GERMAN CAPTURED BY MARINES ADMITS ONE ABILITY

He laughed and replied: "After last week's fighting my God, we know that Americans are fighting like hell."

HUNS LOSE GROUND AT MONTDIDIER AND OISE RIVER ZONE LAST NIGHT

German Armies Exhausted Are Resting on Arms Where They Can While the French Allies Organize for Renewal of Fight—Germans Make Slight Gains at Aisne-Marne Front, but Fail to Dislodge Americans Who Scatter Them With Withering Fire—Tremendous Sacrifice of Life Marked Final Efforts of Crown Prince's Army.

The Germans have lost more ground on the field of their latest offensive (the Montdidier-Oise river zone) but gained slightly on the Aisne-Marne front.

These are the chief developments of the past 24 hours: 1. The French, by a brilliant assault on the eastern flank of the Montdidier-Oise salient, drove the Germans back across the Matz river, recapturing important high ground around Croix Ricard and the village of Melincourt.

2. Too exhausted to attack, the German armies holding the western wing of the salient and the center, rested upon their arms while the French utilized the breathing space to organize and link up their newly won positions.

3. Violent fighting rages along the northern half of the Aisne-Marne front, the Germans gaining a foothold in the villages of Cricurves-Villarsic and St. Pierre-Aigle, respectively eight and nine miles southwest of Soissons.

4. Furious efforts were made by the Germans on the southern end of the Aisne-Marne front to dislodge the Americans from Belleau wood and Boerschens (northwest of Chateau Thierry) but the assaults broke down under the withering fire of the Americans and the French who were fighting with them.

The latest German drive has reached the phase of the earlier three. Weary and faced by determined troops the Germans have come to a standstill just as they did in Picardy, in Flanders, and on the Marne.

Nothing of importance has taken place in the northern battle areas.

This was the eighty-fifth day of the German grand offensive.

(I. N. S. Special Correspondent) WITH THE FRENCH ARMY, June 12.—The entire aspect of the Montdidier-Oise battle has been changed by the French counter attacks which were launched on the evening of June 12.

The Germans galloped their horse forward in the belief that the entire line of battle was turning against them.

Tanks supported the French infantry in their advance over a seven-mile front, the entire aspect of the battle to be covered with German dead.

The importance of the French gains is magnified in view of the enemy's salients to the east—and west of this zone of fighting and also when it is considered that the Montdidier-Oise salient had been broken through by the Germans.

Four German divisions were concentrated against the French on a two-mile front and were upon the point of attacking when the French artillery opened against them preliminary to the counter assault.

The idea of reconstruction is an entirely new view of military life, especially in the case of the American medical association here.

### Belgian Army Officer at Chautauqua

Saw Active Service in the Trenches and Was on Secret Service in Germany

Capt. J. M. de Beaufort, author of "Behind the German Veil," one of the most popular books on the war, is one of the most notable personalities upon the Chautauqua platform this year. He is a Belgian captain of artillery, noble of the Duchy of Luxembourg, veteran of the retreat from Antwerp and all the early fighting of the war, including the Battle of the Yser. The most thrilling experiences of his career came later, however, when he spent four months in Germany on a secret service commission. With the aid of a letter from Hindenburg's nephew, he interviewed many of the military and political leaders of Germany, including Hindenburg himself. He visited the Italian, French, Russian and Roumanian fronts from the German side and great naval bases of Kiel and Wilhelmshaven. His story as told at Chautauqua is one of the most interesting and informative lectures upon the platform.

### Ambulance Sector Shelled by Huns

Many Non-Combatants Exposed and Some Wounded Under Hatless Fire of the foe.

PARIS, June 12.—A number of American non-combatants, mostly stretcher bearers, have been wounded or sustained cases of shell shock in the fighting around Chateau Thierry on the Marne front. The Rev. John Clifford, aged 55, formerly pastor of the First Presbyterian church at Tucson, Ariz., attached to the marines as a Y. M. C. A. worker, received a colonel of marines who was wounded north of Chateau Thierry. Mr. Clifford crawled through a wheat field through heavy fire pushing a stretcher, ahead of him. A shell burst near him, rendering him unconscious. He was found by Arthur J. Phillips, formerly an editor on the Boston Transcript, a stretcher man at Chateau Thierry, rescued the wounded man. Mr. Clifford was taken to the hospital at Lancaster, Pa., and George B. Douglas of Georgia, both Y. M. C. A. workers and stretcher bearers, suffered shell shock.

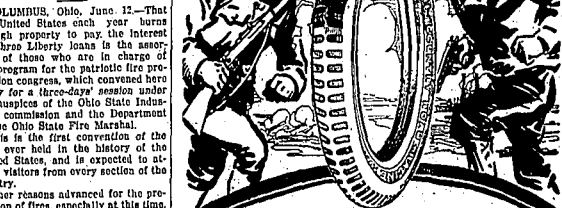

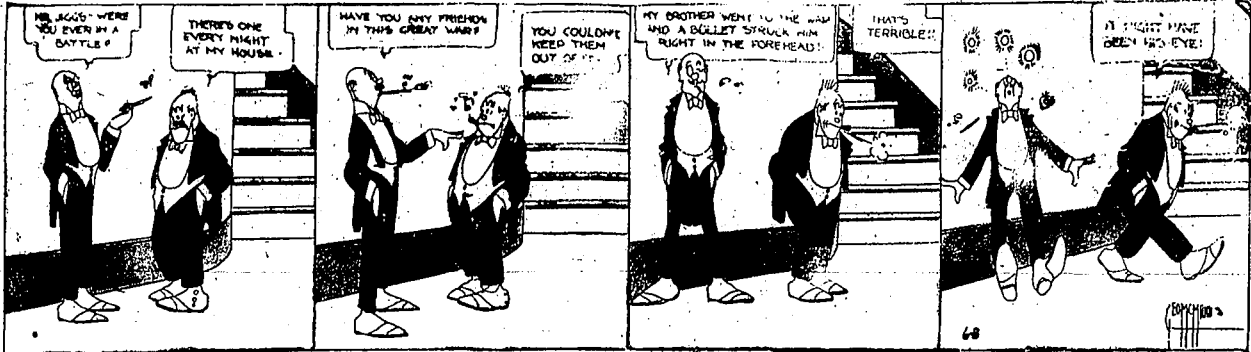

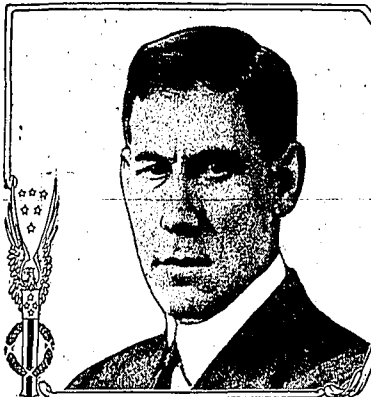
