Massif of Lassigny Taken by the French Army this Morning

BRITISH PART IN THE PRESENT OFFENSIVE BIG SPECTACULAR EXPLOITS OF MEN FROM ALBION ARE NOTABLE

Cavalry Did Marvellous Work on Front Many Incidents Cited by International News Service Correspondent Showing Bravery of the Troops of Briton.

Port Ford. (I. N. S. Staff Correspondent) WITH THE PIEDARTY ARMY ON THE PICARDY FRONT, Aug. 12 (night).—The exploits of the British cavalry in the present allied offensive forms one of the most striking features of the war. Also was one of the largest and most spectacular.

One British horse brigade captured a German hospital with the complete staff and a train filled with 400 soldiers, returning on leave of absence. This brought the total of prisoners captured by this unit up to 1,100.

In addition to a village a large tract of territory was taken, affording the aid to the infantry advance. A British cavalry division operating with an Australian corps advanced beyond the German gun line and captured a large number of new assault.

One brigade of cavalry advanced north of the Amiens-Chaunoy railroad while two others pushed on ahead to the south as soon as the infantry had attained the second objective and had captured the old German line of defense, including Harbonieres, Calu and a few other towns.

The cavalry held on to the advanced positions until the infantry caught up. Light forces of foot soldiers supported the advance in the early stages, but the cavalry soon swept forward beyond their influence.

Another brigade of cavalry distinguished itself through the capture of a brigadier general, who dispatched two squadrons to surround Harbonieres. These squadrons, upon reaching the northern and southern outskirts of the village encountered machine gun fire, but reported they were able to hold on, the topography being favorable.

The general, being an opportunity, sent a reserve regiment of cavalry north of Harbonieres with orders to push on to Yauvillers, leaving the original squadron on the outskirts of Harbonieres.

RUSSIAN TURMOIL CAUSES TROUBLE FOR TROOPS OF GERMAN EMPIRE

MAN POWER BILL IS ORDERED TO BE REPORTED HALF MILLION HUNS POUR INTO UKRAINA TO QUELL REVOLT

New Government of the North Prosperous German Troops Advance on Petrograd—Wholesale Massacre of Bolsheviks in Ryzan and Novgorod—Landstrum Troops Sent

WASHINGTON, Aug. 12.—Further light on internal conditions in Russia reached the state department today. It came in the form of a confidential report by an eye witness of events and while not official is accepted as in every way true. It emphasizes the growing friction between the Ukrainians and the Germans.

The German soldiers in the Ukrainian section are constantly being increased and there are now between 400,000 and 500,000 there. These troops are compelled to travel in large squads. When isolated groups go out they are attacked by armed peasants who refuse to hand in and in many cases bury them alive.

Germany will never be able to organize them for any military service on the western front, the report says. The banks in that country have been re-opened and while there is a charge to handle the old accounts none is made for handling new accounts many of which have been opened.

There has been a heavy influx of hoarded money which has inflated the shortage. The report states that the writer saw a large hoard of money with 100 men of the educated class on Krasnodar but for what purpose the author did not know.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13.—The new Russian government of the north, which is complete within a few days, is becoming a very distinct factor in Russian affairs. Information reaching the diplomatic service today, coupled with a number of official reports, indicate that this government is rapidly extending its control. Recruits to its ranks are flocking from all sections of Russia.

The controlling factors of the government are said to be operating in complete sympathy with the old diplomats, who are now established at Archangel, Ambassador David R. Kestel, it is said here, will be in charge of the Russian communication with the leaders who are accepting his advice in all things.

Meanwhile a reign of terror is reported from the south of Russia. The Bolshevik government is reported to have abandoned Moscow for Krasnodar. The Bolsheviks are reported to be holding British and French subjects as hostages and have also arrested and executed, without revolutionary pretense, a number of revolutionaries.

SPAIN WILL BREAK WITH GERMANY SOON

LONDON, Aug. 12, 4:43 p. m.—Spain is really to break with Germany and may enter the world war on the side of the allies, according to reliable information reaching the International News Service late this afternoon.

