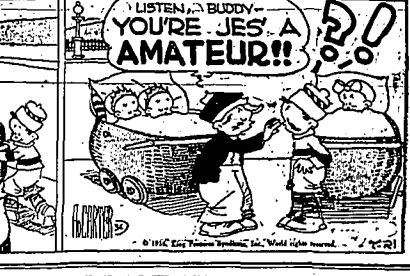

"In Soviet's opinion, which is taken seriously in Germany, England's Stanley Wooderson is rated the favorite in the 1500 meters over Glenn Cunningham and Gene Venturi, both of whom, he said, burned themselves out racing indoors last winter."

"He gives Finland the 5000 and 10,000 meters runs and the javelin throw; Japan the pole vault and the high jump and Jussi Uusela the marathon, Germany the shot and discus."

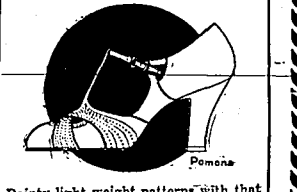
