SEATTLE BOILER MAKERS ASK FOR A NEW CHARTER

Would Sever Connections With Local That Refused to Return to Work at Request of National Organization—Manager of Emergency Fleet Corporation Says He Will Deal With Men When They Return to Work and Consider Their Complaints.

SEATTLE, Wash., Feb. 14.—As a means of getting back to work in the shipyard and at the same time obeying the orders of international officers, Seattle boiler makers today forwarded petition to the national organization at Kansas City for a new charter to take the place of Local No. 104, Boiler-makers, Iron Ship, Bridge and Hoop-makers.

Officers of the local union which is affiliated with the metal trades council have refused to heed the orders of the international officers but the men now on strike do not seek to work. The boiler-makers make up 15,000 of the 25,000 metal trades now on strike in this city. Officers of the Seattle Metal Trades council declared earlier in the month officers of the boiler-makers would have no effect on the strike here.

Seattle shipbuilders announced they have notified A. J. Berens, secretary of the metal trades department at Washington, D. C., that they have decided they will not allow any further wild financial tricks conceived as represented in Seattle in consideration of the continued misrepresentation of union officials and the unwarranted conditions which they have imposed upon the men. Berens, secretary of the C. I. O., P. M. A., manager of the emergency fleet corporation, is "standing pat" on his assertion that the government will not take up the strikers' demands until they return to work. In reply to a proposition submitted by C. B. Wiley, manager of the Zook Dry Dock and Construction Corporation, Plez reiterated his statement that he will be glad to talk in confidence to consider the strikers' demands if they should be started to work.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13.—A report out of conference of the oil leasing bill makes possible the leasing in whole or in part of approximately 1,000,000 acres of public land, 355,000,000 acres of forest reserve, 35,000,000 acres of coal lands, 4,000,000 acres of public land, 1,000,000 acres of phosphate land, is advanced for this legislation that it will go far toward development of natural resources of the west and at the same time insure to the government the right to regulate and control the property and natural resources and waste. FIFTY THOUSAND CHILDREN TAKING ENFORCED VACATION

One Hundred and Fifty Teachers Out

Board Blames City Manager of Union for the Fact That Not Enough Men Have Not Been Secured to Fill Places.

DENVER, Colo., Feb. 14.—With half the school boys standing guard at the building, to keep walking delegates from interfering with the janitors who have been ordered to clear the places of strikers, three of the 28 schools closed Monday, because of engine men and janitors, reported the morning.

Parents, mostly women, volunteered to take up the work of students scattered the streets. At the request of the school board, these guards have been sworn in as deputy sheriffs and constables, and are ready to resist force if necessary any effort to interfere with strike-breakers or men who have disrupted the union ranks and returned to their old jobs pending settlement of the wage question.

Members of the school board say their principal difficulty is to get the parents, the parent teachers organization and other civic organizations interested in the situation.

Thirty prospective city engineers, who say they are ready to take the places of the striking janitors, are standing at the school board hall, waiting for city license. Members of the school board have the charge that these licenses have been held up and other examinations delayed by officials in an effort to embarrass the school system of the city. Their charges are being investigated by the school board in delay of officials at the city hall.

More than 14,000 children are still on vacation. This is the second largest class of children to be kept out of school in 1919. The schools were closed for a week during the epidemic in 1918.

FULL DRAFT OF LEAGUE PLAN READ TO PLENARY SESSION

Preamble Sets Forth Purposes of Organization

Frequent Meetings of Executive Council Provided for—One Vote for Each High Contracting Party in Meeting of Delegates—Executive Council Composed One Each From United States, Great Britain, France, Italy and Japan, With Four Others Representing the Rest to Be Called By President of the United States.

PARIS, Feb. 14.—President Wilson as chairman of the league of nations commission, read the full draft of the league of nations covenant at a meeting of the plenary session at the Quai D'Orsay this afternoon.

The text of the preamble follows:

WHEREAS the peoples of the world have achieved a new era of international peace and security by the acceptance of all obligations, and not to resort to war, by the prescription of open, just and honorable relations between nations, by firm establishments of the understanding of international law, as the actual rule of conduct among governments and, by maintenance of justice and scrupulous respect for all treaty obligations, in dealings of organized peoples with one another, the powers signatory in this covenant adopt the following:

—That the covenant shall be effected through instrumentality of meetings of a high contracting party, representing high contracting parties, or at such other places as may be found convenient, and shall consist of representatives of the high contracting parties. Each of the high contracting parties shall have one vote, but may have not more than three representatives.

—That the executive council shall consist of the representatives of the United States of America; the British empire; France, Italy and Japan, together with representatives of four other states members of the league. The selection of these four states shall be made by the high contracting parties and in such a manner as to be equitable in the representation of the high contracting parties of the world, representatives of (blank) shall be members of the executive council. Meetings of the council shall be held from time to time, but may require and at least once a year at such place as may be decided upon, or failing to reach any set decision, at the city of Geneva. 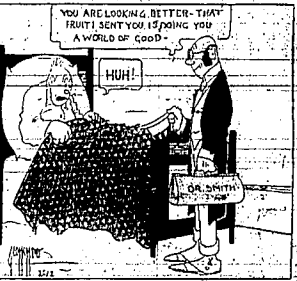
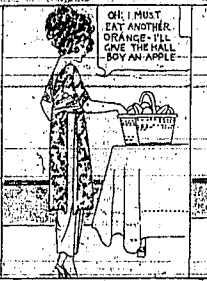
