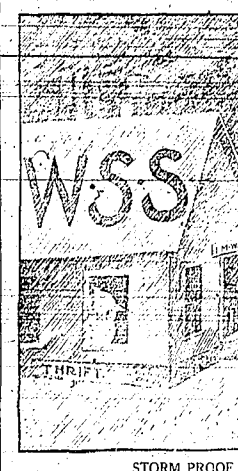

BRIGHT DAYS AHEAD FOR THE FARMER

Congress Asked to Guarantee Wheat Price—Bran Crop Sure to Be Sold

Of all the producers the farmer is going to find himself in the best position financially during the period of readjustment, according to reports coming out of Washington from day to day. The United States Food Administration the other day estimated that the wheat crop of 1918-19 will be worth approximately \$1,250,000,000, a figure commensurate with the fact that the wheat crop of 1918-19 is the best in the history of the United States. TAKING CARE OF SOWS AND LITTER

Sufficient Protection Must Be Provided During Months of March and April.

GIVE STRAW FOR WARM-BED

After Pigs Arrive, Nothing Should Be Given But Supply of Clean Water—Feed Moderately for the First Few Days.

Many farmers have done some damage during the months of March and April and the early fall months in the South. Since the weather is still so cold in northern sections during March and April, care should be taken to protect the sow from cold. Give her something to make a warm bed, but not so much as to make the litter pile get so wet and crumbly. The sow should have clean water but nothing else for the first 24 hours after the pig arrives.

Feed for First Week.
In the second half of the first week or when milk will be reduced. Feed moderately for the first week. A mixture of two parts of corn and one of middlings may be fed in increasing amounts until the sow is eating a full ration. If straw milk can be fed in addition, the sow will be better fed. Better to make the sow give a full flow of milk. Another good grain mixture for the sow of this time is six parts of corn and two of peas. If straw milk is available, the sow will not eat four pounds of milk to one pound of straw. A full grain ration should never be more than four per cent of the total weight of the feed. The sow can eat on an average 100 pounds of feed a day. A ration of about two per cent of the sow's live weight in good pasture makes a cheap and adequate supply.

As soon as the little pigs begin to eat they will do best if fed additional milk in a separate tin set away from their mother and the larger pig. 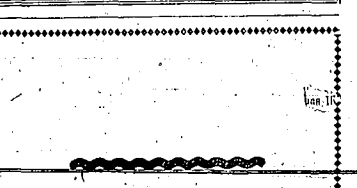

FEARS GERMAN INDUSTRIALISM

French Editor Addresses Letter to President Wilson Urging Protection Against German Plans to Grab World Markets

PARIS, Mar. 17.—A plea for strong league of nations plan to check the economic imperialism of Germany in made in an open letter which the French editor, editor of the Matin, has addressed to President Wilson. The writer appeals to the president to make the league of nations permanent an institution for guaranteeing riparian from Germany. The letter says:

"The speaker of this note may express France's confidence in you. Just as former Clemenceau symbolizes victory, so do you symbolize peace. The author agrees with you in principle and as you resume your place at the peace conference it recalls your vow not to return to the policy of small powers. It is for this reason that I am so glad to see you in the German camp, now guaranteed by the German empire, now represented by Weimar, believes in a new constitution of nations, now represented by America. Already the hour, weak coalition arrangement between Germany, Poland, Czechoslovakia, Rumania and Belgium as to the Balkans. Germany is preparing to reach them by her industrial, not military force.

"If the league of nations is only military insurance corporation, it is only a protection for the people against the war and abandons them to poverty. It does not confer upon each people the means of life and introduce justice in international order."

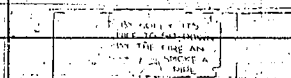

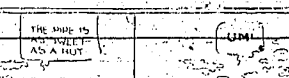
