What Gentlemen Prefer In Sandwiches-- Told At Last

In a survey recently undertaken to ascertain what men prefer in the way of sandwiches, a baked ham or white bread won over all contestants. When it came to the mustard, it was about a fifty-fifty proposition. A sweet pickle was favored as an ideal accompaniment by most, but some preferred chili.

Second place was held by cheese, most declaring for Swiss, but about equal numbers voted for Brick and American.

Third choice went to the hearty meat sandwich, cold roast pork and beef, boiled fresh tongue and corned beef all having devoted admirers. One man extolled the virtues of smoked ham, lightly fried and placed between slices of golden brown toast with a few slices of cucumber and onion.

Liver sausage enjoys greater popularity among men than women, while few men will taste tin bolton and summer meat loaves when available on a make-it-yourself buffet board. Both sexes are devotees to sea foods of sandwiches, such as shrimp, crabmeat, lobster and tuna, while egg and green-pepper salad sandwiches are never left on the table when men are at a picnic. Deviled ham is another favorite that always has plenty of takers.

Vote for "Peters".

The Denver sandwich, he-man sustainer, is relished by many. They made good fellows and are sometimes "extra special" to someone on a cooking or fishing expedition.

Allow one and one-half eggs, one small slice of ham, or two slices of bacon, and three slices of bread per person. Use toast or plain bread buttered, or fry on both sides for bacon drippings. Fry ham, or bacon, and place on one slice of bread. Top with another piece. Season with salt and rolls of eggs and beef. Combine, adding salt and pepper to taste. Fry and cut into sections to fit slices of bread. Add chopped green peppers and onion if desired. Place on second slice of bread and top with third. Accompany with sliced tomatoes, if available.

Bacon combinations especially popular among men include bacon and Swiss cheese, bacon and peanut butter and bacon, stuffed olive, cucumber and mayonnaise. The bacon should be hot and crisp and may be either laid on in strips, or crumbled into the buttered bread. A lawyer recommends a sandwich made of ground carrots, nuts and American cheese, mixed with enough mayonnaise to spread, as being refreshing when combined with crisp lettuce on white bread.

For a sophisticated tea-drinker nothing can quite equal a sandwich which employs thick slices of chicken, white meat spread with mayonnaise between the first and second layers, and a generous spreading of Roque-

fort cheese sprinkled with chopped parsley and overlaid with lettuce between the second and third.

The salmon or tuna fish club sandwich is favored for very hot days. This sandwich employs three slices of toast for each sandwich. Spread the first slice with softened butter. Lay on slices of tomato, strips of bacon and a leaf of crisp lettuce. Cover with second slice and spread with flaked salmon or tuna, sprinkled with lemon juice. Spread top slice with mayonnaise and place downward on salmon. Serve with stuffed olives and radish roses.

New sandwich aids which have appeared recently on the market include chopped olives, both green and red, which come in tins, and stuffed olive rings. The latter, combined with cream cheese and sardines make a highly satisfactory summer sandwich that goes well with cold drinks.

Add orange and lemon rind to butter and cream well. Add egg and salt and blend. Add sugar, alternately with fruit juices, beating until smooth and of right consistency to spread.

2 squares unsweetened chocolate

1 tablespoon water

1 1/2 cups sweetened condensed milk

Melt chocolate in top of double boiler. Add condensed milk, stir over boiling water 5 minutes until it thickens. Add water. Cool. Spread on cold cake.

Caramel Frosting

1 1/2 cups brown sugar firmly packed

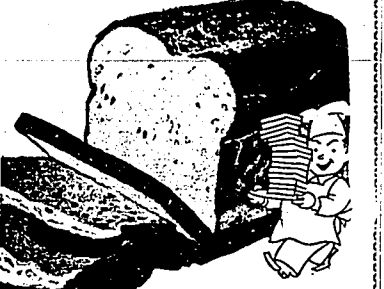
1 1/2 cups granulated sugar

1 1/2 cups milk

2 tablespoons butter

Combine sugars and bring milk to a boil, stirring constantly. Then boil, without stirring, until a small amount of syrup forms a very soft ball in cold water. Add butter and remove from fire. Cool to lukewarm and beat till the right consistency.

