





# CLEVER BRITISH WOMAN SPY KEPT BOCHE SECRET SERVICE DANCING FOR MANY MONTHS

LONDON, March 3.—From out of the maze of thrilling secret spy stories there looms one "major admiral" who is the most interesting.

She is Mrs. "Western" Williams. From the outbreak of the war this woman and her husband, a German, who she claims to be a British subject, in their home in London, Germany, have furnished the most valuable information of the war to the allies.
