## KELLEY'S SALOON CENTER OF INTERNATIONAL PLOTTING

### Fifty Thousand Dollars Sent From That Resort to Ireland to Help Foment Strikes There Is Charge of the British Government—"Kelley" Is a German Who Took an Irish Name to Help Cover the Work of Intrigue.

LONDON, Feb. 12.—The British government has traced in I. W. W. revolutionary fund of \$50,000 for use in Ireland directly linked to Kelley's saloon, 31 State street, Chicago, and has discovered a complete I. W. W. system of communication from Chicago, Boston and New York to Dublin and Belfast and a close connection between the American I. W. W. organization and the Sinn Féin in Belfast and the strikers at Glasgow.

As a result of raids on the London I. W. W. headquarters at 29 Theobald's road and the seizure of the names of the complete English organization, 220 members of the I. W. W. have been arrested and are now awaiting deportation to the United States from Boston post-conviction.

It is learned that "Kelley," the Chicago saloonkeeper, is a German, who assumed an Irish name and hence the famous "Kelley gang" involved in the robbery of silk shipments to France some time ago.

A former leader in the United States coast territory, who has just come from London, says he recognized names of I. W. W. members in Dublin and Cork who he had known in Boston and Chicago.

Among the literature seized at the Theobald road headquarters is a proclamation, addressed to the "Foreign News Protection Committee," protesting against the deportation of prisoners to Russia.

Another document dated July 11, 1916, is addressed to Herbert Samuel, secretary of Home Affairs, in which protest is made against the conscription of Jews.

Further revelations of I. W. W. complicity with Sinn Féin and British labor leaders is expected.

## TERRIFIC STORM CUTS OFF ALL WIRE CONNECTIONS EAST OF ROCKY MOUNTAIN SYSTEM TODAY

DENVER, COLO., Feb. 13.—Wire connection between the Rocky Mountain country and the east is severed today as a result of a snow and sleet storm in Kansas, Nebraska and Missouri.

The extent of damage has not been learned, but wire companies report miles of lines and poles down between Denver and Omaha. Trains from the east are hours late.

The storm swept into the mountain region from the Texas panhandle yesterday afternoon, cutting wire communication enroute, leaving Fort Worth, Amarillo and other Lone Star cities isolated telegraphically. The snow and sleet were accompanied by a wind that reached a velocity of 60 miles an hour at El Paso and blew itself down to 40 miles before hitting Cheyenne, Wyoming.

Over the only wire open to Grand Island, Nebraska, this morning came an appeal for snow plows to clear the railroads. The Grand Island operator reported snow drifted at some places to a depth of five feet.

Fear is expressed that there has been heavy loss of range stock in Wyoming, Texas, Nebraska and Southern Colorado points, where near zero weather prevails.

The dispatches contained in the Times today are largely repetition of those sent over the Universal Service wires to the Portland Journal and other western papers connected with the I. N. S. and Universal Services last night. The lone wire from the east that was left open by the storm was held for government use until noon today.

## PROFITEERING CHARGED WITH LABOR TROUBLES IN BUTTE

Speakers at Mass Meeting Called By Mayor Make Strong Charges—High Cost of Living and Wage Cut Are Given as Causes for Strike and Impending Anarchy—More Soldiers Arrive—A Few Minor Disturbances and Several Arrests Reported Today.

BUTTE, MONT., Feb. 12.—Butte, on the verge of a mental and physical crisis, and business paralysis, brought down upon it today by the impending situation, and after profiteering in flour is to blame.

That is the burden of opinion expressed here today following a mass meeting of citizens called by Mayor W. H. Maloney to discuss the strike situation in which approximately 15,000 are idle.

The strike is a protest against the dollar a day wage cut imposed upon men by living costs continuing at the peak.

Profiteering offered at the meeting placed the blame for Butte's present prohibition squarely on the high cost of living. Evidence was submitted showing profits of four hundred per cent and more in all manner of business enterprises. One firm is said to have started with \$100,000 capital and cleared up \$2,000,000 in a few months.

The strike situation is unchanged. Despite the announcement that street car traffic would be resumed, not a wheel on the line has turned. Mines are shut down and smelters inoperative.

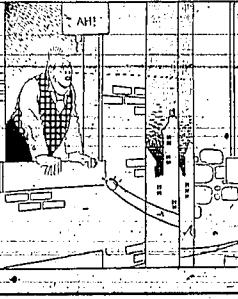

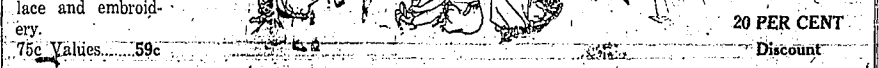
