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Kearns Brands Fulton - With Being a Liar

Manager for Jack Dempsey Declared Fulton Averted a Second Match and Is Talking

Jack Fulton (L. K. Sports Editor) who NEW YORK, Feb. 3.—Jack Kearns, manager of Jack Dempsey, today gave an additional spin into Fred Fulton's assertions that the latter had a Dempsey at Harrison park, N. Y., as a prearranged affair.

Kearns brands Fulton's contention as a fraud. He points out that it would have been the height of foolishness on the part of either fighter to have tossed the chances for a crack at the heavyweight championship by taking or stalling.

Boxing fans here recall that Fulton was summoned to appear before a New Jersey court last night during the week of the bout, and his statement that he had only 48 hours in which to train for Dempsey is being dissected.

Meanwhile plans for the big championship battle are expected to receive their final touch today with the arrival of The Hickman from the West. Hickman is due in New York for a conference with Kearns, and Jack Dempsey will be cleared as Fulton's opponent. Kearns reiterated his former statement regarding the signing of the contract by saying that he never will have no trouble in signing his man.

Meanwhile the boxing fans here are availing the opinion that Fulton has been making his statements today with the intention of leading the public to believe that he had secured a contract with the champion.

Up to date Kearns has not succeeded in calling a situation on the champion. The manager of the champion has not yet been named.

Kearns statement to the International News Service today follows:

Fred Fulton's ridiculous statement is the most audacious thing I have ever heard of in boxing.

There is not a shred of truth in it. It is an attempt to gain a lot of cheap publicity for Fulton and to discredit Dempsey at the same time.

The whole thing was concocted by a clique behind Fulton on the coast, who want to take the big hour away from The Hickman and Fred Fulton on the Pacific as William's opponent.

There is no truth in the statement and his accessories. They want to get their hands on the money that Jack Dempsey and I have earned.

"I'll say that Fulton was a combination of Harrison and Dick Egan with a left hand and right with a right. Why, Dempsey never saw Fulton, much less climbed into the ring with him. The whole thing is a lie."

Jack Kearns, who has been most hurt by Dempsey and I have earned, can take care of himself.

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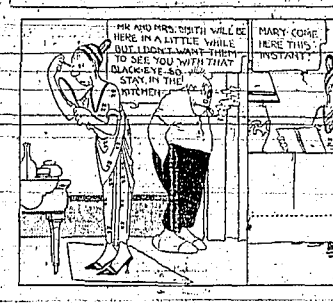

Famous California Promoter Tells Boxing of International News Service What Boxing Needs to Stimulate Its Comeback

I have always believed, and still believe, that boxing has an important future.

With the world war at an end, boxing is going to make a greater effort than ever before to establish itself as a national sport which can be conducted legally and successfully.

It since good news—good boxing news—the different states would interest themselves, it is my belief that the battle leading the way. There are but few leagues the past. There are boxing bills under consideration in a number of states now, and from all quarters they are going to meet with success.

The great trouble with boxing has been the fact that it was not put in front of the game as a rule back what we might call "boxing," of public confidence and esteem. And you may not take this as meaning that I am purposefully questioning it, for I am merely expressing it, not of "law down."

The whole trouble, surely, is the promoter, the loser, is the nature of the fight as a rule, and especially in the case of the prize money, which has had a bearing effect in the past, and which that great state through promise of reward that it has not the law is not accepted.

The following letter regarding the next and final loan was received this week from the Idaho Liberty Loan State Central committee:

Mr. C. D. Thomas, Chairman,

My dear Mr. Thomas: I attended a conference called by James K. Lynch, governor of North Carolina, representative of the Fifth and Victory Liberty Loan organization, came from every town in the Washington, D. C., and in his address for the preparation of the bill, outlined the following:

The loan schedule will come in April. The amount likely will be six million—the same as the Fourth Loan. With interest possibly a little higher—4 1/2 per cent. With tax gratuity features, same as the present loan, probably the issue will be five-year bonds, maturing in 1924, and will be floated as a popular loan, the government expecting all the people to take the bonds as holders, and it will be the final liberty loan. This means with initial payment of 10 per cent of subscription. The installment payments will extend over a long period, probably five months. The plan of floating loans for raising cities, counties and towns will be the same as in the last loan campaign so that every subscriber will know that he is expected to subscribe for as much as in the Fourth Loan.
