CENTENARY IS SET ASIDE FOR VICTORY LOAN

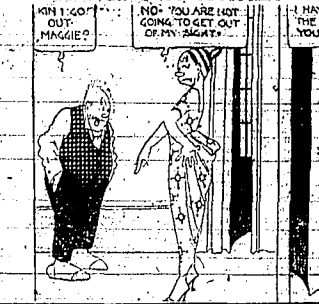
Great Methodist Movement Will Walk While Church Aids in Drive for Victory Loan Bonds

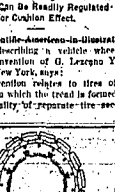