SUBMARINES ARE STILL ACTIVE ON THE ATLANTIC

MORE SHIPS SUNK IN THE VICINITY OF AMERICAN SHORE

Battle With One Reported Today

Belief Is That Submersible Was Sent to Bottom and Washington Awaits Official Confirmation of Story.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 12.—The navy department this afternoon was without any news from the sinking of an American destroyer and two submarine chasers had engaged in a battle with German submarines. There was a possibility, however, officials said, that such an encounter had occurred without any official report having yet been made to the department.

AN ATLANTIC PORT, Aug. 13.—News of the destruction by German submarines of three vessels off the coast of Ireland within a few hours, and the report of a battle between an American destroyer and two Yankee submarine chasers and a Hun diver, 100 miles off Fire Island, was brought to this port today.

Thirty-one members of the crew of the Norwegian steamer Sommerland, taken over by the American government, arrived here today reporting that they had been rescued by a submarine off Fire Island yesterday morning shortly after 9 o'clock.

A British steamer arriving here today before noon reported having received a wireless that an American destroyer and two American submarine chasers were giving battle to a German submarine 100 miles off Fire Island. The submarine was believed to have been the one which attacked and sank the Sommerland.

The British liner also received a wireless from the Penitence already known to have been sunk by a U-boat west of the Azores. The vessel was said to have been sunk by a shell fire from a German submarine.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13.—That the Norwegian steamer Sommerland, yesterday by a German submarine, 25 miles southeast of Long Island, was sent to the bottom by a wireless-controlled torpedo was indicated in the reports made to the navy department and struck the commercial world.

GREAT HUN BASE AT ROYE MADE UNDEFENDABLE BY LATEST VICTORY

L'Econville Captured by the Gauls Today and Ground Gained North of St. Claude Farm—Germans Begin to Evacuate Trenches West of Bailly—Los Logos Wood Again Retaken—Operations on Front Slowed Down Last Night but Predicted Long Lull Failed to Materialize—Only Twenty-one Miles From Hindenberg Line of 1917 When the Allies Started to Advance This Morning—Americans Fight Way to Outskirts of Bray This Afternoon.

(Earl C. Reeves, I. N. S. Staff Correspondent) LONDON, Aug. 13.—(4:24 p. m.)—All of the Massif of Lassigny (west of the Oise river) has been captured by the French. It was learned this afternoon.

The whole German line in that district must be withdrawn and the German base at Roze will become undefendable as a result. Noyon will be brought under concentrated artillery fire. It was thought the Germans might be able to hold on to Chaunoy for a few days longer.

(The Massif of Lassigny is a stretch of high ground.) During the morning the French captured L'Econville and gained ground north of St. Claude farm. Now that the French hold the crest of Lassigny Massif, time will be required to work downward and bring forward the guns.

The Germans are not expected to make any attempt to capture Lassigny Massif. Only one Austrian division has appeared on the western front. This was the one seen near Luxembourg. It was moved to the western front, according to allied opinion merely to cement the Austro-German alliance.

LONDON, Aug. 13.—(1 p. m.)—Americans, fighting on the northern bank of the Vesle river, have recaptured the ground which they lost at Fiamettes, said a dispatch from that front this afternoon. The Germans delivered a heavy attack against the Americans on the northern bank of the stream in the Fiamettes sector.

The Americans were forced back to the southern bank, but made a counter assault, retaking all their former positions. The Germans have begun to evacuate their trenches in the Oise valley to west of Bailly.

The French captured Los Logos wood to the eastward where they had been driven out by a German counter attack delivered during the preceding night. All the lost ground was recaptured this morning. The French are pressing close to Roze from the west and south. Heavy local fighting has continued along the Vesle river in the region of Fiamettes.

(Earl C. Reeves, I. N. S. Staff Correspondent) WITH THE BRITISH ARMY ON THE PICARDY BATTLE FRONT, Aug. 13.—(10 a. m.)—The Americans are fighting with the English and Canadians north of the Somme advanced fully a mile to the outskirts of Bray-Sur-Somme today.

