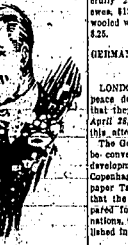

Poor Chimneys Cause Many Rural Fires

A summary of the various causes of fire, as given by the fire marshals of different states, shows that the most liable to chimneys annually occur from 10 to 25 per cent of the total number, while in winter the percentage had reached as high as 45. This is significant when it is recalled that most of these fires result from carelessness and could be avoided by the proper attention.

In cities and towns with proper fire protection many fires are arrested without serious loss of life or property, say specialists of the United States Department of Agriculture that in rural districts, where there are no fire departments and no fire fighting services, and where a fire usually results in a total loss, builders should give consideration to making the construction of all new chimneys as thoroughly fire proof as possible.

Danger to Many Chimneys - It is well known that the ordinary brick-and-mortar chimney is usually constructed in a source of danger. The constant heat from fire in the grate causes the mortar to become dry, so that it falls out of place, leaving holes in the chimney. Such a condition usually goes unnoticed and is a constant source of danger from fire.

Where the hole is already equipped with the ordinary unlined brick chimney a close inspection should be given at short intervals to insure safety. Any breaks or cracks appear they should be immediately repaired. It would also be well occasionally to clean the chimneys, thus removing the soot. This may be done with a wire or rasp to which is fastened any old kitchen knife for the purpose. A masonry trowel cup and a pair of old pants will do the work satisfactorily.

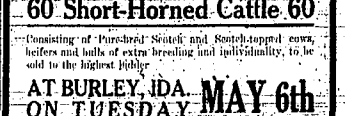

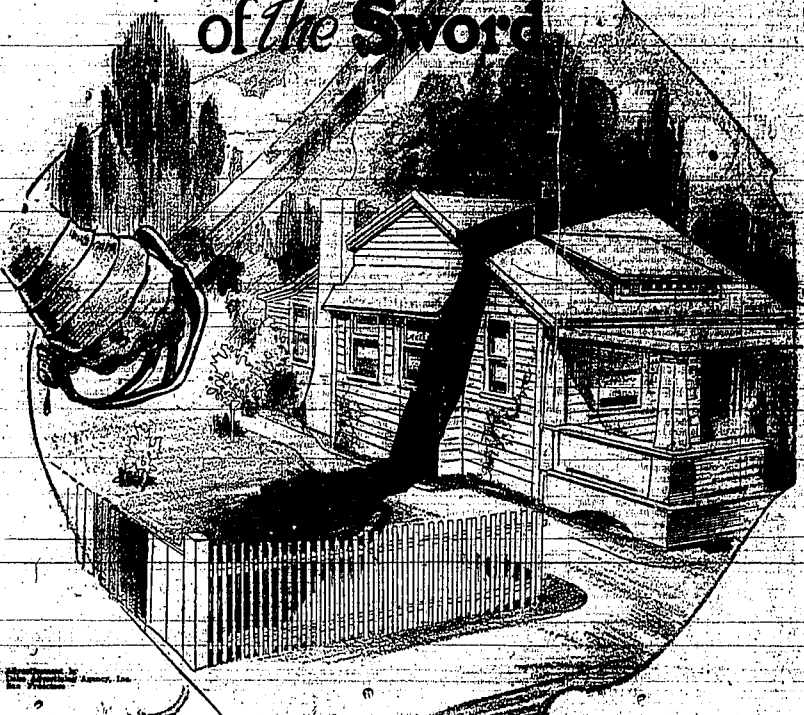
