DRIVE AGAINST AMIENS RENEWED STRONG HOSTILE ATTACK DEVELOPS

Germans Concentrate Tremendous Artillery Fire as Their Hordes Gather-Camon Roar All the Way to Montdidier-Shelling Unusually Severe at Somme and Avre Rivers, Hangard and Villers-Assault Expected at Bethune-Huns Prepare for Frontal Attack at Picardy.

That the Germans have already renewed their drive against. Amiens (the great British base, on the railway lines running from Paris to the channel coast) was indicated by the official report issued by the British war office today.

The report todd of increasing artillery activity on both the Picardy battle fronts and said that strong hostile attacks were developing in the Albert sector (between 17 and 18 miles northeast of Amiens) and between the Somme and Avre rivers.

The Germans have concentrated a heavy artillery fire especially at the point where the British and French armies join, which forecasts another effort to break the armies faunder.

The artillery activity extends all the way from Montdidier northward through the district lying immediately east of the British base at Amiens to the Belgian frontier.

The shelling has been especially severe in the following districts: Between the Somme and Avre rivers, at Hangard-en-Santerro (about ten miles southeast, of Amiens, at Villers-Bretteneux, immediately east of Amiens, in the Amer- and Scarpe-valleys, north-of-Bethune in the region of Bailleul.

The bombardments north of Bothune august another German ef-fort to break through-the British front to the railhad position at Bothune—an operation they attempted once before; but with no agrees. The Germans will have to-advance at least four miles if they hope to get into that town but should they succeed it would be a strategical success of no mean importance. The British defenses are very strong in that sector and it is accepted as a foregone complusion that the Germans will fail if they undertake the enterprise again. The German line jving north of Bethune represents the extreme westers end of the salient that was driven into the British front from Amentieres. By striking southward at the tip the Germans might hope to widen the southern fank and lessen the menace from the British counter blows.

British counter blows.

Bailleul lies on the northern Hank of the Flanders salient at the edge of a series of important height positions which the British hould. Any German efforts in that zone would be directed westward in the direction of the British railhead position at Harebronek.

Fronial attacks are looked for on the Picardy front. It is the evident intention of the Germans to disregard the dangers of flanking movements against the sides of the salient and to make another effort to break into Amiens.

This was the thirty-fifth day of the German offensive and the filteenth day of the british against the German submarine bases of Ostend and Zeebrugge on the Belgian coast cottinues to divide public interest in the war nows. It is believed that the sinking of concrete laden ships across the harbor mouths affeld especially at the entrance of the Bruges canal, will greatly hamper submarine operations for some time.

PARIS, April 24.—Violent bombardment of the Franco-British positions on the Picardy battle front was reported by the French war office today.

The heaviest shelling was between the Somme and Anere rivers, east of Amiens, and in the district around Hangard-en-Santerre and Villers-Brettenneux at the tip of the German salient.

LONDON. April 24.—Increasing artillery activity marked the night's operations on the Flanders and Picardy battle lines, according to the official report of the war-office today.

In the sector of the Apre and Somme rivers and in the Valley of the Scarpe the hig guns were especially busy. There was also heavy cannonading north of Bethose and in the sector of Bailland.

"Between the Somme river and the Avvo river the German attillery violently bombarded French and British, positions, last night," the communique said: "The shelling was capetally violent in the sectors of Hangarden-Santerre and Villera-Bretenneux."