1/2 teaspoon salt

2 teaspoons baking powder

2 tablespoons shortening

About 1/4 cup milk or milk and water.

Mix together the flour, salt and baking powder; cut or rub in the shortening until the fat is thoroughly blended with the flour. Then mix to a soft dough with the milk or milk and water. Place this soft dough in a well-greased loaf pan. Let this stand, for five or ten minutes. Then bake in a moderate oven (350 F.) for 45 minutes.

Cream the butter and sugar together; add the well beaten eggs. Add the milk, a little at a time, alternately with the sifted dry ingredients. Bake in a shallow greased pan. The Sally Lunn should be about one and three-fourths inches thick when baked. Use a hot oven, about 425 F., and bake for 20 to 25 minutes. Cut in squares and serve at once. Butter it while hot.

Batter Cakes

2 cups flour

1 teaspoon salt

1 teaspoon soda

2 eggs

2 cups clabber, or buttermilk

4 tablespoons butter, melted.

Sift the dry ingredients together. Beat the eggs and add to the milk. Add mixture to the dry ingredients, beat well and add the butter. Bake on a lightly greased griddle. When bubbles stop rising, turn the cakes over and bake on the other side. When using a griddle requiring no greasing, increase butter to six tablespoons.

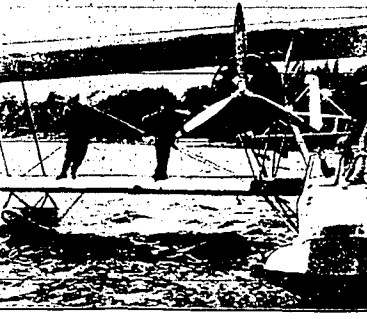

By ALAN GOULD (Associated Press Sports Editor) BERLIN, July 24 (AP)—Dropped from the American Olympic team for "violation" of training rules, famed swimmer Eleanor Holm Jarrett tonight fought to be given one more chance to defend her 100 meter backstroke swimming championship.

The New York girl was dropped from the team tonight when the American Olympic committee at the Olympic village in Germany.

After she herself had failed in an appeal to Olympic officials, a petition, signed by 200 athletes, requesting reconsideration of her case, was handed to Avery Brundage, president of the American Olympic committee.

Brundage said he would give consideration to the petition and any other information which might alter Mrs. Jarrett's case.

"I talked for over an hour with the committee on the train from Hamburg, but I feel that they are unwilling to change their minds unless additional pressure is brought to bear."

Decision Most Staid Dr. Joseph N. Raymond of Princeton, after hearing the swimmer's appeal, said the decision which dropped her from the team must stand.

The general manager among coaches, managers and athletes is that they feel she has been prejudiced severely and should be given a chance to show she can come back.

Dr. Graeme Hammond of New York, president of the American Olympic association, interviewed Mrs. Jarrett and threatened to file a petition with the American Olympic committee.

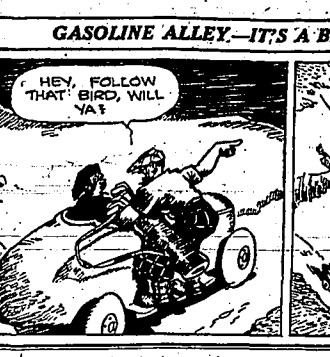
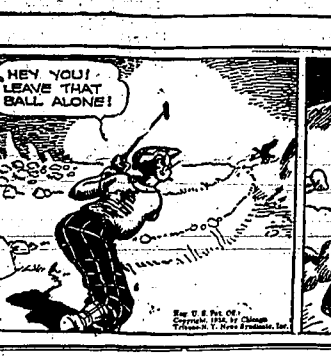
