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IDAHO TROOPS OPEN THEATRE ON THE RHINE

History of the 146th Field Artillery Given With Program of Musical Comedy That Yankees Present

The 146th field artillery, headed by "Idaho boys," early this month officiated at the dedication of the 66th artillery brigade's "Duster" at "Festhaus" in Grenchhausen, Germany, where the regiment is now stationed with the American army of occupation.

The dramatic story of the 146th is shown here through a musical comedy, "Going Home" at the dedication, March 26, at 8 o'clock. The play was told in San Francisco and judging from the program contained everything needed to provide an evening of lively entertainment.

Members of the program have been recruited by The Three from Sgt. Charles Austin and Elder Kern, Twin Falls boys with the 146th. A most interesting program to the program is a brief history of the regiment from its formation at Fort Slocum, South Carolina, until it came to the Rhine. It reads as follows:

The 146th Field Artillery is composed of National Guard troops from the States of Idaho, Oregon, Utah, Nevada, California, and New Mexico. The different units comprising the regiment were reconstituted at Camp Greene, N. C., and the regiment was formally organized at Fort Slocum, S. C., on October 15, 1863.

The second Idaho infantry led by Dan Barrecks, Boise, Idaho, on October 24th, 1917, arriving at Camp Greene on October 31st. The Headquarters and Supply Companies, and "A," "B," "C" and "D" Companies were made up in the vicinity of the formation of the regiment. The other units of the Idaho infantry were put into an engineering regiment and a machine gun battalion.

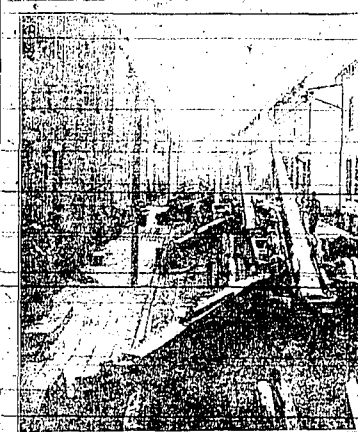
Battery "A" of the First New Mexico Field Artillery, whose home is at Fort Huachuca, New Mexico, arrived at Albuquerque, N. M., at Albuquerque on the 27th day of September, 1917, in Camp Greene on September 30th.

The First Battalion of Washington Field Artillery left Fort Walla Walla, Washington, on October 27th, 1917, arriving at Camp Greene on October 30th. It consisted of three batteries, which Battery "A" was recruited in Walla Walla, Battery "B" in Bonanza and Battery "C" in Blaine.

The various units of the 146th Field Artillery were formed as follows:

Headquarters Co.—Hillyer, Co. "D"—2nd Idaho Inf., Co. "B"—2nd Idaho Inf., Supply Co.—Supply Co. and Co. "D"—2nd Idaho Inf.

Battery "A," Battery "B," Battery "C," and Battery "D" Companies "B," "C" and "D" were on the front line in a company with the 2nd Idaho Inf. Battery "A" of the 146th was in a particularly active position, turning out to meet the German forces on the morning of January 18, 1918.

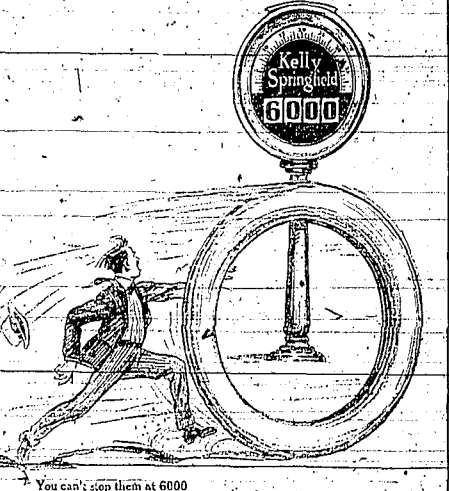

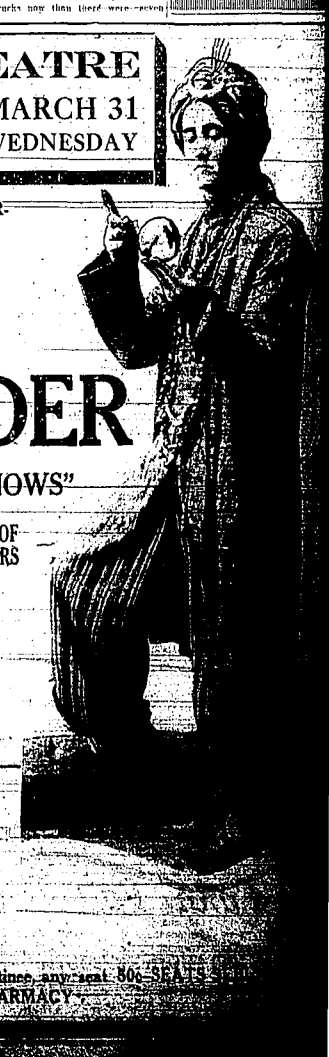

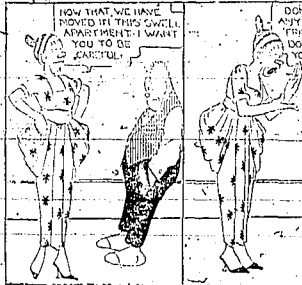

Murtaugh Farmers Poison Squirrels

A. W. Nelson, of Murtaugh, was in the farm house after this week to get an additional supply of strychnine and saccharin to be used in squirreling. Mr. Nelson, together with eight of his neighbors, have been working since March 17th, in the poison camp of Murtaugh on strychnine. Mr. Nelson reports having destroyed at least 90 per cent of the squirrels on 125 acres of land which was badly infested with these rodents. He states that he prepared the poisoned bait according to the directions furnished by the farm bureau and that he had covered his ground every other day for three times. At each place where there was evidence of work he placed about a handful of oats by the side of a wooden pile, carrying the oats in a sack on his back. He says the best time to put the poison out is early in the morning between 6 or 7 o'clock. He says that after the third day he could hardly find a squirrel.