The advance followed the repulse of a German counter attack. The Germans threw in fresh divisions against the Americans who are adding the English and Canadians southeast of Morlaucourt and delivered a violent assault.

WORK OR FIGHT AMENDMENT INAPPLICABLE TO STRIKES

President Given Power to Enforce

Those Drafted Under Twenty-one Have Two Years Education at Expense of Government Under Provisions of Amendment.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13.—Carrying a work or fight provision that will apply to all men between the ages of 18 and 45 placed in deferred classification under the draft, the new "man power" bill was ordered reported to the senate by the military affairs committee today.

The work or fight amendment which was written by Senator Reed is designed to prevent looting and not as a weapon against strikes.

The working of the amendment is such that it could be so used, but the power to make regulations for its enforcement is left with the president. The president was ordered by the committee to make such regulations as could not be used as a weapon against organized labor.

The work or fight amendment is the form of a proviso to follow the present draft of the original bill and providing for deferred classification and exemption. The amendment follows:

"Provided, that when any person shall be placed in a deferred or exempted classification for any reasons in the paragraph next forth, he shall not be entitled to remain there unless he is in good faith, continue, while physically able to do so, to work at and follow such occupation, employment or business and in the event he fails to do so he shall again become subject to the draft. The president shall make regulations for enforcing this provision.

The amendment as agreed to by the committee was a compromise between the provision proposed by Senator Thomas, which would have inducted deferred men into the military service after five days of willful idleness, and a more moderate provision proposed by Senator Reed.

Three other important amendments to the bill were adopted by the committee before the bill was ordered reported. The most important of these was one giving to volunteers and drafted men below the age of 21 the right to receive an education at the equivalent to the term served in the army or navy but in no case would exceed two years.

The amendment provided that the application for such educational privileges shall be made within six months after discharge, and that the applicant shall begin his studies immediately upon its approval.

NEW GOVERNMENT OF THE NORTH PROSPEROUS

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The Czech-Slovak forces in Siberia have joined with detachments of the Japanese army. The Japanese leadership and are said to be equipped with arms and equipment. There is no official word yet from the Japanese government as to whether they will ally themselves with the Czech-Slovak forces or with the Japanese.

It is understood here that Japan has urged the United States that Japanese forces be increased as developments warrant and that no definite strength be decided on until the Japanese forces are very anxious that the Czech-Slovak be made a most formidable force so that they will at all times be able to control a large area.

TACOMA CITY EMPLOYER NOW BELONG TO A. O. F. I.

TACOMA, WASH., Aug. 12.—Employees of this city, except common laborers, have perfected a union and have just received a charter from the American Federation of Labor. The employers declare they were forced to take this action because of the dissatisfaction of the city council against unorganized labor.

In some few cases there may have been a benefit, but the farmer is being asked to produce more than the moderate profit that should have come their way in peacetime. It is a question of how much more about the limit of what the average farmer made.

CRUELTY AND LUST WEAPONS OF HUNS

Conquered Peoples Shamefully Treated for Advantage of the German State.

Prussian Officers Calmly Tell How Starvation and Abuse Are Made to Give Their Purpose—Captive Women Made Slaves.

"This I have seen. I could not believe it unless I had seen it through and through. For several weeks I was with it. I went all about it and back of it; inside and out of it was shown to me—until finally I came to realize that the incredible was true. It is monstrous. It is unthinkable, but it exists. It is the Prussian system—F. C. Walcott.

