LONDON, April 11.—British forces under General Allenby operating against the Turks in Palestine have achieved another brilliant success by advancing a mile and a half over a five mile front, the war office announced today.

The advance was made west of the Tul Keram Ramlah railway in the district north of Jerusalem.

REPRESENTATIVE KAHN OPENS DEBATE IN BRILLIANT SPEECH

Opposition Admits Defeat Is Certain

Leader of Opponents of Measure Says He Wants Draft Age Raised to Forty to Secure Non-Combatant Status

WASHINGTON, April 11.—Facing the same opposition he fought a year ago for the passage of the original law, Representative Julius Kahn, republican, led the administration fight to amend the selective draft act in the house this afternoon.

The amendments proposed by the administration are those: To base district quotas of future drafts on the numbers of men in class I in the various districts.

To exhaust class I in all parts of the country before class 2 is approached, upon in any part of the country.

To permit the president to call into service men in any class who were given deferred classification on industrial grounds.

To raise the age of the original draft law, so as to include today to sponsor the amendments, forcing the administration to accept them.

Large Wounded American Casualty List

First Real Struggle With Infantry Results in Big Victory—Only One American Reported Killed in Action.

WASHINGTON, April 11.—The overnight casualty list from General Pershing contained 124 names.

One soldier was killed in action. Two dead of wounds, five died from accidents, and 13 died from disease, 69 were severely wounded, four were missing in action and thirty were slightly wounded.

Boat Ford, (I. N. S. Staff Correspondent) WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY IN FRANCE, April 11.—Americans troops on the front north of Toul last yesterday afternoon beat off the heaviest attack yet delivered against them.

The attack was completely routed and suffered heavy losses. It was the heaviest operation in which Americans had taken part and was marked by terrific artillery fire.

The attack was delivered early in the morning under cover of a heavy barrage fire and the Germans were favored by a thick mist which hampered the allied artillery.

Indian War Threatened In Nevada By Three Tribes—Troops Are Ready

RENO, NEVADA, April 11.—A serious uprising threatened by three Indian tribes, armed, it is said, by white men near the Utah-Nevada line, is causing the authorities here great concern today and steps have been taken by the civil and military authorities to prepare for any contingency.

Troops at Fort Douglas, Utah, are held in readiness to move at a moment's notice and a force of United States deputy marshals may be sent on from here.

The Deep Creek, Poiche and Sheahone Indians are all said to be in the revolt; the trouble is caused from efforts of the authorities in the Deep Creek valley in Utah to make the red men register for the draft and to compel others to send in their questionnaires.

French Town Thrown Into Pocket by German Advance Yesterday and Filled With Poison Gas by the Boches—Armentierres of No Strategic Importance, But Its Capture Enables Teutons to Straighten Their Lines—Lull Continues on French Front Where Huns in Single Attack Are Driven Back With Loss, Allies Confident That Drive Will Prove Futile.

LONDON, April 11.—German troops on the Armentierres front, in the great battle along the Franco-Belgian frontier, have reached Steenwerck, according to unofficial advice received from the front this afternoon.

PARIS, April 11.—Another comparative lull has settled down upon the French section of the Picyard battle front.

French artillery was active on the right of the French line during the night between Montdidier and Noyon, the communiquing said.

The withdrawal of the British forces from Armentierres did not come as any great surprise however, in view of the formation which the battle front acquired as a result of the German gains north of the Lya river and south of Messines ridge on Wednesday.

When the British forces fell back they evidently followed the railway line leading from Armentierres northward through Tazebonek. This railway is paralleled by a road which passes through Bailleur and Cassel.

The league now endeavors to furnish not only help in the moral training of children, but devotes attention to vocational training, indoor and outdoor games and pastimes, civics and betterment, health and everything that looks toward a high citizenship. Dr. Winfield Scott Hall of Northwestern University Medical School, Chicago, Illinois, is the national president, and twenty-five of the leading men and women of America are on the advisory board.

CORTEZ, COL., April 11.—Metallurgists report that the government are testing a new mineral that promises to revolutionize the making of iron castings. Assays of the new mineral show traces of vanadium and manganese.

