Atlanta, Ga., Mar. 1.—The South is substantially the center of the peace of nations, it is the opinion of the delegates and visitors gathered at the Southern Congress and Peace League Convention here today.

Armistice Terms Fixed Finally By General Foch - Commissions Reporting on Terms of Settlement

London, Mar. 1.—Marshal Foch now has the completed armistice terms to Germany which are expected to approximate the military and naval conditions of the peace treaty, and they will result in the complete demobilization of the German army, disarmament through Germany and inspection of German munitions works by an inter-allied commission, said a Paris dispatch to the Daily News today.

Germany's armed strength, for the purpose of meeting internal disorders, is expected to be fixed at about 25 divisions.

Andre Tardieu is speeding up the work of the peace conference, said the Paris correspondent of the Daily Mail. It is not estimated that a general view of the peace terms can be given until between March 8 and 15. Between March 15 and April 1, it is believed, all of the problems will have been solved.



LONDON, Feb. 28.—(By Mail)—American established three principal naval bases at Great Britain, France, Queensland, and Gibraltar, Spain, to provide cover for merchant and troop ships. American destroyers and other warships steamed approximately 1,000,000 miles in the performance of this work.