No more graphic description of the ravages of the German soldiery upon the civilian population of invaded countries has been given than is contained in the brief and simple statements of F. C. Walcott, now connected with the United States food administration, who was assistant to Mr. Hoover while America was feeding Belgium, Poland and northern France. In one of these statements Mr. Walcott says:

Even now I find it hard to describe in comprehensible terms the mind of the Germany, which dominates and shapes all German thought and action. Yet it is as hard, as clear-cut, as real as any material thing. I saw it in Poland. I saw the same thing in Belgium. I heard of it in Serbia and Rumania. For weeks it was always before me, always the same. Officers talked freely, frankly, directly. All the staff officers have the same view. I got me to tell it, as General von Kries told me, in Poland, in the midst of a dying nation. Germany is determined to rule the world, or at least a great part of it. The German people are the human material out of which the German state, other people do not count. All is for the glory and might of the German state. The lives of human beings are to be conserved only if it means for the state's advancement, their lives are to be sacrificed if it is to the state's advantage. The state is all, the people are nothing.

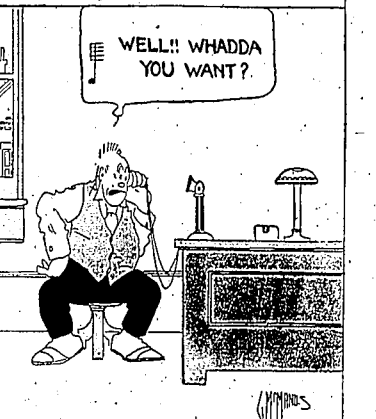
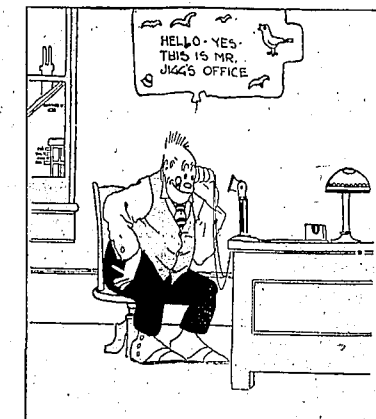

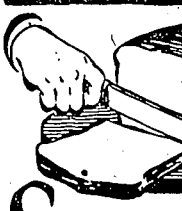

In his address he had pictured such conditions as he said he could not believe unless he had seen the situation themselves, and had lived with it for weeks. He showed these terrible conditions to be the result of deliberate plans on the part of official Germany, and in summing up he said:

"Such is the German mind as it was disclosed to me in several weeks' contact with officers of the staff. Treaties are scraps of paper, if they hinder German aims. Treachery is condoned and praised, if it falls in with German intention. Men, lands, countries are German prizes. Populations are to be destroyed or enslaved so Germany may rule. Women are Germany's prey, children are spoils of war. God gave Germany the Hohenzollern and together they are destined to rule Europe and eventually the world—this reason this cause."

"Coolly, deliberately, officers of the German staff, permeated by this monstrous philosophy, discuss the demoralization of peoples, the destruction of nations, the bombing of other civilizations, for Germany's account."

"In all the world such a thing has never been. The human mind has never conceived the like. Even among barbarians, the idea of such a thing never came into the mind. The mind can scarcely grasp the fact that these things are proposed and done by a modern government professedly a part of civilization in the family of civilized nations."

BIDS FOR WAGON DRIVERS

In the office of the Superintendent of Schools next Monday evening, August 19, the wagon committee of the Board of Education will meet to select the drivers of school wagons for the coming school year. The members of this committee are D. F. Clark, C. H. Hoppelman and W. W. Parsh. Anyone who is interested in securing a position as driver of a school wagon should send his application to the Superintendent of Schools or to some members of the wagon committee.

It is always advisable to index in your application such matters as your place of residence, whether or not you yourself expect to drive the wagon, whether or not you own the wagon you propose to use, etc. The following concerns the new scale of wages for the drivers of school wagons. All routes that are two miles long or less than two miles long will draw \$3.00 per round trip. All routes that are more than two miles long will draw for each round trip \$3.00 plus 60c for each additional mile above two miles. This means that the driver of a route 3 1/2 miles long will get \$3.90 per round trip, the driver of a route 4 1/2 miles long will get \$4.50 per round trip, and the driver of a route 5 1/2 miles long will get \$5.10 per round trip.

It should be remembered that the Board of Education provides the drivers with school wagons.
