Before a throng which packed all available space south of the Kansas statehouse, he delivered in clipped sentences the first statement of policies on which the new deal will be challenged at the polls by his party.

Cash farm benefits, relief for the needy, 'frugality in conducting the public business, freedom from excessive expenditures and scrupulous taxation' a constitution which is not above change, but must be changed to meet the needs of the people of the program he laid before the electorate.

Time and again, applause broke out once started, Landon broke through to conclusion of the 4,000 word address. Seriously and solemnly, he read his address, but now and again with a nod of his head for emphasis.

Landon, dressed in a light summer suit, wearing a vest, blue tie and soft-collared shirt, began speaking at 2:24 p. m.

For nearly ten minutes the crowd cheered and shouted, the bands played, and Kansas suffragers were shouting their approval.

Officials said it was difficult to estimate the number of persons who came to the platform.

Brigadier General Milton R. McLean, Kansas adjutant general, in charge of police and ceremony, said reports of the national guard indicated that 120,000 crowded Kansas streets.

Crowd Shows Greeting As far as could be seen from the statehouse platform, Landon was greeted by a sea of women and children.

The nomination program, which was outlined by Landon, national Republican chairman, briefly introduced Representative Bertrand H. Snell of New York, permanent chairman of the Cleveland convention.

Then Landon came forward as the multitude shouted his welcome. "I accept the nomination of the Republican party," he began, only to be halted by applause.

"For the presidency of the United States," he continued, "I have received the support of a straight-forward speech," he said.

From the audience, a voice boomed "yes, sir," and the crowd joined in an approving cry.

Pointing toward the climactic evening ceremonies attending Gov. Landon's address, the milling thousands of visitors made the most of a triple column procession.

Undated by temperatures of 100 degrees the gay crowds swarmed over the Capitol lawn, many waving a greeting to the governor in his official motorcade.

Two-Hour Parade Then down broad Kansas avenue and up to the state house rolled the parade. There was a band playing and a parade of cheerleaders.

Indiana and jipping cowboys were among the parade attractions. Six stage coaches, without the old-time cloud of dust, rattled by a line of motor cars.

FATHER COUGHLIN MAKES APOLOGY

Priest Declares Remarks Referred to 'Candidate Roosevelt'

DETROIT, July 23 (AP)—The Rev. Charles E. Coughlin made a public apology to President Roosevelt today for calling him a "liar" in a recent speech, but at the same time asserted his remarks referred to "Candidate Roosevelt" rather than "the president of the United States."

The formal apology was contained in an "open letter" in the July 21 issue of the periodical "Social Justice," and included a reiteration of the priest's belief that "I do not feel for the welfare of our common country that you be supplanted in office."

Commenting on the open letter, Father Coughlin said: "At this time the president has two identities: one—the president of the United States, and second, a candidate for the presidency. When he becomes a candidate he subjects himself to criticism and to the campaign speeches of his opponents, and as such he can claim no special immunity on the grounds that he is, after all, the president of the United States."

Church Councils Action The apology appeared as an American prelate in Rome disclosed that the church was considering action to restrain Father Coughlin's political activities.

To this Father Coughlin said: "Whatever orders come forth from Rome curtailing my preaching social justice, I shall be only too happy to obey."

WASHINGTON, July 23.—Further modification of the government's western soil conservation program, to encourage emergency plantings of forage crops and conserve available forage as an offset against feed losses in drought states, was announced today by the

The new modifications applied to specified counties in North Dakota, Montana and Wyoming. They provided that farmers could plant emergency forage crops and harvest them for hay without affecting their eligibility to participate in the conservation program.

The modifications further provide that farmers in all states in the western region who have planted soil conserving crops with a nurse crop may now harvest the nurse crop for hay if they have a good stand of the soil conserving crop, without affecting their eligibility for payments under the program.

TOPEKA, Kas., July 23 (AP)—Following is the text of the address of Governor Alf M. Lind...

"Tonight, facing this honor and responsibility, I hope for the gift of divine inspiration for the work I want every man and woman in the nation to understand my every word...

"The citizen who assumes the duties of a legislator, he must work for many millions of people. He will faithfully execute the obligations of his office...

