

DEPORTATION OF ALIEN I. W. W. AGITATORS FROM SEATTLE BEGUN

NEW YORK, Feb. 10.—The special train from the Pacific coast tonight will carry 40 aliens for immediate deportation, it is expected to arrive here this afternoon. The aliens will be deported from the local immigration station, officials said. It is understood that several additional to the ranks of aliens will be made here.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10.—The aliens now enroute from the west to New York for deportation include a couple of hundred of men who have been deported. They are to be deported for various reasons—national, anti-peace agitation, divers citizens, entrance into the country illegally, diseases, and so forth. The deportations of some of the lot were ordered some time ago, it was stated that the deportations could not be effected because of the lack of ship tonnage during and immediately following the strike.

SENIOR SENATOR FROM IDAHO AMONG FOES OF THE SUBMISSION

Has Been Before the Congress of the United States Twenty-nine Times—Was Passed By the Lower House Thirteen Months Ago Today—Vote in Detail.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10.—The vote on suffrage today comes just one year and one month after the date of the passage of the suffrage resolution by the house.

The proposal amendment to the constitution reads as follows: "The right of suffrage in the United States shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any state on account of sex."

It was first introduced in January 1878 by Senator Sargent, of California. Since that time it has been introduced 29 times. Three times the Senate has voted it down in 1887, 1897 and 1918. The first vote was in Washington, D. C., in 1878.

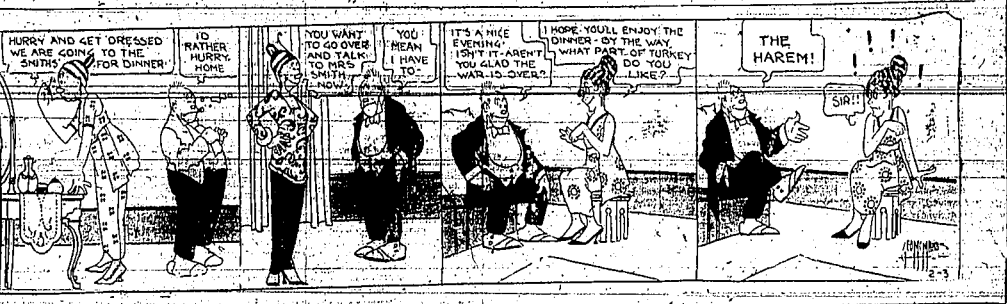

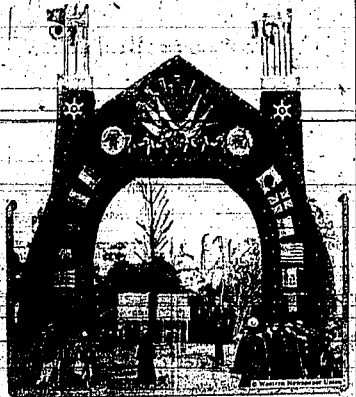
