ECONOMIC ASPECTS OF LEAGUE ARE GROWING IN IMPORTANCE

Resuscitation of World Must Be Largely Brought About by Economic Adjustments in the Opinion of the President—Freedom of the Seas Will Be Secured Through the New Peace League Russia Still a Stumbling Block.

(By Jay Jerome Williams University Staff Correspondent)
PARIS, Feb. 13.—(By Radio, via London)—President Wilson is going home, not today by any means, but a much wiser man. His view of the situation in which it exists today, and the fact that he has given to his associates here, have brought to the forefront and things—his views being that the greatest task before the world is its economic resuscitation.

This subject will be dealt upon by him when he addresses congress and also in his conference with the senate and house foreign affairs committees.

Of course the president's great triumph is the admission of the constitution of the league of nations before the plenary conference yesterday. The allied nations who aided him in the work of France were willing, after it had been read, formally to subscribe to it. France's position may be said to be not one of opposition to the league principle, but based upon the always recurring fear of invasion such as she has suffered in the past four years.

Her big plan is for the creation of an international military police force, but the president is confident she will come around to the way the rest of the allied and associated governments think. The freedom of the seas, it can be said, has entirely disappeared as a prospective problem of peace.

The president's original idea was the protection of the rights of neutrals on the high seas in the event of war. Since his arrival in France he has discovered that a league of nations will adequately care for this, so in time of war there will be no neutrals.

Mr. Wilson regards Russia as an insurmountable problem at present, but he hopes that when the Russians discover the benefit that the allies are able to find for land and sea, and realize that all the allies want to do is to make Russia a decent place to live in they will come back to reason.

Because of this the president has hope that the Plinkin conference will bring beneficial results.

Mr. Wilson also believes the territorial questions will be worked out satisfactorily. Indulgences, however, are that the solutions will be suggested only in the aggregate, thereby eliminating preliminary details which might arise.

The president's chief concern with regard to economic revival is to bring about a state of affairs which he believes is the best that the world can have. He believes that the economic life of France and Belgium will be amply safeguarded.

BOISE, Feb. 13.—The Republican caucus agreement to send the amendment for a primary law, which recently passed the senate, little chance will be made of it from the present form. This amendment was authorized today.

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ARMISTICE STEP TOWARD THE FINAL SOLUTION OF PROBLEMS

Twilight Sleep Before Birth of New Era—French Conservative Press Now Giving Praise to President and Predicting Success of the New Pact.

(The National Union Special Entered Dispatch)
PARIS, Feb. 13.—The new ministerial cabinet which Marshal Foch is taking to France and which President Wilson approved, sends a twilight sleep injection for the painless birth of the society of nations.

The French conservative press for weeks has been leaping daily upon the president, but today it is giving praise to the president and predicting success of the new pact.

These inglorious forebodings have turned into happy auguries for the new hour of nations.

President Wilson's press notices as the "leading midwife" are almost unanimous.

Indeed, the conservative papers now allow that with continued pushing by the same eminent "midwife" the child may yet grow into vigorous manhood.

As for President Wilson himself, it appears to dawn upon his original opponents that he issued such a fantastic monster as they imagined.

Taking his text from Mr. Wilson's letter to the French society of nations committee, Alfred Capus, editor of Le Figaro, who hitherto has been trying to capture the Wilson ideas with subtle sarcasm today admits that the president is more a disciple of Montaigne than of Kant.

Pertinax, editor of L'Echo de Paris, heretofore the president's bitterest critic also has some kind things to say today, though both he and Capus call the league an experiment and dwell on the necessity of France's protection in the future.

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ANSELL WANTS COURT-MARTIAL LAWS CHANGED

Acting Judge-Advocate General Says That Injustice is Done to Many Under Present

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13.—The present military courts in the American army during the war show that too many men were convicted on flimsy evidence who never should have been tried at all.

This summary of the alleged injustice of the court martial cases affecting thousands of American soldiers was made today by General Samuel T. Ansell, acting judge-advocate general.

General Ansell warmly advocated the bill of Senator Chamberlain to revise the court procedure. He suggested a few minor changes, most of which were designed to make the "draft" of the Chamberlain bill would improve.

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Robert Dollars Fleet Goes to the Atlantic

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OVERSEAS ARMY HAS BEEN MUCH REDUCED NOW

Nearly Three Hundred Thousand Men Brought Back From France in Trains since Struggle Ceased

NEW YORK, Feb. 15.—Officers and men of the American-overseas-armed in the number of 293,000 have been landed at different Atlantic ports according to figures made public today by officials at the port of embarkation office. At the time of the signing of the armistice two hundred and thirty thousand men were in France in England or enroute overseas.

All told 176 transports loaded with demobilized soldiers have docked at New York, Philadelphia and Boston since the cessation of hostilities.

Some of these ships have carried as few as one sailor. Others have brought as many as 9000, the largest transport being back 9001 this week— a record for the entire hemisphere (from anywhere).

