

BRITAIN HASTENS DEFENSE AT SEA

Admiralty Announces Start on Building of Two New Warships

LONDON, July 29 (AP)—Great Britain hastens plans for the empire's "greatest navy" tonight. Rushing to bolster her defenses, the first lot of the admiralty announced construction of two battleships will begin in January, 1937, with prior considerations to be argued out later.

"Arrangements for laying down these ships," Sir Samuel Hoare told the house of commons, "are being made in full accord with the declared policy of his majesty's government to press on with naval replacement and the new construction program with all possible speed."

The new construction program will make an end to the five-power Washington naval treaty with its limitations on defense, and the coming into effect of a first-order accord.

Under the wide latitude provided the admiralty, Britain, France, and the United States, with the proviso they exchange information on plans before construction is begun.

Japan is not a signatory of the new pact, and this fact was in the minds of members of commons during discussion today.

Peter MacDonald, conservative, announced he had under "close attention" reports Japan contemplated warships with 18-inch guns.

More Army Officers—

WASHINGTON, July 29 (AP)—The new department announced today reserve officer training units will be established in 25 more colleges and universities this fall to enlarge the reservoir from which future officers may be drawn for the army.

The new units—in addition to the 324 now providing specialized training in the different military branches in 254 educational institutions—would increase the number of ROTC trainees from the 127,555 enrolled last year to 150,000.

Research Staff Develops Unique New Locomotive

NEW YORK, July 29 (AP)—A "two-in-one" steam turbine electric locomotive, capable of being split and used as two separate steam-lined plants or together in tandem fashion, was announced today by the Union Pacific as a development of its new research department.

The new locomotive, which is to be built by General Electric, will have a maximum speed of 110 miles per hour. It will be delivered probably early in 1937. Its weight per horsepower—of which each unit will be 2,500—was eliminated by the company at 30 per cent less than the conventional steam locomotive.

It will use oil for fuel and will have fuel and water capacity for continuous operation for a minimum of 500 miles without refueling.

Each unit is 40 feet long and connected with a 225 kilowatt, three-phase, 60-cycle, 220-volt generator to provide electricity for six traction motors—one for each of the six driving wheels of each unit.

Luna said he believed unfamiliarity of American motorists with the metric system of measurement used in Mexico has been a factor in recent fatal accidents on the Tijuana-Ensenada highway.

"When you see signs 'slow down to 50 kilometers,' you should reduce your speed to 30 miles an hour for safety," stated a handbill given to motorists crossing the border.

HORSES SUFFERING FROM BRAIN FEVER

GOODING, July 29—Brain fever in horses has reached epidemic proportions here, according to Dr. E. H. Ikard, federal veterinarian, and in the Hagerman valley the mortality rate is exceeding the county rate of last year.

The epidemic this year has been much heavier than last, Ikard states. New cases are being reported every day. Four in Gooding and one in Wendell were reported Tuesday morning.

The Hagerman valley is most seriously struck by the disease with more than 40 cases reported during July. There have been about 200 cases reported from each the Gooding and Wendell sections. Jerome county has a few cases as has the Richfield section. The epidemic has been reported from around Duih, where the epidemic was only slightly felt last year.

A greater infestation is reported from according to veterinarians who attended a state meeting in Pocatello last Sunday. Areas affected by the disease a year ago are reporting more intense epidemics this year, with some areas free of the brain fever a year ago, being afflicted this year.

Despite more effective serums and more knowledge of how to efficiently treat the disease, its incidence in this section this year are more virulent with higher death rate.

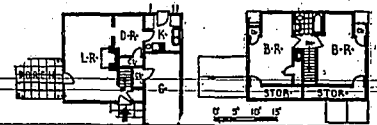

CASSIA, MINIDOKA WEED TOURS HELD

Borah and Clark Address Joint Picnic Session at Paul

PAUL, July 29 — Weed tours in Cassia and Minidoka counties terminated today when the two groups assembled on the Paul school grounds to hear Senator William E. Borah and Congressman D. Worth Clark.

Approximately 200 persons, many of whom had taken part in one of the two noxious weed control tours, assembled at the grounds, the occasion being held in conjunction with the annual picnic of Minidoka-Pomona Orange.

One tour covered the weed control projects in Minidoka county while the other visited Cassia county projects, the two leaving from Rupert and Burley in the morning.

County Agent speaks — At each point of visitation out of Burley, lectures were given by County Agricultural Agent W. W. Dulister, who had charge of the tour. He was assisted by P. L. Kohout, state supervisor of noxious weed control, and Julian Coleman, county weed supervisor, who supplemented Mr. Dulister's remarks.

Each speaker at the afternoon meeting at Paul stressed the importance of the noxious weed control program and urged a permanent system of control and eradication after completion of the WPA emergency set up now in effect.

Agromonist on program — H. L. Spence, state extension agromonist, gave an account of the development of the noxious weed menace in the state and explained the methods being used to combat it.

Congressman Clark and Senator Borah reviewed recent congressional action and federal appropriations to carry on the work now under way, and urged unity of action between the government, states and counties and individual farmers in the future war on noxious weeds.

Other speakers included Victor J. Smith and Frank Kershinski, Burley farmers, and George Branzel, Rupert farmer, all of whom expressed themselves in accord with the determination to stamp out noxious weeds in the state. Mr. Smith discouraged too much reliance upon the federal government for aid, but urged greater local effort and cooperation.

The meeting was presided over by T. E. Clark, Minidoka county commissioner, and made during the afternoon hours presided by the Auburn high school band.

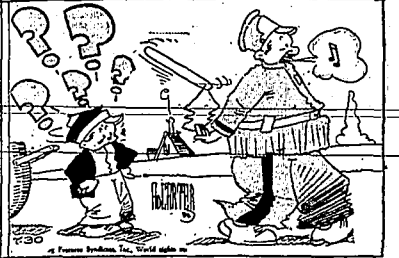
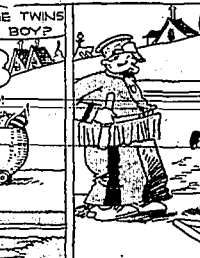

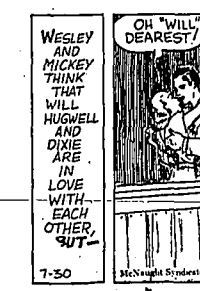

He was brought to the hospital here after his injuries were examined by a Twin Falls physician.

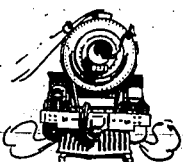
FUTURE FARMERS MEET FOR CATTLE JUDGING

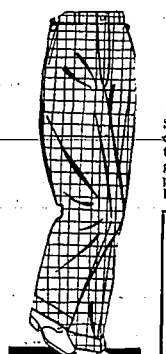