"No man, in common good faith to fellow citizens, can assume the duties of his high office of chief executive and take the oath of office unless he is fully aware of the meaning of this oath...

"The 1933 platform of the Republican party has my complete and hearty approval. It is the platform which we can achieve the full national life that our resources can support."

"I intend to approach the issues fairly, as I see them, without regard to party or personal bias. I intend to stand for what I believe is right and just, and to stand for what I believe is best for the people of this country."

"No people can make headway where great numbers are supported and where the majority is not the rule. The law of this nation shall rest on the shoulders of the people who are to be governed."

"The world has tried to conquer this depression by different methods. None of these has succeeded. A truly successful recovery has been hindered, if not defeated by political considerations of expediency."

"Our own country has tried one economic theory after another. The result has been a series of failures and received extraordinary powers upon the assurance that these were necessary to overcome the depression."

Mormons Gather on Hallowed Ground in Tribute to Pioneers

PALMYRA, N. Y., July 23 (AP)—Pioneer day, a red letter day of more than 1,000,000 Latter Day Saints throughout the world, will be celebrated tomorrow on the ground where the faith originated a little over a century ago.

The three-day program, which is expected to attract more than a thousand missionaries and faithful from all over the country, will begin shortly after sunrise with a prayer meeting in the sacred grove, where Joseph Smith is believed to have received his first vision.

At 10 a. m., a meeting will honor pioneer saints who were forced to leave this community and make a dangerous and arduous journey across the continent, to find an eventual haven at Salt Lake City.

Community singing, a play and a pageant are scheduled with the latter depicting life in pioneer days. A cast of 100 will portray the story of the flight of Mormon, subsequent capture, history and its relationship to Christianity.

125 missionaries from the eastern United States will hold a regional conference. J. Reuben Clark, of Salt Lake City, first counselor, will be the leading officer of the church at the celebration. Don B. Colton, president of the group, will preside.

Bishop to Report

VATICAN CITY, July 23 (AP)—Possible disciplinary action against Father Charles E. Coughlin in connection with his political activities tonight will be reported in Rome by Bishop Michael Gallagher of Detroit.

The Detroit radio priest's recent speech in which he called President Roosevelt "a liar" caused a "painful impression" at the Vatican, a high American prelate said.

Action by Pope Pius, however, will not be taken until a report is made by Bishop Gallagher. Father Coughlin's ecclesiastical superior, now on his way to the Vatican.

Bishop Gallagher in an interview in New York when he left July 13 said: "Any statement that I have rebuked or do rebuke Father Coughlin is an exaggeration."

"It is simply that I do not approve of his method of expressing himself. He is entitled to his own opinion."

Entrance of Father Coughlin into American politics through his national union for social justice and his recent alliance with William Lemmon's party movement and the Townsend old age pension plan have caused much discussion behind the walls of the Vatican. Authorities said the only likely drastic action against Father Coughlin would be a command from the priest's bishop to refrain from further political activity.

Prelates said almost the entire American hierarchy was against Father Coughlin's movement and, they added, Pope Pius himself is contrary to the participation of priests in politics.

Murtaugh Man Describes Hazardous Journey Down 'River of No Return'

MURTAUGH, July 23—John Marshall, of Murtaugh, returned Tuesday from a boat trip starting at the head waters of Bear valley, on the middle fork of the Salmon river, journey called the "River of No Return."

The party consisted of Dr. R. G. Frazier's 1935 river expedition, numbering eight in all.

Single year Dr. Frazier and party run a difficult river, taking motion and still pictures for various news concerns. He pronounced the Colorado river the most hazardous. This party followed Mr. and Mrs. Hyde of Kimberly on their fatal trip down the Colorado.

It was the first party of boats to run the middle fork of the Salmon river. From Sulphur Falls there were no portages made. A Mr. Wagner in 1925 carried his canoe around the bad rapids, this requiring six months. Dr. Frazier and party made the trip from Bear valley to the middle fork in six days. From there to Riggin's the trip was made in three and one-half days.

