CONGRESS LEFT MANY BIG BILLS WITHOUT FINAL ACTION

Filibuster Defeated Many Measures of Public Interest—Army Bill, Navy Bill, Agricultural Appropriation Bill and Sundry Civil Service Bill All Go Over—Senate Would Demobilize Army.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 4.—The sixty-sixth congress, the "war congress," adjourned today at 12 o'clock noon today.

The vote on the demobilization question came not unexpectedly at the end of the four filibusters, but in the hour of the general adjournment, with an appropriation of \$200,000,000 to defray expenses of federal control of railroads.

The filibusters—Senators Sherman, La Follette and France—were successful in their efforts. Not only did they defeat the general adjournment bill but an adjournment bill defeated four other important appropriation measures.

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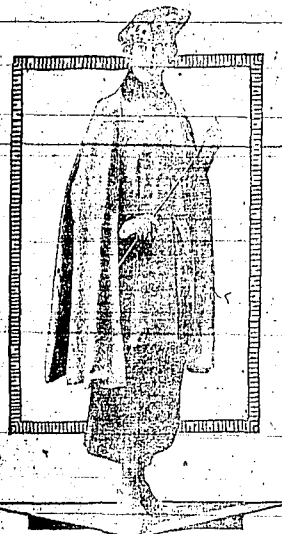

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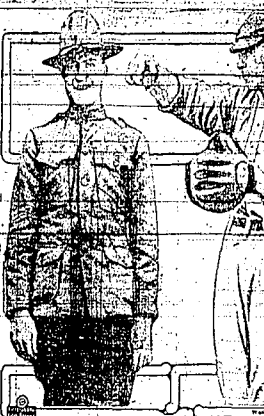

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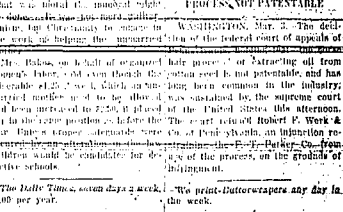

The names of President Wilson, Premier Lloyd George and President Clemenceau are being mentioned as the possible members of the sub-committee.

For a week the Germans will have a constant stream of visitors who will tend to return upon them. They will be required to discuss to acquaint their government with the terms of the peace. The terms of the peace will be discussed in a confidential manner.

No extensive discussion of terms will be allowed, although the envoys will be made opportunity to express their views. But the Germans will be given the opportunity that they must sign the act as it stands.
