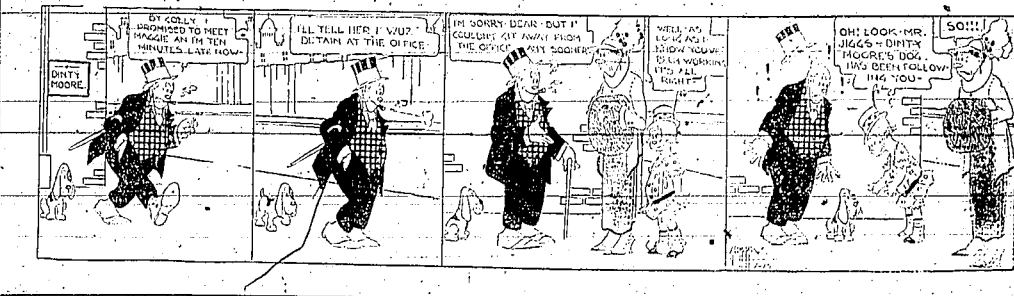

U. S. NAVY DOES GREAT WORK IN TAKING MEN OVER SEAS—SUBMARINE DIVISION SPECTACULAR BRANCH

Del Edward (U. S. Staff Correspondent)

LONDON, Feb. 28.—(By Mail)—American established three principal naval bases at Great Britain, France, Queensland, and Gibraltar. Spain to provide cover for merchant and troop ships. American destroyers and other warships steamed approximately 1,000,000 miles in the performance of this work.

When the destroyer was sighted here were of these bases 100 equal vessels suitable for this duty. Over 200 destroyers, 25 armed cruisers, five submarine cruisers, and including all convoys that traversed any part of the Atlantic and including coastal and Scandinavian harbors.

The American forces stationed at Great Britain consist of a total of 710 convoys, including a total of more than 100 ships. In addition, 1877 merchant ships numbered more than 100. From Great Britain supplied 50 per cent of the coast for 250 convoys. The Queenstown force, in some cases consisting of one or two destroyers, one or two British destroyers met them and escorted units of the convoys to various ports.

The navy officials estimate that a conservative tabulation of the work done by the British, American and French ships in the convoy of both the Atlantic and the Mediterranean being percentage: Great Britain, 20 per cent; United States, 27 per cent; France, 27 per cent.
