EX-NAVAL OFFICER FACES INDICTMENT

Grand Jury Accuses Farnsworth, Two Japanese in Conspiracy

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11 (AP)—Naming two Japanese naval officers as conspirators, a federal grand jury today indicted former Lieutenant Commander John S. Farnsworth for plotting to betray American military secrets.

Assistant United States Attorney Samuel F. Beach said he had not sought the indictment of the Japanese officers, Yosiyuki Iimura and Okura Yamaki, because they were protected by diplomatic immunity. In an earlier indictment Farnsworth, who was ousted from the service in 1926 for "scandalous conduct," was accused of delivering a confidential naval publication to unnamed Japanese agents.

To Injury of U. S.

Claiming that both Iimura and Yamaki had served as Japanese naval attaches at the embassy here, Beach said he believed they had let the United States "some time ago" plotting to betray American military secrets. The grand jury charged that Farnsworth had "conspired and conspired" with the two Japanese officers to "turn over secret documents," with reason to believe that they would be used "to the injury of the United States and the benefit of Japan."

Beach said he would try to prove at a federal district court trial in October that Farnsworth was paid \$500 a month during the period of the conspiracy, and that he also received "an entertainment fund and several bonuses."

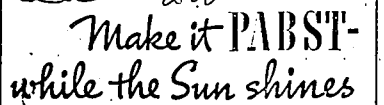

POTLATCH REJECTS STRIKERS' DEMAND

Manager Declares Increased Wages, Shorter Hours Unjustified

BOISE, Aug. 11 (AP)—C. L. Billings at Lewiston, manager of the Potlatch Forests, Inc., informed Governor C. Ben Ross, in a letter the chief executive released last night, that the company cannot consent to increase wages or shorten hours of lumber workers now on strike in north Idaho.

Clearwater county now is under martial law as a result of difficulties between the forest workers and lumber companies, of which Potlatch Forests, Inc. is among the largest.

"The price of lumber does not justify a wage increase or a shortening of hours at this time," Billings wrote. "Already the strike has been called off in areas north of Clearwater county without any substantial change in wages, hours or living conditions."

"For these reasons our company cannot now give consideration to any other demands which are discussed in detail herein."

Return to Normalcy Billings praised his letter with the statement:

"Your representatives have indicated that you would like to have a statement from our company as to our attitude toward men on strike and toward the items in our present policy of which the men complain, and we feel that this request is entirely proper and that the company should make a frank and clear answer."

Based on his statement on the assumption that "normal conditions" are to be restored as to law and order and normal relations be resumed as to employing labor," Billings stated his company's future policy on other controversial items to be:

1. No bar to reemployment. Will refrain, as much as possible, from hiring strikers and non-strikers in the same camp when operations resume.

2. To take steps to secure cooperation of the working men to improve sanitary conditions that, Billings admitted "undoubtedly have been bad."

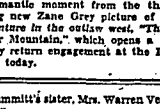

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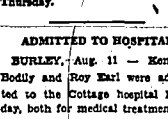

FOOD BEARING SHIP SPEEDS TO ALASKA

500 Persons Reported Near Starvation on Territory's Rim

BARROW, Alaska, Aug. 11 (AP)—Hunger-stricken Eskimos scanned the horizon tonight for the approach of a food-bearing ship and small launches made ready to rush emergency supplies at high speed to the beleaguered Arctic rim-point along Alaska's Arctic rim, where about 500 persons were reported near starvation.

The coast guard cutter Northland, with limited supplies aboard, was due today at Wainwright, 60 miles southeast of here, on a rush trip from Nome.

Frank Daugherty, Indian office representative, pointed out the Northland's limited food supplies, but said substantial relief might not be available until the arrival of the Indian bureau's ship North Star about two weeks hence.

On Verge of Starvation

Wainwright, last night, had died from starvation, Dr. Henry W. Greist, Presbyterian medical missionary, had reported at least 500 persons near starvation.

Hunting was described as best in the early morning and late evening at which times the birds frequent the brush. During the best of the day they remain in the high lawns. Many of the hunters report an abundance of birds but few are available for shooting.

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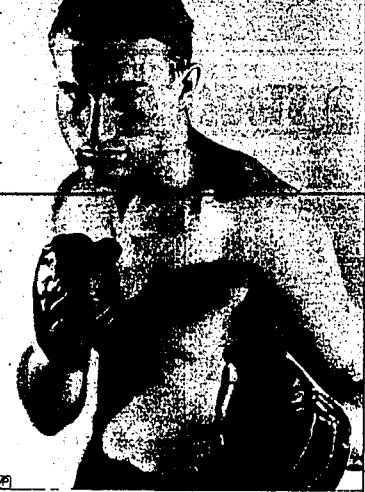

IDAHO SOCIALISTS NAME CANDIDATES

Convention Decides to Write Names on Ballot and Save Fees

Names of Socialist candidates will not appear on the ballot in Idaho this year, it was determined at a closing session here last night of the Socialist state nominating convention.

Instead, Socialists and their friends will write in on the ballot the names of candidates for presidential electors, second district congressmen and state officers who were nominated by the convention.

The convention's decision was reached after it was ascertained that the money that would be impossible to register the 20 delegates which Idaho's election law requires. Approximately 100 delegates were registered at the opening session.

The following statement was given out by Don P. Donahue of Pocatello, Socialist state secretary:

"We Socialists will write in the names of our candidates on the ballot and not pay excessive filing fees. The money that would have been used for filing fees will be used to circulate our candidates' names by mail. At the same time we will continue our economic and educational program in which we will concentrate our energies now and during the next year."

Candidates List

Nominated by the convention for governor was Alan L. Adams of Caldwell who as the party's candidate for governor two years ago polled approximately 1200 votes. Other nominations for state officers were as follows:

Thomas J. Connors of Emmett for lieutenant governor; Dr. George A. Aupperle of Idaho Falls for secretary of state; Dr. J. E. Knicker of Pocatello for state treasurer.

Overlure of Welpe for state auditor; H. H. Fredholm of Twin Falls for attorney general; Mrs. John Hendricks of Lava Hot Springs for state superintendent of public instruction; G. F. W. Donahue of Pocatello for state judge.

Dr. J. E. Knicker of Pocatello was the convention's choice for second district congressman.

For the presidential electors were H. B. Butler of Jerome; C. E. Nobel of Lewiston; Del. C. H. Bonners Ferry; John Hendricks of Lava Hot Springs.

A spokesman for northern Idaho timber strikers, Everett Anderson of Spokane, suggested that the

The platform declared for "taxation on income ability to pay, inheritance and gifts, thereby opposing the retail sales tax as a burden upon lower incomes."

Repeal of the criminal application laws and restriction of "use of the national guard for provocative purposes," also was urged.

The 10-year program provided among other things for "work for the Columbia River Valley Authority project."
