Every Precinct in the Highway District Gives Ringing Endorsement to Movement Which Will Insure Future of District and Provide Employment Through Critical Period—More Than Ninety-seven Per Cent of Vote Approves Issue—Barger Precinct Goes Solid.



KAHN POINTS WAY TO ESCAPE HEAVY TAXES

California Congressman Says People Must Cooperate With Government

"Congressman John Kahn of California, senior member of the Military Affairs Committee of the House, in a statement given out at Washington, reviews briefly some of the problems confronting the government in post-war finance and urges the country to help congress hold down taxes. He said:

"There is in the United States going to pay her war debts which she now begins to flood the nation's treasury with the surplus of public funds today is almost on a par with the expenditures made while the war was raging. It is through these are no more munitions or implements of war to be purchased, the engines of destruction which American factories created to help the government of Germany have not all been put-for. There are the heavy expenditures incident to redefining the world from a war to a peace basis.

Reconstruction Cost Heavy. "It is no more to students of history to be told that the expenses of post-war reconstruction have always been great, and many of them are still being paid today. Food must be shipped to our boys who are still on foreign soil. Money must be raised to further projects having to do with fitting these able bodies of ours with suitable occupations. Those who have been maintained must be made to contribute their share to the world. "Where is the money to come from? The people themselves, although they have the patriotic and wholehearted support of the government's war program and made unprecedented sacrifices, simply felt the effect of the taxes imposed in the revenue bill such as they had never faced before and would have not submitted to except in view of extraordinary circumstances. For that the war is over we must find some way of raising money to finance the various necessary projects confronting the nation.

People Must Cooperate. "The people must cooperate and help the government without undue taxation. They can continue to invest in War Savings Stamps, Liberty Bonds and other government securities, and help the government by helping themselves. "The government desires its citizens to be good taxpayers, mutually helpful. Funds can be raised to help the government need. In addition, by the patriotic cooperation of the people, who are at the same time making a sale an investment as can be made in securities, the most successful business on earth, that of Uncle Sam."

VICTORY LOAN QUOTA NOT TO HINGE ON W. S. S.

Failure of Some Districts to Reapportion Causes Change in Plans

Victory Liberty Loan quotas will not be affected by Thrift Stamp sales as planned by the Treasury Department last January by Lewis H. 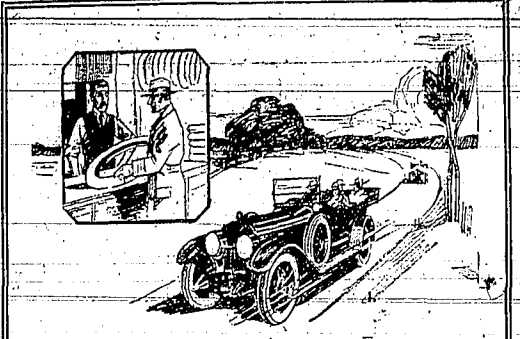

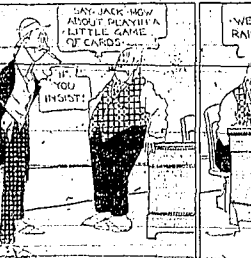

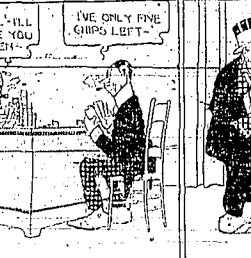
