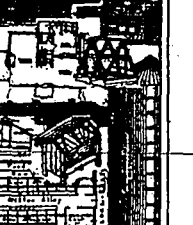

IDAHO GETS SHARE OF RELIEF FUNDS

Only \$8,000,000 of State's \$35,000,000 Allocations Unexpended

BOISE, July 21—Idaho had an allocation of approximately \$35,000,000 from the funds provided by the emergency relief appropriation act of 1935. Walter T. Lockwood, state director of the national emergency council, said today. Approximately \$33,000,000 of this total allocation had been obligated for federal and non-federal public works projects and relief purposes in Idaho as of June 30, 1936, the close of the fiscal year.

Total actual expenditures, Lockwood said, amounted to \$27,000,000 and include \$350,000, expended by the department of agriculture on blight, rust control, grade crossing elimination and highway and forest service projects; \$13,000,000 expended on the operations of the CCC program; approximately \$4,000,000 used to finance emergency relief projects; \$2,000,000 for the WPA program; about \$250,000 in grants and loans on PWA projects; a \$1,000,000 for the resettlement program and \$300,000 in miscellaneous projects conducted by the various departments of the federal government such as the Veterans' bureau, department of labor and others.

There remains an unexpended balance of allocated funds of \$8,000,000, \$5,000,000 of which has been obligated.

BIG MIGRATION TO IDAHO PREDICTED

State Chamber of Commerce Sets Goal at 150,000 New Citizens

BOISE, July 21 (AP)—R. E. Shepherd of Jerome, president of the Idaho Chamber of Commerce, said today his organization will launch a campaign immediately to bring 150,000 new citizens to the state.

Shepherd made his statement on his arrival here to attend the chamber's 20-man committee meeting tomorrow on social security and unemployment insurance proposals to the state legislature which has been called to convene July 25.

Shepherd said: "Development of water power resources to a point where we can assure cheap energy for the generations to come; proof that Idaho's great irrigation projects can be depended upon to produce maximum crop year in and year out, and above everything else, assurance that Idaho has plenty of productive land to offer the homeseeker at a minimum price—these are a few of the factors which convince us that our state will add another 150,000 or more citizens to her population within the next 20 years, possibly sooner.

UPPARALLELED MIGRATION

"Our decision to throw the state's combined effort behind this campaign is the result of a very careful analysis made to determine as nearly as possible just what the future held in store for Idaho and the Pacific northwest, considered in a sense the nation's last frontier." "In this section, I believe we can expect during the next two decades a migration unparalleled in the country's history, mainly because we have expansion possibilities—undeveloped natural resources; tillable land and the owner and industrial possibilities to offer.

"Idaho is on the verge of becoming not in name only, but literally—is the 'bread basket' of the west."

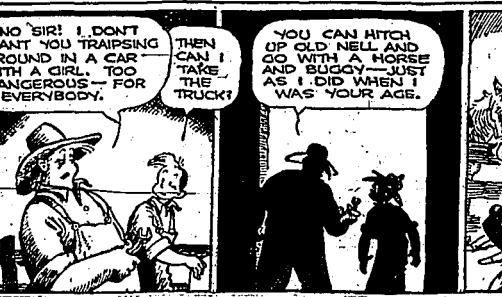
