CUMMINS PROPOSES A NEW FORM LEAGUE OF NATIONS

Opposes the Sort of Arrangement Proposed at Versailles—Outlines His Scheme in Speech This Morning in the Senate—Says Paris Proposal Would Prove Disastrous

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—Although the American people "naturally" desire nations to prevent future wars," they will not accept the league proposed by the Paris covenant, which would commit the United States to a course which will end in humiliation and disaster," Senator Cummins declared in the senate this afternoon. Particularly he referred to the mandatory powers of the Paris covenant, and declared it would require "hundreds of thousands of armed men, thousands of civil employes and billions in money."

Unlike those who have already spoken in opposition in any league of nations, Senator Cummins proposed a substitute plan which he believed the nation could accept, with honor and without surrender of any part of its sovereignty.

Outlining the plan for a league of nations, Cummins said: "First, we ought to agree and all other nations ought to agree that justicible disputes should be settled either by arbitration or adjudication; and we ought to agree and all other nations ought to agree, without limitation or reserve, that we agree there will be no war."

"Second, we ought to agree, and all other nations ought to agree, that with respect to other international disputes war shall not be made final—no permanent, regular international body in which every member of the league is represented, shall have had a fair opportunity to discuss or consider it—a body that would give enlightened consideration to the various questions that would be presented to it, and would award a judgment and the sanction should be confined to the moral influences which time, thought and free discussion will awaken."

"Third, if any nation should refuse to submit a proper controversy to judgment, or should refuse to abide by the combined powers lawfully and equitably to consider the league in all its aspects, I am willing to agree that a restriction shall be placed upon the military arm of the league."

"Fourth, the compact should contain a program of disarmament, and after all, in disarmament largely lies the solution of the problem in this regard, for a careful study of its provisions gives us little right to believe that there will be any disarmament among the strong powers which are to give the compact life and vigor."

YANKEE ANTI-AIRCRAFT GUNNERY IN THE LEAD

Was 500 Per Cent Better Than French, According to Statistics. American anti-aircraft gunnery during the war was 500 per cent better than the French, according to statistics now available.

Whereas the French D. C. A. Division Center 36000 shot down 1400 aircraft, the average of the American artillery was only 1200. The three batteries of anti-aircraft guns of three-inch caliber that were placed in the line by the American expeditionary force shot down an Albatross biplane reconnaissance machine of the French and brought down another in the same month.

The American expeditionary force used both fixed guns and mobile batteries against French aircraft, according to the letter from the French. They sent 1000 of the famous strategic machine guns, the fixed batteries of machine guns mounted on special trailers that permit them being fired from almost any angle in the air.

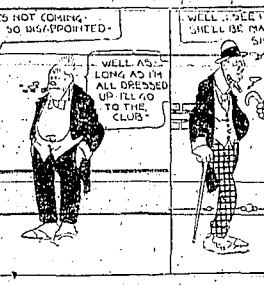
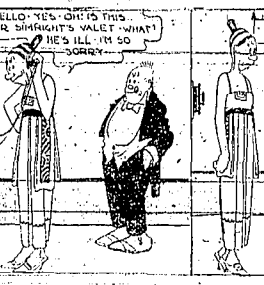
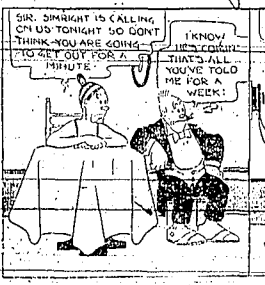