During the trip the party had very narrow escapes. In places the boats were pinned on the rocks by the current, taking much time and work to dislodge them. At Big Malheur rapids three boats were tipped over at one time, pinning the oarsman under. All escaped death, but Captain Howery suffered a broken leg. One boatman was thrown

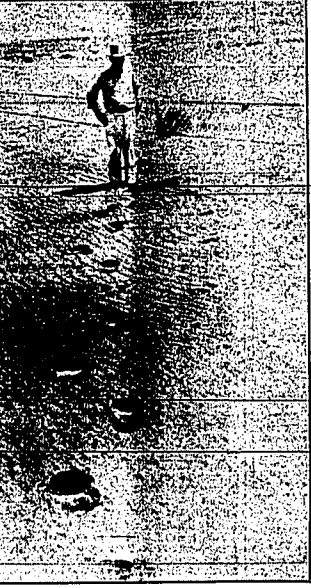

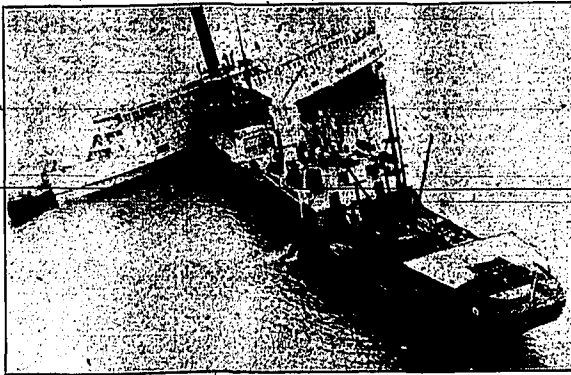

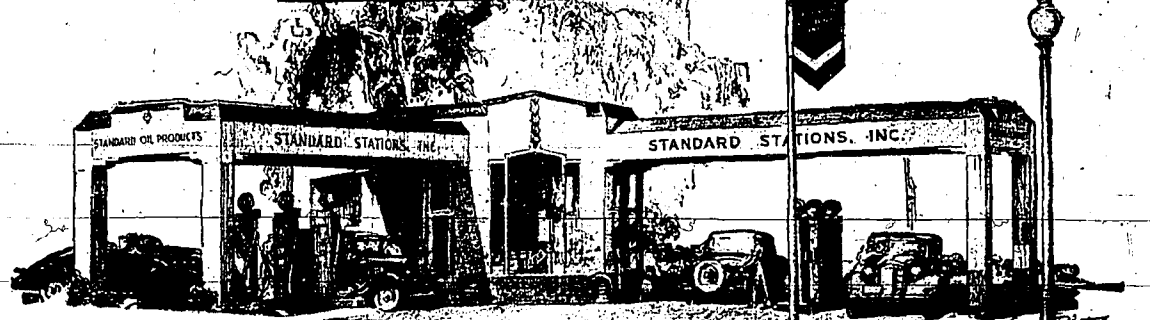

NEW BOARD MAPS WAR ON DROUGHT

Erection of Thousands of Small Dams Suggested

WASHINGTON, July 23 (AP)—Seeking a "long range" program to end the menace of drought, Morris L. Cooke, chairman of President Roosevelt's new great-plains drought committee, today suggested erection of thousands of small dams and the laying of hidden rivers as a possible solution.

At a press conference, Cooke said that these small engineering works conserve water at its source for pumping by electricity to arid regions.

The committee met for the first time today. Next session will be held for the next two weeks, after which the committee is expected to leave for the southern Pacific fringe of the great plains and study conditions.

Return of high temperatures in much of the great plains and parts of the corn belt served to revive officials said, the possible need of governmental livestock purchases and the AA committee is ready to operate on a moment's notice.

Officials said no government purchases would be made so long as a favorable price spread of \$2 to \$2.50 was maintained between fat cattle prices and the quotations on stockers and feeders.

A \$10,000,000 program to reduce drought damage through water conservation in the Red river basin was forwarded to President Roosevelt during the day by Secretary of the Interior.

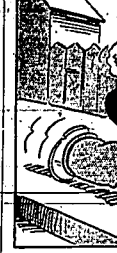
"The old will."