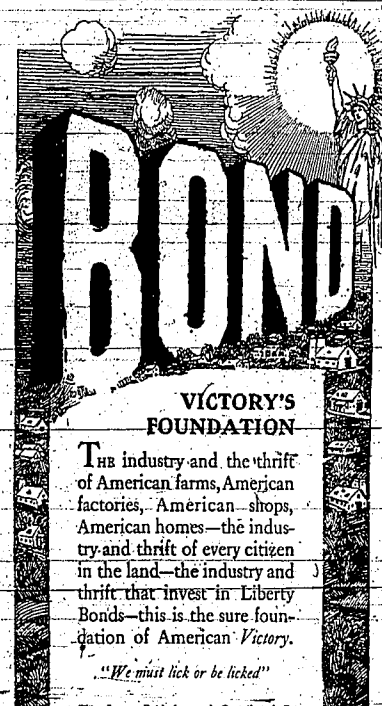

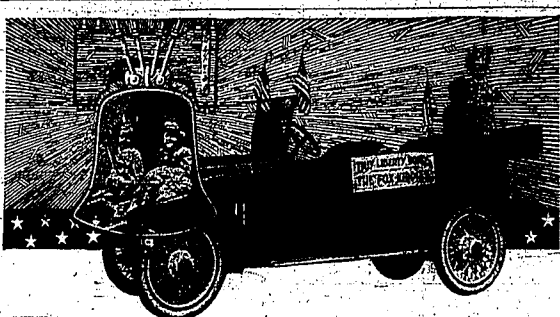

Dealing with the wonderful feat of Mathewson on the mound is unnecessary here. Telling of his wonderful achievements, would be like going back over a page of old year calendar, for every baseball fan knows of his greatness.

As a member of the Giants he broke into the spotlights for the first time in 1903, when the team jumped from first place to second. Two seasons later he set a world's series record that stands unobscured—the feat of pitching and winning three shutout games in one week, which he did at the expense of the Athletics. # MEXICAN TROOPS ENTRENCHED ON THE RIO GRANDE

### LARGE BODY HAS "DUG IN" A SHORT DISTANCE FROM FT. HANCOCK

### Five Mexican Soldiers Killed

Official Washington Declines to Make Statement in Regard to Situation—Pending Development.

PORT HANCOCK, TEXAS, April 11.—Mexican troops across the Rio Grande here dug themselves in eight miles south of here and today are exchanging challenges and glares with American patrols opposite them. According to reports brought here at least 600 mounted federalists are near the border today, the columns of troops having been observed leaving Magdalena, west of here.

The purpose of the concentration of Mexican troops is not apparent here. The only reason, it is thought, is that Carranza intends to give battle to the Germans who pursue benefits into Mexico.

Colonel George T. Langhorne, commander in the Big Bend district, received reports of the killing of five Mexican soldiers at the hands of United States cavalry.

WASHINGTON, April 11.—Administration officials are watching very closely developments along the Mexican border. The killing of five Mexican federal troops near Fort Hancock, Texas, and the sniping reported across the border from a distance of the Big Bend country has again attracted attention to the danger of trouble there.

The Mexican conditions and outlaws who have been operating along the border at certain sections are reported to have been directed by German spy commanders to return to their fire in certain instances, with the result that there have been Mexican casualties. ### THE SPUD FAMILY

The Spud family of its 1918 reunion reported 30,000,000 new members, says a report of the agricultural department. Some family especially when you consider that it numbered some 412,636,000 span last year.

Of course there are in terms of bushels, you understand. Now all these Spuds must find a home. Somewhat and somehow the consumption of the last few long months must be increased to take care of the enormous increase in crop.

And the Spud is, their cause, so traveling as in days of yore. The alphas have no room in their hotels to carry such big people as the members of the Spud family. It is a little hard to get enough shipping space to send food across to our soldiers and was associated in the most concentrated form possible.

So the Spud family must stay at home this year. But they can do work on this side by furnishing people with the best substitute in the world for wheat. What can be baked or boiled potato covered with gravy is a wheat substitute.

War has proven a lover of ease in the Spud family as well as in human society. For the potato is a vegetable that is easy to grow. It has been found to be just as satisfactory as the No. 1 grade. And, incidentally, it is a vegetable that is light in weight.

A big increase in the sweet potato crop has made the potato family decidedly more democratic than usual. By a new curing method used this year in the south the best potato is kept in much better form for shipping north than in previous years and these potatoes can be secured much more cheaply than usual.

The "Irish potato" should be more widely used now, as it was by our grandfathers, as a bread substitute. The potatoes may be washed after being well drained, and added to the flour and other ingredients in quantities of from three to five percent. If much potato is used no water will be needed except enough to cover the pieces. (Use one cup of washed potato flour and 1-4 cup of water.)

Besides this means of vast saving in the making of bread, every American family should make it a wartime custom to eat at least one potato every day. Cultivate the acquaintance of the Spud family for the war's duration.
