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VICTORIOUS SUFFRAGE BODY, FOLLOWING EIGHT OF 40 YEARS, WILL MEET IN GOLDEN JUBILEE AT ST. LOUIS

LIQUOR AND COTTON INTERESTS FEARING PROHIBITION AND DRASITC LAWS FOR WOMEN AND CHILD LABOR, FOUGHT EQUAL RIGHTS FOR YEARS

NEW YORK, March 5.—Approximately 1,000 members of the National American Woman's Suffrage Association have practically completed plans for the greatest meeting in the history of women's suffrage—that of the Jubilee Convention to be held in St. Louis, May 21-24.

The congressional stampede, the battle for equal suffrage has been waged for forty-one years. The first suffrage organization was formed just fifty years ago, but the congressional battle was started in 1878 under the leadership of Mrs. Elizabeth Cady Stanton and Susan B. Anthony.

Despite every assassination and a relentless battle waged by various political and private interests, the members of the National American Woman's Suffrage Association have steadily continued their campaign to the sole question of equal suffrage. Stories to the contrary were hatched by enemies to the effect that these women were under the *gaze* of suffrage, getting nothing in return. Yet, when and effectively related today by Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, president of the association, who said:

"We have never asked anything but equal suffrage. To us, there are

been prominent in the battle for prohibition; there are many women who prefer to talk temperance. Others have various phases of reform which have kept our battles, but we have been faithful and true to the association."

"In our ranks are members of the Women's Christian Temperance Union who lined up with us primarily with the object of gaining equal suffrage, and other subjects. We have served in the cause of temperance, and it is only the liquor interests, the cotton interests or other interests representing those phases of capital which might be disturbed by the extension of woman suffrage, who have been bitter enemies of suffrage."

"Peculiarly enough, the southern states have given preference to the divided support to suffrage and prohibition from their people, while the northern states have more formidable opponents, namely, the cotton industry. The latter fights us because we are interested in the hours of labor by women and children. In the north we are interested in liquor interests and certain phases of

That is the only four women who have served in the presidential chairs of the association despite a life of fifty years. The first president was Mrs. Elizabeth Cady Stanton, who served from 1869 to 1902.

Mrs. Catt was succeeded by Dr. Anna Howard Shaw, who served from 1902 to 1910, when Mrs. Catt was again made president.

"Our election is not at all premature," concluded Mrs. Catt. "In fact, we are probably certain that sufficient time will be given to the suffrage movement before June 30, this year. We know that a special session of congress must be called to provide, thence, for the running of the government from and after June 30, the day of the first session of congress, if it is special or regular. That insures victory of a cause that has been fought for fifty years."

In connection with the Fifteenth Amendment, Wyoming will play a most important part in the suffrage movement. It has granted full suffrage to women. That was the same year that the National American Woman's Suffrage Association and the National Negro Suffrage Association were formed, these to merge in 1909 into the National American Woman's Suffrage Association.

President and the special agents of the association, from the frontiers to the four states where the Negro population is largest, have voted for the special Negro suffrage bill will represent these women in Washington.

"The educational campaign is one of our most important plans," said Mrs. Catt, "and we are making great progress. Many who may form something from this campaign.
