HORRORS UNSPEAKABLE HANG OVER CIVILIZED HUMANITY

Three Hundred Million People Approaching or On the Line of Acute Destitution—Stories of Conditions in Some Places Already Rival the Worst Tales of Maddened Men Marooned in Arctic Circle When Famished Appetites Overthrew Reason—Bolsheviki Promise Plenty and Domination to Kojper Hordes in Eastern Europe—Charles Edward Russel Publishes a Startling Article Relative to State of Affairs Existing.

LONDON, Feb. 27.—Dreadful news from Britain reveals the situation in practically all of Europe east of the Rhine. Help may come with organized relief on a scale unknown heretofore with food, meat and clothes for millions and millions more of the world will face the certainty of terrible distress over vast regions and the possibility of a storm that will shake the whole structure of modern society.

And nothing strikes a terror. Any one that talks about things as they really are in Europe will be called a madman or a scandalizer or exaggerator. This is because the world has never before faced such a situation and has nothing in its experience to base a comparison on. I can only assure you that the "if" of these past few weeks has been a mere shadow and that the new disaster will be far more real. Of 400,000,000 people in Europe it is likely that 300,000,000 are now approaching the line of acute destitution or already upon it.

In some parts of Austria-Hungary, Silesia and Bohemia starvation has either begun or is close at hand. In most of Germany the present supply of food stuffs will be exhausted in four weeks. And nobody knows what new disaster will befall from that fact. The most optimistic in Germany look with the gravest misgivings upon that fatal future.

If there is neither peace nor security in Germany with Germany fed, what will be the condition in Germany with Germany starving? It is to such the same in Turkey, although the conditions there are somewhat less dire. In Constantinople there is acute famine among the poor. Reports from camps where one million Russian prisoners are still confined in Germany and Bohemia are of a nature that is frightful. It can only be said that by saying so much distress has been told by civilized men, except by voices of despairing confusion in the streets. Starving men lose all reason and restraint. We who are comfortable and well fed always overlook this fact; a fact that remains, Europe will now likely have to deal with it sternly. For just at the time when the country is threatened with death, the Bolsheviki agitators and anarchists devilish schemes are the worst.

Give up desperate, starving, famine-stricken millions of plenty and abundance, which the Bolsheviki always hold out, and what shall we expect them to do with it? What happens, a hundred might to show plain enough if we had any doubt on the subject.

"Thinking bodies" had a great deal more to say with that outbreak of madness than the machinations of reformers.

Suppose a hundred million people of Europe get into a desperate state of mind like the people of Munich, what would happen? In a hundred years there is no starvation men can see plainly enough the signs of unrest and profound dissatisfaction.

In this great crisis there is but one nation in the world in a position to furnish relief that may save the situation. That is the United States. It alone has the food, textiles, ships and money to save the world from this disaster. While the war was on we voluntarily rationed ourselves so as to feed the allies. The present emergency is at least as great as that of the war. If we undertake for the sake of humanity, as much self help now as we practiced then, we can give eastern Europe enough help and aid most of it through our own hands. We shall give the Americans when we shall grasp the situation and rise to it. We shall not be any other quarter. We may as well understand that, it is no help from any other quarter.

LARGE GENERAL DEFICIENCY BILL