Rough weather during the last two weeks has hindered port movements, according to the officials. The period from January 20 until March 1 is considered the worst of the year for trans-Atlantic travel and transports have not been loaded to their full capacity, while schedules have been easily but slowly changed.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 15.—A total of 1,174,655 officers and men have been actually discharged from the army of the United States, General March, chief of staff announced this afternoon in his weekly conference with members of the press.

The total number of officers and men covered for discharge is 1,021,568, the general continued, leaving a total, therefore, only 153,087 officers and men to be discharged under the terms of the armistice. The total number actually discharged—1,125,225 men and 1,429,765 enlisted men, he continued. The war department has disbursed \$15,419,412 of the discharged men in the officers' reserve corps, and has received applications for commissions in the reserve corps from 1/3 of the demobilized forces.

The future demobilization of the American army overseas will depend upon the military situation, the general said. "The process of demobilization in the United States is rapidly reaching the point where only the overhead remains," he said.

She has a record of 14 victories in the Miss America contests, and is the only woman to have won the title five times.

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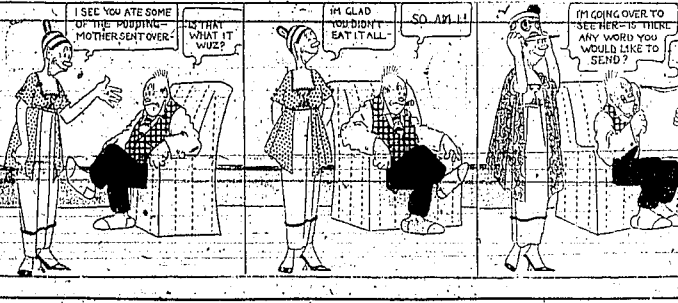

GERMANS READY TO SUBMIT TO RESTRICTIONS

Foreign Secretary Says Nation Holds East to the Fourteen Principles of Woodrow Wilson Internationally

LONDON, Feb. 15.—The German people are prepared to submit to restrictions of sovereignty involved in the League of Nations, according to a statement issued by the German foreign minister today.

"We do not recognize that Germany was solely responsible for the war and that she was guilty of heinous crimes and monstrous crimes," declared Count von Brockdorff-Rantzenau, foreign minister, in a speech to the Reichstag today.

The foreign minister declared that Germany is prepared to accept the League of Nations and the Fourteen Principles of Woodrow Wilson.

Diagram Showing Dependence of All Organs upon Spleen and Colon Therapy

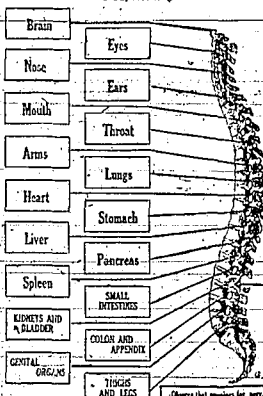

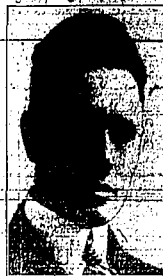

Constitution of League of Nations

(Continued From Yesterday)

Article XIII--The high contracting parties agree that whenever dispute or differences shall arise between them, which they recognize to be suitable for submission to arbitration, and which cannot be satisfactorily settled by diplomacy, they will submit the whole matter to arbitration. The high contracting parties agree that the arbitration court to which the case is referred, shall be a court agreed on by the parties or appointed in any convenient manner between them. The high contracting parties agree that they will carry out in full good faith any award that may be rendered in the case of any dispute which is referred out the award, and the arbitration court shall propose what steps shall be taken to give effect thereto.

Article XIV--The executive council shall formulate plans for the establishment of a permanent court of international justice, which court shall when established, be competent to hear and determine any matter the parties recognized as subject for submission to it for arbitration under the foregoing article.

Article XV--If there should arise between the members of the league any dispute which is not of a nature which is not submitted to arbitration as above, the high contracting parties agree that they will refer the matter to a permanent court of international justice, which court shall be established by the parties to the dispute, and give notice of the existence of the dispute to the secretary-general, who will make all necessary arrangements for a full hearing and consideration thereof. For this purpose the parties agree to contribute to the secretary-general, as a deposit, a possible statement of their case, with the relevant papers, and the executive council may forward direct execution thereof.

When the efforts of the council lead to the settlement of the dispute, a statement shall be published, indicating the nature of the dispute and the terms of settlement, together with such explanations as may be appropriate. If the dispute has not been settled, the council shall forthwith publish a report setting forth all necessary facts and explanations, the recommendations which the council has made, and the progress of the settlement of the dispute. In the event of a power, so invited, refusing to accept the obligations of membership in the league for the purpose of settling a dispute which, in the case of a state that is a member of the league, would constitute a breach of article XII, the provision of article XIV shall be applicable as against the state refusing such action.

In both parties to the dispute, when so invited, refuse to accept the obligations of membership in the league for the purpose of settling a dispute, the executive council may take such action and make such recommendations as will prevent hostilities and will result in the settlement of the dispute.
