LAWRENCE, Mass., Feb. 3.—Twenty thousand textile workers went out today, demanding a 45 hour week with the same pay they received for the 48-hour week. The strikers refused to obey the strike call, and this workmen claim they will win the "eight hour" method. Hundreds of pickets formed a cordon about the mill district and as the strikers who "did not strike" were being driven back, they were met with the "eight hour" pickets. State Cannot Tax Certain Leases

Supreme Court Rules That These Held in Other Leases Are Not Subject to Tax. WASHINGTON, Feb. 3.—A state cannot tax railroads for the lease interests they hold in other lands, the supreme court of the United States this afternoon decided. The court reversed the supreme court of the state of Georgia which upheld the tax collector general of the state in imposing a tax on the Central of Georgia Railroad Co. for its holdings in the Georgia and Savannah railroads and portions of the Southwestern railroad. The supreme court sustained the plea of counsel for the railroad that the taxation was in violation of the 11th amendment to the constitution.

This latter idea is expressed by Count von Reventlow, who said in an interview: "We did not win, but we did not lose."

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—The first duty during the reconstruction period is to provide profitable employment for returning soldiers.

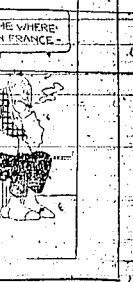
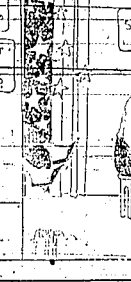
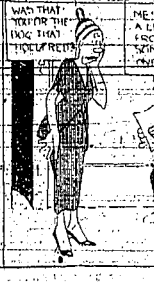

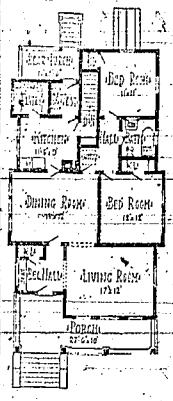

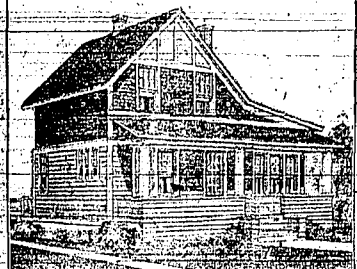

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3.—Creation of a comparatively few railroad companies with the "capitalization" based on real values of the properties, with government control, has been suggested as the solution of the country's railroad problem, according to Walter B. Hines, director general of railroads.

Mr. Hines was emphatic in his declaration that either the recommendation of former Director McAdoo and Interstate commerce officials should be adopted, or the railroads returned to the earliest possible date.
