CRY OF ENGLISH WORKERS AND SOLDIERS FOR SANITARY HOMES ATTAINS GREAT NATIONAL WAIL

(By Floyd Macfarlane, L. A. Staff Correspondent)

LONDON, April 8.—England's workers are crying out for decent housing, but not to be of the same order as the tenements of the United States. The cry which has been heard ever before the war has produced not a single house.

Owing to demobilization, with hundreds of thousands of soldiers settling up their war-time barracks, the housing shortage is rapidly increasing. The landlords have been able to tear the plaster for houses and are selling at huge profits—some houses are being sold only at nominal income owing to the government restriction act. Tenants turned out have joined in the countrywide howl. A million houses are wanted.

Lloyd George, the veritable prophet, has stepped into the white breach but has promised him for a month in lieu of right away. But as yet not a single house has been built by the government, or a shilling advanced for any one of the various programs put forward for new homes. That is that simply because things must be done in a hurry. The British people do not doubt that Lloyd George will get the country's house building started as soon as he gets a moment's rest from military other duties.

House building was at a standstill during the war. How various enterprises have been hampered—first, by a shortage of building materials, and, second, by the fear that if new houses are built at present cost of material and labor, the houses cannot be rented profitably.

Hours of food will be added from the fact that timber is scarce and expensive the custom, call for a house of brick, cost that will last for ten to twenty years, and acquiring a house costs more than the cost of a car. these almost prophetic. What happened "As soon as the tenants were in possession not only did they resist the police authorities but they had their former friends clamoring to be allowed to see them." The British people are not so easily satisfied out philanthropy to give employers "a plentiful" healthy homes to provide them with "restoring" and beauty in their daily life.

There can be no doubt that efficient walks, pretty dresses and good-looking houses have a powerful influence for good, and the homes of tomorrow, I hope, will be infinitely more beautiful to look at than those of yesterday," he said.

This view has caused a much heartier fight than has been met with the necessity of carrying it into reality. But to provide such houses the government itself will be compelled to take the initial cost of construction, but it also will be faced with the necessity of providing, for many years, the extra deficit caused by building such houses. For, economically it is not possible to build them and rent them to workers at a sum sufficient to cover expenses involved. The workers cannot stand the drain.

The government already is prepared to accept such rent deficits as a matter of recognition.

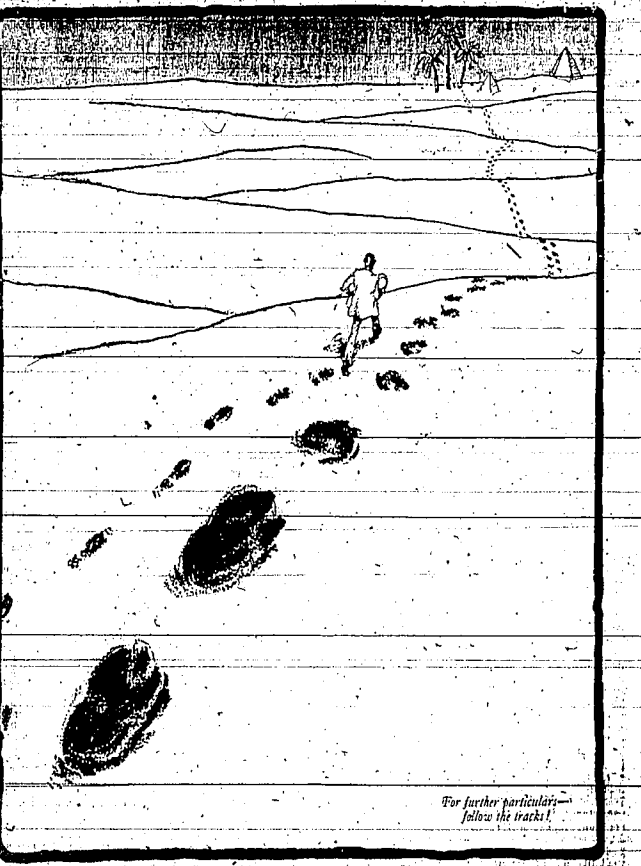

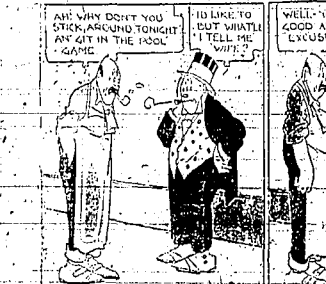
