ALLIES FEAR FOR INDEMNITIES AS BATTLE RAGES IN BERLIN

Great Britain, Considers Advisability of Agreeing to Foreign Monetary Claims, and Taking Damages in Ships in Order to Avert Triumph of Bolsheviki—First Bloody Clash Between Government Troops and Spartacists Resulting From Present Strike Takes Place.

(Sidney Darsh, exclusive cable by the L. N. S. and London Express)
PARIS, Mar. 5.—The gravest apprehensions are felt that Germany may be plunged into Bolshevism and will have nothing to do with it.
It is indeed authoritative that, in view of the heavy claims of France and others Great Britain may force any monetary indemnity for Germany demanding instead that Germany's mercantile fleet, its commission of justice appointed to consider the war guilt of the ex-empire, and other measures which the soviet of a state cannot be proceeded against, but the decision must be made by the peace conference as a whole before it is effective.
The commission report on Germany crises will be ready by the end of the week and will relieve any anxious revolutionaries.
Names of responsible persons have been secured and their surrender will be demanded.

IMPORTANT CHAIRMANSHIPS GO TO MEN FROM THAT SECTION

Tentative Meeting Held Today For May of Michigan, an Oldtime Protectionist to Read the Committee of Ways and Means Each on Interstate Commerce.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 5.—The middle west will have adequate control of legislation in the next house, as a result of the tentative organization of the big house committees by the Republicans today.
Every chairman with two exceptions is from west of Pennsylvania. The latter is the farthest state east represented.
Floor Leader Mann was temporary chairman of the committee on committees which did the organizing. The tentative organization was agreed on because of the uncertainty as to whether there would be further other party nominations before this special session is called. In the tentative organization the seniority principle was followed, ranking Republicans in their own claims and other Republicans members retaining their memberships. As a result of this procedure the following committees will be headed as follows:
Prob. Wisconsin, interstate commerce.
Ohio, agriculture.
Porter, Pennsylvania, foreign affairs.
Kenady, Iowa, rivers and harbors.
Walters, Minnesota, judiciary.
These are the committees that will be in the train of reconstruction legislation, and contrary to common division of the government, the west and New England states practically are ignored. 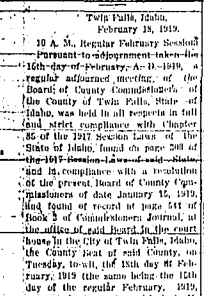

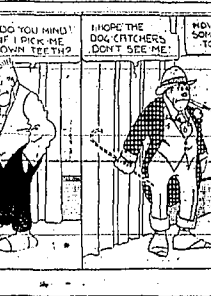

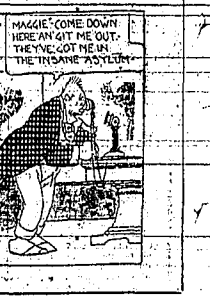

NEW YORK, March 5.—Approximately 400 members of the national American Woman's Suffrage association have practically completed plans for the great—meeting in the history of woman's suffrage—that of the jubilee—reunion to be held in St. Louis, Mo., May 22-23.

From a congressional standpoint the battle for equal suffrage has been waged for 110 years ago. The first national women's suffrage convention was formed last July year ago, but the congressional battle was started in 1878 under the able and far-seeing leadership of Susan B. Anthony.

Despite enemy attacks and a relentless battle waged by various political and private interests, the members of the National American Woman's Suffrage Association have invariably confined their campaigns to the question of equal suffrage. In the contrary were hatched by enemies to the effect that these women were under the control of the crafty cunning and ambitious political class, seeking national domination. This claim was wholly and effectively refuted by Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, president of the association, who said:

"I have never asked a single man equal suffrage. To be sure, there are many women who have been prominent in the battle for prohibition. There are also many women who prefer to talk temperance. Others have various phases of reform which have crept into our ranks, but never have been fathered or fostered by the association."
